
The family would like to thank the Doctors and Staff at Parkhouse Surgery and Shotley Bridge who cared for Joe during his illness

A NEW CIBORIUM FOR LANCHESTER PARISH CHURCH

On Monday 15th June at the Monday evening Eucharist service a special little ceremony took place. Canon Peter Waterhouse blessed a solid silver ciborium. The latter is a vessel, which holds the wafers for Holy Communion and so is used at every Eucharist or Holy Communion service.

There were 7 special ladies present to witness the ceremony together with other members of the congregation and these ladies make up our catering team who have worked very hard for our church in this capacity for many years. They are shown below.

The actual origin of the team dates back to a Miss Ruth Shotton who lived in the Garths. She asked for people in our church to help her to provide a

special tea for the many people in Lanchester who had been so kind to her during an illness. Mrs. Peggy Atkinson and Mrs Sara Allison needed no persuading to help and soon gathered a group of ladies to help them. Miss Shotton gave a donation and that was the beginning of the fundraising side of the catering section of our church. They were involved in fundraising for the Chapter House, which was added to the church 20 years ago. The Flower Festival, a big fundraiser for the Chapter House, was held together by the Catering Team. Peggy Atkinson and her team worked tirelessly to provide refreshments for three days, which is a tremendous feat in itself. The work carries on today though the number in the

team has reduced over the years through illness and moving away, but the 'magnificent seven' were there on Monday to see the blessing of the ciborium which had been bought with the money they had raised by their catering over the years. They have in the past purchased china, cutlery, table cloths and even a new boiler which has proved invaluable in the kitchen. The ciborium of course is very special and it was in 2007 that they asked our vicar if there was something they could buy for the church. It has been engraved on the vessel that the catering team bought the ciborium which of course will now be used for many, many years to come. It will be part of the history of the church and is a symbol of the commitment of a group of people living out their Christian Faith and being 'Living Stones' of Lanchester Parish Church. We are proud of them! It is to be used for the first time at the Confirmation Service on Monday June 22nd when the Bishop of Durham, Bishop Tom Wright will be in attendance.

Incidents of note:

Vehicle obstruction is taking place in Newbiggen Lane. A survey has been carried out in Newbiggen Lane

by a Police Traffic Management officer and a Highways engineer. A speed survey is also to be completed. Vehicles parked from No. 6 towards the village are parked legally as this is an official parking bay. Unfortunately there is no footpath adjacent to the parking bay but pedestrians are able to cross the road to the footpath on the other side of the road

providing vehicles are not parked there illegally. Vehicles parked further up Newbiggen Lane are doing so illegally on the footpaths which is on a bend causing problems to the pedestrians and other vehicles. A letter has been delivered to drivers/residents requesting that no parking should take place here and penalty tickets will be issued if

these warnings are not heeded.

Thefts include:

- (i) a tumble drier which was removed from outside a property in Lee Hill Court;
- (ii) money had been stolen by an unknown person (the CCTV suggests it was a female) from private bank account via bank card lost or stolen with purse from a bus passenger (passenger advised against storing pin number with the card);
- (iii) three coats were taken from a shop in Station Road by an unknown male who was chased by the complainant on foot. Officers were on the scene within minutes but they found no trace.

Criminal damage refers to the following:

- (i) an upstairs window was smashed by a youth in Percy Place;
- (ii) a picnic table was destroyed by a fire in Malton picnic area;
- (iii) radiators and a washing machine were damaged in a boarded up and unoccupied nursery.

Gardening in July

After all of the hard work of sowing and planting of the previous two months, July can be considered to be partly a 'pottering' month in your garden and I think that it is important to plan to potter. As part of your 'pottering', you can spend a few minutes contemplating your borders to see which colours work together and which clash. Note the results so that you can change things later in the autumn or next spring. Part of my pottering in July involves dead-heading by removing faded flower heads on lupins and roses to encourage blooms later in the year. Additionally tidy-up your bedding, keep on weeding and remember to water pots and plants in need. July is also probably the first of the hedge-trimming months: a tidy hedge can be beneficial to the whole garden. Most hedges, including beech, lavender, berberis, hawthorn and holly need pruning just once per year whereas fast-growing hedges such as privet, box and the dreaded, very vigorous Leyland cypress are likely to need several trims each year.

Borders

Earwigs can devastate both your dahlia and chrysanthemum buds so it's best to trap them before they do any damage. Put canes among the plants with an upturned pot filled with newspaper or straw on the top of the canes. The earwigs will climb the canes and shelter in the pots so empty them each morning on your patio and destroy any that you find. To ensure a long season for sweet peas snip off faded blooms to stop seed pods from appearing. Feed your bedding plants in pots as they may well have used all of their nutrients by July. You can use weekly feeds of high potash fertiliser or a tomato fertiliser. July is a good time to sow your winter bedding which can include Universal Pansy, Viola and Bellis (Double Daisy). Sown now, they will be ready for transplanting when the summer bedding has finished.

Vegetable Plot

Keep your vegetable plot well watered to ensure a good yield. Now is the time to use your reserves

of water as I indicated last month. An additional help is to make use of your home-composting (which we should all be doing) as a mulch for your fruit and summer crops to retain moisture. It is not too late to sow carrots, spinach and lettuce to produce crops this year and sowing parsley now will produce a winter crop. You can also sow dwarf French beans and peas for a late crop. It is best to raise young plants in pots prior to planting outside. It is now time to pick autumn and spring sown broad beans. Check pods regularly to monitor the size of the beans and pick before the white scar attaching the bean to the inside of its pod turns brown.

General

July is a month to enjoy your garden and the labours that you completed earlier in the year. Your watering schedule must continue and water early or late to avoid sun scorch. It is a good month to treat paths and drives with a weedkiller. Whatever the weather, enjoy your gardening.



Winner of the competition for a Fire Prevention Tip was Ann Carr whose tip was always have an escape route planned and make sure everyone knows it and second Maureen Barker with always unplug everything before going to bed.

The speaker this month was Gary Eden, a Fire Service Community Fire Safety Officer in our area, who gives talks aiming to make us all aware of the dangers in our homes as well as visiting people in their homes if needed. His message is “FIRES START WHEN YOUR ATTENTION STOPS”. Gary identified 5 of the most common ways fires in the home start. (1) Chip Pans, never fill them more than 1/3 full or leave unattended. (2) Open fires and portable heaters, always use a fireguard and keep a 3ft clear space round the fire. (3) Smoking, never smoke in bed, always use a ashtray and keep matches and lighters out

of the reach of children. (4) Candles and tea lights, always use candles in proper holders and do not leave unattended, keep away from draughts and keep out of the reach of pets and children. (5) electrical appliances, 1 plug 1 socket unless using a trailing socket. Always check electric leads are in good condition and make sure correct fuses are used.

“FIRE KILLS”, if a fire starts use your escape route then phone the fire service when you are out. Closing doors helps contain fire. Smoke alarms are very important, always check your batteries and that the alarms are sited in the right places. You can arrange a free Home Fire Safety Check and have smoke alarms fitted anytime of the year by phoning 0191 332 4222 or visiting www.ddfire.gov.uk
