friends, Derwentside Round Table and Stanley Lions to help. If only England could have done the same.

Glenn Coxon, as well as bringing several classic cars and vans on display in the main street, held the Carnival together as compere and entertainer, helping to enhance the atmosphere for the whole afternoon.

And yes, the sun did come out at about 3.30 pm as people were beginning to drift away.

IT'S ALL ABOUT PEOPLE

CALLING ALL BUSINESSES – WE NEED YOUR SUPPORT FOR LANCHESTER VILLAGE GREEN

Lanchester Parish Council has been working on the proposals for improvements to the village green for a period of time and work has included the involvement of the community on suggestions for the improvements.

Proposals include the introduction of a recreational path along the side of the burn on the underused stretch of the village green. This rather sinuous path approximately 130m long would link the existing unused seats on the green and would connect to

paths at the top and bottom thereby creating a circular path around the village. The path which would be wheelchair accessible would allow people easier access along the whole of the green and it is hoped that it would become a much loved short walk by all members of the community.

Other developments include surface improvements to an area beside the church, the installation of a Parish Council information board on the main green and the installation of a circular tree seat on the

main green to encourage people to sit and enjoy the most beautiful surroundings.

Also included in the development are some necessary tree works to address low limbs' problems and trees in poor condition.

The Parish Council has applied for a grant to help towards the costs of this project and has been offered a grant of up to £12,000 from CDENT (County Durham Environmental Trust). However one of the conditions of the grant is that a 10% contribution is

needed from a third party to be able to draw down the grant money. It is therefore necessary to attract £1200 in third party monies to allow the grant to be used.

Are there any businesses who would be interested in contributing to this amount in part or full to allow this exciting project to go ahead? This is your chance to be involved in a key community project in the heart of Lanchester.

LAUNCH OF LOCALITY MAP

A ewe and her two lambs, three very well turned out ponies and riders, as well as a tractor, all under the trees on the Green, added a very rural air to the village on Saturday, 29th May. Passers-by and shoppers swelled the crowd, to about 70 people, attending the launch of the Locality Map, which commenced at 11 am in bright, sunny weather. The Launch began with a speech by Parish Council Chair, Ossie Johnson, who welcomed special guests and all those who had come along to witness this important occasion. The Locality Map, which in reality is a large booklet, is the third document produced by the Parish Council in conjunction with consultants and the Partnership and which deals with the rural community of the Parish. Cllr Johnson thanked those involved, in particular Cllr Keith Harrison and his family who had supported him during the three years of hard work putting the Map together. He also thanked Cllr Mike Wardle who had worked tirelessly to produce funding of £73,000 to pay for a Development Worker to work in the Parish during the next 18 months. Originally it was hoped

that Matt Baker, Presenter of BBC's Country File, would attend the Launch. However, due to work commitments he was unable to do so but his mother, Mrs Janice Baker, who farms just outside the Parish and is County Organiser for the Young Farmers, came in his stead. She, too, thanked those who had helped produce the Map for their dedication and hard work and stressed its importance to the agriculture, conservation and wildlife of the Community and the need to safeguard these for future generations. Matt Baker had sent a letter wishing the Project well and expressing the same sentiments as his mother, then John Gall, a local landowner and President of the History Society, spoke about the history of the local area, mentioning its recovery from coal mining, the former large estates and how the needs of the area have changed since the Romans and will continue to change. He also thanked Steve Scotton for his advice with regard to grants, planning and other aspects of the Map, finishing by saying that the Project would enable people to live happier, better and fuller lives.


After presenting Mrs Baker, Mr Gall and Mr Scotton with a token of appreciation, Cllr Johnson invited everyone to move to Park House, where a delicious spread was laid out. Mrs Harrison, wife of Cllr Harrison, had produced mouth-watering cakes and scones and there were

savouries and beverages too. A large number of people enjoyed these and lively conversation as well as interesting displays produced by the Friends of the Fort, the Partnership, the Wildlife Group (more livestock in the form of tadpoles and other examples of pond life) and a slide show of

the village. Altogether the occasion was very enjoyable with a warm friendly atmosphere and the feeling that this was the start, rather than the completion, of the Map. A statement from Matt Baker apologising for not being able to attend was read out by Janice Baker at the launch event.

