Dear Village Voice

I have read with interest the letters concerning the changes in bus schedules. As a recent bus pass holder I have made extensive use of buses to Consett, Durham, Stanley and Newcastle. I think that the service we have in Lanchester is excellent with buses every half hour to these places. I accept that no Sunday service may have repercussions for some people, as may the lack of services after 9 pm from Durham Monday to Saturday. However I think that this is a small price to pay, given the effects of some of the cuts at the moment. Lanchester must be one of the most affluent communities in County Durham, there is no

shortage of cars about! My experience has been that the number getting on the buses here is much lower than other villages. I have lived in Lanchester for nearly 40 years and whenever I have needed help there have always been neighbours and friends to help, including offering lifts. Maybe it is time now to give something back for those of us who are fortunate enough to have our own transport. My suggestion would be a rota of volunteers on call for anyone who urgently needs a lift at the times when there are no buses available, eg hospital visiting on a Sunday. We could provide available dates and times on a monthly basis together with contact numbers. These could be published in the Voice. I really don't know how this could be best organised and by whom but I feel strongly that if it is a real problem then as a community we should be helping those who are genuinely adversely affected.

COUNTY COUNCIL EYES HOUSING (PART 2)

In last month's Village Voice on Page 7 we informed you that the County Council had identified three sites in Lanchester for possible house building and said that the Partnership would be pleased to have your views. A lot of you then told the Partnership that you felt strongly about the proposals.

Accordingly, the Partnership is going to arrange a public meeting, to which the county planners and our councillors will be invited. This meeting will be arranged after the summer holidays. The meeting will discuss:

- (i) The possibility of building on these sites; and
 - (ii) The Village Development Limit.
- There will be more information provided in next month's Village Voice.

YOUR VIEWS ON NHS STROKE SERVICES

A consultation on hyperacute stroke care for people in County Durham and Darlington was launched on 20th June and will run until 11th September 2011.

NHS County Durham and Darlington is proposing that hyperacute stroke services are consolidated on one site. At the moment, the service is provided at the University Hospital of North Durham and Darlington Memorial Hospital by County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust, which runs both hospitals during normal working hours. The two sites work on an alternating week rota to provide out of hours cover.

Hyperacute services are one of the most critical components of stroke care that patients need when they are at their most seriously ill. National standards say that these services should be available 24-hours-a-day, seven days a week, with patients being directly admitted

to a stroke unit where there is access to specialist stroke consultants and where brain imaging and clot-busting drugs are readily available.

Doctors, nurse and managers in County Durham have analysed various care options and believe that providing hyperacute services over the two hospital sites is not sustainable for the future. However we were able to provide beautiful sunshine to send him off to what we all hope will be a long and very happy retirement with his wife Sheila.

In his last Sunday sermon as our vicar, Peter made several references to his happiness living in the community of Lanchester and indeed said he felt privileged to have lived here among us. He would take with him so many happy memories, when he leaves to live in Whickham.


Those of us who knew Peter well are very accustomed to his infectious wit and sense of humour. He can provide a joke for any occasion

 Their first booklet was published in 2007 and was called 'Longovicium: Lanchester's Roman Fort'
 Since then a great deal of work has been done to produce their second book about the legendary Roman Fort off Cadger Bank. Geophysical surveys have been made of several areas alongside Dere Street to the north, east and south east of the fort. Dere Street was a Roman road between York and Scotland, passing through Lanchester. It still exists in the form of the route of many major roads, including parts of

the A1 and A68. The findings from the surveys revealed an extensive civilian settlement with buildings on regular sized plots, ditched enclosures and secondary streets and lanes. The whole project is supported by the National Lottery through the Heritage Lottery Fund and by Durham County Council. It is all very exciting and 'The Friends of Longovicium' are very enthusiastic about the project. This was obvious in the various displays they had set up and there were some very interesting Roman artefacts, particularly on Mr Martin Hutchinson's

tables. He has painstakingly made many beautiful replicas of Roman artefacts and enjoys giving information about them. He and daughter Gina were dressed in authentic Roman costume for the occasion and looked very impressive. There was also a range of activities for children, a Powerpoint presentation on Dere Street, and an illustrated talk by Rodney Hawkins. Refreshments were available but not the usual tea or coffee and biscuits. Romans did not drink coffee or tea and so various soft drinks were provided which contained ingredients used by the Romans. The snacks also had been specially made by the 'Friends' and were authentic of Roman times. Altogether it was a very interesting and friendly morning, very much enjoyed by all the people

