LANCHESTER TO LOSE SUNDAY AND LATE EVENING BUSES

Following funding cuts by Durham County Council, Lanchester will be cut off from public transport on Sundays from 29th May 2011. Late evening services on Monday to Saturday have also been cut. Durham County Council has produced a leaflet which claims to reassure customers across the county. It says that customers will see little or no change to service. However, Lanchester does appear to have been unfairly treated; Langley Park for example retains its Sunday service to Durham. The Village Voice has received several letters and emails from concerned residents about these changes (see the correspondence on page 2). If you want to check the services that are planned to close see the Durham County website at www.durham.gov.uk and follow the links to 'transport' and 'bus service changes'.

I wonder if Village Voice readers are aware, that following withdrawal of funding from Durham County Council, GoNorthEast are reducing the service on 15/15A Durham to Consett route.

From 29th May 2011 there will be NO bus service between Consett and Durham on Sundays and Bank Holidays.

In addition, the last buses on this route, on weekdays and Saturdays, will leave Durham at 21.05 for Consett, and will leave Consett at 20.27 for Durham.

I feel these changes in a vital public service have not been widely publicised.

Helen Griffiths has also written by email to voice her concerns. She quotes the services above but adds that the 130 service from Stanley will also be cut on Sunday and the last bus Monday-Saturday will leave Stanley at 20.34 instead of 23.34.

'These cuts hurt Lancastrians a lot more than people from nearby; Stanley and Langley Park will still have evening services to and from Durham. It will disproportionately hurt the poor, elderly and disabled in Lanchester, who often can't drive for medical or financial reasons.'

Anyone who doesn't drive and works on Sunday or evenings will have to give up their job or use taxis. Jobs that require Sunday and/or evening work are often low-paid. Anyone who doesn't drive will not be able to visit friends or relatives on a Sunday, adding to the isolation that many elderly and disabled people already face.'

Helen has written to councillors with her objections.

Roy Quinlan of Leehill Court is also very concerned. Below is a summary of an email he sent to GoNorthEast which he also sent to The Village Voice.

'The cuts in funding will see no Sunday service for the 15 Consett to Durham effective 29th May. I am not aware of any consultation prior to this being actioned and I also notice that of all the changes the most drastic appear to affect the 15 service. I suggest the impact of removing this on a Sunday has not been assessed properly.'

The people of Lanchester have been discriminated against at a time when there should be an increase in transport services to encourage the collective conservation of our energy resources.

Therefore I would like to know:

- How the decision to cut evening and Sunday services was made?

- What public consultation was undertaken before the decision was made?'

Roy received the following reply from Go North East:

'Unfortunately service 15, evening and Sunday journeys were paid for by Durham County Council, so were only operated by Go North East under contract. There was no direct consultation on these cuts by Durham County Council other than press releases from them to advise bus users of government cutbacks. It is difficult to compare this service with high frequency commercial services, where no funding is required due to high usage.'

I can understand why you feel that Lanchester has been discriminated against by DCC and as such, I do suggest that you raise this with your local councillor.'

LANCESTER PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS 10.05.11

Annual Meeting

All members were re-elected for the coming year.

Ordinary Meeting

Chairman Cllr Ossie Johnson welcomed members of the public and Inspector Dave Turner and moved on to a later item of the Agenda, namely **Speed Limit on the A691 at St Bede's School** about which those residents at the meeting were very concerned. Claire Lamb read out a letter to the Highways Authority to have the speed limit on the stretch of road outside the school reduced to 30 mph and requested the support of the Parish Council. A petition signed by 1,000 people and letters of support from St Bede's and the RC Primary School were also presented. The Lead Officer read out letters from the Police and the Highways Authority explaining why the speed limit on this section of the road was 40mph; the main reason being that it did not meet the criteria for a 30mph limit. A great deal of discussion and suggestions ensued and it was agreed that this speed limit would be beneficial and that the Council should support the request to Durham County Council. Inspector Turner also agreed to give his support and suggested that the speed limit should be 30mph throughout the whole village section of the A691.

Police Report. Inspector Turner gave his monthly report on crime statistics in the Parish (see separate report below), saying that victim satisfaction in his Consett area was the highest in the County at 90%. He also stated that as scrap metal prices are very high, the stealing of metal is on the rise and

that everyone should be on their guard and watch out for anything suspicious, letting the Police know if they suspect anything. Another prolific crime in the area is that of motor insurance claims resulting from faked road traffic accidents. However, Inspector Turner said a large number of arrests are imminent.