FLOOD WARDEN SCHEME

The County Durham and Darlington Civil Contingencies Unit together with the Environment Agency have held a number of meetings in Lanchester to set up a Flood Warden Scheme. The Scheme has the support of the County Council and the Parish Council and will hopefully be going live very shortly. Flood Wardens are simply people who have an interest in their

community and a knowledge of the people. They help to reduce the impact of flooding by reporting problems such as blocked drains and culverts and in the event of a flood situation would be activated to alert residents in the village. One of the most damaging things about flooding is the psychological impact on people who are affected and Flood Wardens help with

reassurance and support. One of the first tasks for the Wardens would be to put together a very simple Flood Plan for their village to cover some of the risk areas and how the village might effectively respond. LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 8.6.2010

Cllr Johnson welcomed to the meeting David Battensby (Durham CC), Andy Coulthard (Area Action Partnership) and Maxine Stubbs (Durham Police) who had come to discuss proposals for the **Gateway Scheme** in the Parish. This scheme aims to restrict the speed of motorists entering a restricted speed zone. The measures taken are decided in consultation with the public, the Parish Councils and the above three bodies. Much discussion took place between members and the visitors, who had looked at the main entrances into the village, Durham Road, the A691 from Consett, Cadger Bank, Maiden Law Bank, Newbiggen Lane, Ford Road and Peth Bank. Various

suggestions were made, such as dragons' teeth and other markings on the road, bollards and other means of 'narrowing' the appearance of the road, to slow down motorists and make them aware that they were approaching the village. It was pointed out that as this is a country village, obtrusive markings and signs would be out of place and may frighten horses being ridden along the roads. It was stressed by Mr Battensby and Ms Stubbs that this is to be a community project and one of the methods of making the motorists aware of their speed is the use of portable speed monitors which are used by volunteers in conjunction with the

Police to record a vehicle's speed. If a driver is exceeding the limit, a warning is given and records kept. It was agreed that a working party should be set up to work with the Authorities.

Speed Visors. Mr Battensby informed members that the use of permanent speed visors in the County is to be phased out as it is believed that after a while they become ineffective and that portable speed monitors are to be used in the future.

Police Report: There had been no burglaries during the period 1st to 31st May, no bogus callers and no alcohol seizures. However, there were 5 reports of vehicle nuisance and 12 reports of rowdy/inconsiderate

behaviour. There were also 3 reports of criminal damage and 4 thefts.

Current Community Operations are Operation Weyhill which is a joint police, police dog and HMRC operation relating to possible substance misuse/possible illicit alcohol being sold in pubs and clubs and Operation Livorno which is tackling street drinking through all wards in the Consett area. Police Traffic Management attended Front Street, Lanchester, and other areas on 13th May and performed a site survey regarding parking complaints; warning notices have been sent where necessary. Two PCSOs have been appointed to specifically deal with Community Safety issues such as Farmwatch and Hate Crimes.

Members were dismayed to learn that the police will now only attend Parish Council meetings at the request of the Chair for specific reasons; police reports will be emailed to the Clerk in advance of the meeting. It was agreed that a PCSO should be requested to attend the meetings bi-monthly as the relationship between the Police and the Community was important and, in fact, this is why the PCSOs had been appointed.