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Many of you have contacted me over the last few weeks regarding the disgraceful phone hacking scandal, the investigation by the Metropolitan police and the proposed B Sky B takeover. I am sure that like me many of you have struggled to comprehend the things that we are being told. What started out as reports of phone hacking by journalists of politicians and celebrities has escalated to unbelievable heights with allegations about listening into and deleting messages from the mobile phone of a murdered child, families of soldiers killed overseas serving this country and terrified messages left by families on the answer phones of victims of terrorism. A full judged

inquiry into the phone hacking scandal will now be carried out and Rupert Murdoch has withdrawn his bid for B Sky B. This is a victory for the decent people up and down the country who have been appalled by the revelations of the phone hacking scandal and the failure of those in charge at the time to take responsibility.

On another issue more closely related to our village, last week in Parliament MPs voted to get rid of the Agricultural Wages Board (AWB). I voted against. The AWB is a small body that was set up in 1948, costs the Government nothing and sets wages and conditions for 140,000 agricultural workers in England, around 3,360 of whom are employed in the North

East and 260 in North West Durham, including those who work on the farms in and around Lanchester. Agricultural workers are amongst the lowest paid workers and the abolition of the AWB will lead to lower wages in the countryside, and a worse deal for farm workers. That is why I voted to keep the AWB and support a fair deal for those who work in the countryside, and will continue to campaign on this in the near future.

GATEWAY PROJECT COMES TO MAIDEN LAW

The Highways Department has produced an initial design and it's now time to consult with residents in the Greencroft Parish area. The Parish Council is inviting residents in this parish area to

project's aim is to define the entrances and exits to the village so that drivers are made aware they are entering a residential area. The Parish Council is keen for everyone in the Parish to have the chance to look at the plan and to have their say on what happens next. There

LANCHESTER REMINDS ME OF THE BURMESE JUNGLE SAYS VISITOR!

On Tuesday 21st June, twelve members from the Lanchester Methodist Church attended a talk at Emmanuel College from Sasa, an inspirational young Burmese doctor.

Sasa is friends with Inga Andrew, who grew up in Lanchester and who met Sasa in Armenia when he was a medical student and she was helping to run a camp for Armenian medical students.

Sasa has visited Lanchester on two

previous occasions and says that he loves the village, saying it reminds him of his own village in the Burmese jungle! He reminds Inga of how fortunate she is to be able to come back to Lanchester and to call it home.

Sasa grew up in the Chin state in Burma. At the age of thirteen, he left his village and went to Yangon, the capital, to study. Having finished his high school education he returned to his home

village where he became a volunteer teacher at the local school. During this time he witnessed first hand the suffering of the sick, elderly and the mothers-to-be who had minimal access to medical support. This made him resolve to study medicine and come back to ensure his people would not continue to suffer in this way.

In 1999 the villagers all contributed to sending Sasa to India to study

science before studying medicine to be a doctor in Armenia. Having completed his degree in 2009, Sasa returned to the border region with the intention of establishing a community-wide primary health care system in rural communities in the India/Burma border. He began this work by establishing a training centre for some of the community health care workers, now known as

"Place of Health and Hope". His priorities are local village based interventions to improve health and well-being and reduce the spread of disease. March 2011 saw three hundred and seventeen community health workers complete their training under Sasa's guidance.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 12TH JULY 2011

Public Participation.

Two residents of Ford Road area attended the meeting to express concern about the speed of traffic along Ford Road and the large number of enormous lorries which do not slow down even through the narrow part of the road. In particular they mention the Lanchester Dairies tankers. This problem is particularly bad for the elderly and people with young children and babies in buggies. Chairman Ossie Johnson assured the residents of the Parish Council's support and it was suggested that they attend the next PACT meeting to discuss the problems there, with the Police. They agreed to do this and the Lead Officer is to write a polite letter to Lanchester Dairies outlining the problem.

Neighbourhood Wards Report.

This report covers Consett North area and the Lanchester section reported a small operation being conducted by PCSO Gray regarding untaxed vehicles and high visibility patrols along Front Street.

St Bede's School Head Teacher Maria Matthews

and Beth Meggeson, Extended Services Co-ordinator, attended the meeting. They are very keen to involve the students from the school with the village community and activities. They are raising money to improve sports facilities at the school and when completed these will be available for use by village residents during school holidays and at weekends. Parish Council members expressed their appreciation and delight at this offer. The students are already involved in the Parish Council's website design and with the AAP, including the use of the speed monitors in the village. They have a Junior PACT organisation and it was agreed that some students attend the next Parish Council meeting in September. The students involved with the Gateway scheme went on to enter a national Road Safety competition and gained 2nd place. It was suggested that Sue Charlton should go to the school to develop projects relating to the Locality Map with students and this was readily agreed.

Correspondence. Details of a workshop to be held by Durham Police Authority, 'Working together to address changes to Policing in County Durham and Darlington' were received.

A letter from Jill Gladstone congratulating and thanking the Parish Council for the village green improvements was also received.

Kitswell Football Field. It was agreed that the Junior and Senior Football teams be allowed to use the field again for the coming season. A further request from a private group for the use of the field at certain times for 'Group exercise sessions' was also considered. It was agreed that these be allowed and that the Lead Officer should work out how much should be charged; this money would be used for donations by the Parish Council.

Help for Heroes. An invitation for an event at Ramside Hall was received.

Durham County Council. A review of polling districts and polling places. This is held every four years and the Parish Council is satisfied with

the present arrangements for the Parish but some rural communities would be best served by postal votes

NHS County Durham and Darlington - Hyperacute Stroke Services public consultation. Cllr Jackson agreed to respond to this consultation which proposes to consolidate the service in Durham in order to provide a better service.

Go North East. A letter was received with regard to the reduction in services. The reply gave an explanation of why these evening and Sunday services had been removed, namely due to lack of subsidy by the County Council.

Area Action Partnership/Parish Councils Committee. Cllr Burton reported on projects which have affected the village, such as Gateway/road safety/Highways/Speedwatch, Youth support and engaging young people, the railway paths and the opening of a Credit Bank in the Community Centre.

Housing in Lanchester/County Durham Plan. Concern was shown with regard to plots of land identified by current owners as they are

outside the development limits as outlined in the Village Design Statement; it was agreed that a letter should be sent to Durham County Council drawing their attention to this.

Donation. A request had been received from a young person in the Parish who had undertaken a 200-mile bike ride to raise money for Willow Burn Hospice asking for a donation. The Chairman suggested £50 and this was agreed.

Kitswell Park - Annual Play Inspection. This was received.

County Durham and Cleveland County Training Partnership - training event. Details were given to Members.

Maintenance Progress Report. The Lead Officer was asked to write to David Maddox, the village Handyman, to thank him for the excellent job he has done in keeping the village clean and tidy.

Annual Return 2010/11, Financial Information, Accounts for Payment. These were all accepted.

Date of Next Meeting. Tuesday, 13th September, 2011, at 7.15 pm in the Conference Room, Park House, Lanchester.

POLICE REPORT

Number of calls 66, from 25th May to 16th June Burglaries 2 (empty school premises and farmyard), anti-social behaviour 5, thefts of/from motor vehicles/gardens 2 (child's bike and windscreen wipers stolen from parked car). A Community Speed Watch took place outside St Bede's School on 14/06/11. 2 pupils assisted with tally. Total vehicles - 210, less than 40mph - 204, 41mph to 42mph - 4, 43mph to 45mph - 2,

therefore no warning letters issued. Police attended the Lions Carnival but no problems. Police will attend the Agricultural Show on Sunday 3rd July to provide a high visible presence and hand out information packs. Road markings have been placed along the 40mph stretch of the A691 at entry points. A traffic survey is being carried out at Cadger Bank at the request of a resident.

FLOOD PREVENTION

If ever your property floods please ring the Council Highways Action Line on 0191 370 6000 to report it. That is the clear message that emerged from a meeting that the Lanchester Partnership, held with the County Council. Unless the Council have 3 incidents of property flooding reported in a 2-year period they will not do repairs. So if you don't report any incidents they will not

make any improvements. Following the flooding in June 2003 the Council has been regularly inspecting the drains for which it is responsible. We understand that Northumbrian Water were doing the same, but it appears that they have reverted to their pre-2003 system of not inspecting or doing anything until something goes wrong. It is not clear whether they also plan to pay the costs of those whose properties are flooded

when it does. If you would like to write to Northumbrian Water their address is: Customer Centre, PO Box 200, Durham, DH1 9WG. The Environment Agency is responsible for Smallhope Burn. It has been carrying out detailed studies and it is reviewing its work. If you would like to be a flood warden please contact Karen Gibson, the Community Flood Engagement Officer, on 01388 824021.