Correspondence: Durham County Council Parish and Town Councils Conference. Cllr Burton agreed to attend. Request from resident to park on land; it was agreed that this annual agreement should be

renewed subject to the same criteria. LINK County Durham newsletter. The Clerk stated that this was available in the Office. Durham County Council Development Plan. As the consultation process begins on 11th June and the document is 130 pages, it was agreed that this would be sent electronically to members before discussion at the next Parish Council Meeting and that other Parish Councils be asked to attend. It was agreed that the Lanchester Partnership should be invited to join the Planning Sub-Committee in discussing this document; the document appears to contain very little regarding the needs of West Durham. North Pennines AONB Partnership - Building Design Guide and Planning Guidelines consultation. Again it was agreed that the document should be sent electronically and that the matter put on the agenda of the next Planning Meeting.

Area Action Partnership (AAP) Parish Councils Committee (PCC). Cllr Burton urged Members to attend the AAP's Forum which could be held the following evening at 6 pm in the EP School hall, when the AAP would decide on things to be done and look at the Working Groups, what they had achieved and their future within the AAP. There was also a report from the PCC on the Neighbourhood Warden Scheme which has been set up in East Durham,

Gardening in July

The four weeks from middle of June to middle of July are my favourite of the year as it's light early in the morning and still light at 10.00 pm. It's not just the flowers, soft fruits and vegetables that are growing and doing well this month, weeds are popping up everywhere too. So, keep on top of your tasks and you will enjoy all of your hard work of sowing and planting of the previous two months even more. Cut off faded flower heads on your lupins, delphiniums and roses which will encourage further flower heads later in the summer and spend time tidying bedding, pulling up weeds, keeping your hedges in trim and giving your pots and plants a welcome drink as and when it becomes necessary.

Borders

Roses were voted last year the gardener's favourite summer plant suggesting that both their scent and long flowering period give them this position. So, apart from weeding rose beds and dead heading, give your roses a mid-summer feed this month (or even an extra mulch) and, if we

have a hot, dry spell, they will appreciate a thorough soaking once or twice a week. Sweet peas were voted the second favourite and these can also be kept flowering for a long period so long as you keep picking the blooms and have a good watering regime. At the height of summer your patio pots and hanging baskets will be reaching their peak. A high potash fertiliser (like tomato fertiliser) will help them to maintain their peak. It's not too late to sow biennials like Bellis (Double Daisy), wallflower and viola for flowering next spring so long as you do it early in the month. It is a good time to take cuttings of fuchsias and zonal pelargoniums which root readily now: it gives them time to develop good root systems before over-wintering in a frost free environment. I particularly like to train fuchsia cuttings into standards for next year by pinching out the side shoots when they appear so as to make tall plants.

Vegetable Plot July is a good time for harvesting both fruit and vegetables as they

become available. It is the time to pick a final crop of rhubarb and give the plants a liquid feed. Most cane fruits including summer raspberries, loganberries and blackberries will now have vigorous new canes growing which will bear next year's fruit so tie these to their supports. Train, feed and water your tomato plants regularly. Harvest broad beans whilst they are still young and the skins are soft and pinch out the growing tips of runner beans to stop them when they reach the top of their supports. Finally, use fine netting to cover soft fruit (currants, gooseberries and strawberries) to keep the birds off, and brassicas (cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli) to keep cabbage white butterflies away.

General

In July, your watering schedule must continue and water early or late to avoid sun scorch. Feed your house plants and orchids every week and water newly planted trees shrubs and perennials until they are well established. Cut your lawns as necessary not forgetting to trim the edges.

LANCHESTER VILLAGE LINK BUS SERVICE


The Village Link bus service helps members of the public, including those who are elderly or infirm, get around the village. It runs from Monday to Friday (except Bank Holidays) from 9.40 am until 1.40 pm. It picks up and sets down passengers at any safe point along the line of route except on Lanchester Front Street and Durham Road where it uses the normal bus stops.

It makes 8 runs a day. 6 of these are funded by voluntary contributions and commissioned by the Lanchester Partnership. 2 are funded and commissioned by the County Council. All are operated by Prophet Private Hire.

The basic fare is 60p, but usual concessions apply.