Gardening in August

August is a time that revolves around holidays: fine and warm weather and visits to the beach and countryside. After all the hard work of spring and early summer we can go on holiday without worrying so long as there is a helpful neighbour to water our vegetables and containers. If you are not going away you can offer to do this task for your neighbour.

Borders

If you have returned from holiday to find that your baskets and pots look dry, straggly and past their best, think about starting afresh with some autumn and winter plants like pansy, viola and primula. The important jobs for this month include: pruning summer-

flowering shrubs over 3 years old as they finish flowering; removing the faded flowers of annuals and late-flowering plants like dahlias to encourage further flowering; giving topiary plants like buxus a trim to keep them in shape; pinching out the growing tips of fuchsia to increase the number of shoots that can be used for cuttings; and, after cutting back the stems of perennials, giving them a liquid feed.

Vegetable Plot

August is a good time to harvest shallots and onions. Runner beans tend to be my easiest crop but remember to keep picking both these and courgettes and water them both every few days to keep them fruiting. Any outdoor tomatoes need to

be stopped by snipping off the tops once they have developed three or four trusses. This can be done by making a cut in the stem about two leaves above the uppermost truss. Potatoes of second cropping varieties like Carlingford or Charlotte, planted now in large pots or bags (which are still on sale in DIY stores) can be put in a cold greenhouse in October and provide a harvest for Christmas.

General

This month continue to mow your lawn(s) and compost all of the clippings remembering that your compost heap is the 'engine' of your garden. Thinking ahead you need to order your spring bulbs such as tulips and daffodils for planting in the autumn.

LIVING WATERWAYS

Lanchester EP School welcomed Michael Rogers, Durham Wildlife Trust, and Sue Charlton, Development Officer for the Parish Council into the school for their Creativity Week. The purpose was to raise awareness of local rivers and ponds and the wildlife in them. The funding was provided jointly by the aforementioned 'Trust' and the 'Parish'.

This was a whole school project so the teaching in the nature reserve on site had to be done in small year groups which took a week. Three ponds were created by digging holes in the ground and inserting firm plastic liners as the clay soil was unsuitable for natural ponds. Excited children enjoyed wearing gardening

gloves, picking up spades and trowels and making sure the ponds were level. When finished the pond would be filled with aquatic plants and the wildlife would then form naturally over time. Many frogs had already been seen in the reserve as if waiting for the opportunity for a new home.

Children were involved in a question and answer session with Sue Charlton and Michael Rogers and seemed to have considerable knowledge. Questionnaires were given out at the end of the project to complete a survey of garden ponds and those in the vicinity of the homes of the children. Further information about this project appears below.

THE LANCHESTER GARDEN POND SURVEY 2011

After all the wonderful work the EP school children have done to create four brand new ponds in their school woodland, we would like to find out where all the other ponds are. Ponds are a valuable home for all sorts of wildlife including very rare animals such as the great crested newt. As part of Lanchester Parish Councils' Lanchester locality Map Project we are trying to find out where all the ponds are in the Parish, including garden ponds. This information can be very valuable and can help us plan where new ponds should be created to help our wildlife thrive in the countryside.

To take part in the survey you can download a survey form from the Lanchester Parish Council website (www.lanchesterparish.info) and follow the links for the Locality Map

Project, Get Involved section. Alternatively you can give Sue a ring on 07585 001 355 and a copy will be posted out to you. Forms will also be available to pick up from the Community Centre, Library and Lanchester Nurseries.

Any information you can supply would be appreciated even if it is just the location of a pond, but if you would like to complete the whole form, that would be great and Pond Conservation have some very useful information on their website on how to pond dip safely www.pondconservation.org.uk/bigponddip. Pond conservation has also kindly allowed us to adapt their big pond dip form for our survey and we will be letting them know our results to fit in with their national survey on ponds.