Businesses in Lanchester. Concern was raised over the number of unoccupied business premises in the village and it was agreed that a letter would be sent to the owner of what had been the Flower Shop to see if the empty premises could be made to look more attractive.

Correspondence. Letters of thanks from All Saints Catholic Primary School and Lanchester Lawn Tennis Club for donations and the EP Primary School for the use of the village green for the maypole dancing were read.

Correspondence with residents regarding speeding traffic on Cadger Bank was considered, together with the Lead Officer's reply and her letter to the Highways Authority asking them to get in touch directly with the residents concerned.

A letter from a resident about the Go North East bus service was discussed and it was agreed that a letter of support should be sent.

Local Councillor Shadowing Award scheme - this letter was received.

North Pennines AONB. The Spring and Summer newsletter was received. Finchale Training College - an update on the fitness room renovation was received following the Parish Council's donation.

Butterwick House Children's Hospice - an invitation to the Open Day on Wed 15th June was received.

Area Action Partnership/Parish Council's Committee. Cllr Burton reported that the last meeting had been an enquiry into the progress of the AAP. Praise had been given to the Parish Council's Committee.

Lynwood House - Public Consultation Event. Members were informed of the recent public event and given details of the proposals for the site. At present the interested parties are in negotiation with the County Council to present a business plan and if the scheme progresses further a consultation with residents and highway users will follow.

Hanging Baskets. It was agreed to go ahead with the provision and watering of the baskets; this year the cost will be less because there are no baskets to buy.

Fenhall Banner. The banner is in fairly good condition and Cllrs Johnson and Burton, together with Mike Gladstone of Lanchester Partnership had been to see it at Redhills. The General Secretary of Durham Miners' Association had agreed that the Parish Council should become custodians of the banner and that it will probably be displayed in the Parish Church or in rotation in all three churches. It was agreed that it should be insured and that a Committee of residents be formed to have the banner conserved and a display case bought.

Internal Audit 2010/2011. The Auditors report for the Financial Year ended 31st March 2011 was approved by

Members who wholeheartedly agreed with the Auditor's commendation for the professional manner in which the affairs of the Council have been managed by the Lead Officer and the way in which the records were kept and produced for the audit.

Chairperson's Announcement. A provisional date for the launch of the Village Green Project has been set for Thursday 9th June at 2 pm. Posters will be displayed in the village beforehand and a plaque has been bought to affix to one of the seats.

Questions from Members. Cllr Myers said he had been contacted by a resident with a request for a litter bin and dog bin between Alderdene and Newbiggen Lane. Cllr Harrison asked if a litter bin could be put in Kitswell Park and about the cutting of the verges in the roads around the village as the grass is now becoming dangerously long, causing a hazard to motorists.

Date of Next Meeting. This will take place on Tuesday 14th June 2011 at 7.15 pm in the Conference Room, Park House, Lanchester. It is hoped that the Neighbourhood Warden and the Flood Warden will be present.

Planning Committee held on 12.04.11

The following planning applications have been **approved** by Durham County Council:

* Conservatory to rear at Foxhills Crescent

* Change of use from Police Station to wedding car hire business and extension of existing garage and creation of pitched roof at former Police Station, Millfield.

* Siting of temporary static caravan for agricultural purposes (retrospective) on land to the west of West Newbiggin Farm, Newbiggen Lane.

* Replacement of windows in 'house' section and in part of the 'school' section of Lanchester Community Centre, Newbiggen Lane.

Planning applications: Erection of farm workers dwelling (resubmission) at Greenwell Farm, Lanchester.

Members discussed the resubmitted application and considered that the original concerns and objections still remained. Copies of the Minutes of all Parish Council and Planning meetings are available in the library and at the website www.lanchesterparish.info.

LANCESTER PARTNERSHIP ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON 14.05.11

This was held in the Lanchester Catholic Church Parish Centre and was attended by about 30 members. Chairman Mike Gladstone welcomed those present and received the Trustees' Report and Financial Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2011. These were accepted.

Trustee John Gray, who had been a Member from the very beginning of the Partnership and a former Treasurer, has resigned. Mike thanked him, in his absence, for all the help and support he had given. The re-election of Trustees Jill Gladstone and Brian Masterman, who resigned by rotation, was considered. Mike paid tribute to their professional expertise and they were unanimously re-elected. A progress report was given by the leaders of the various working groups. Jill Gladstone, on behalf of the **Working with Young People** Group, said the Youth Club had had a good year, continuing purposefully and cheerfully, averaging around 23 young people each week, 9 of whom were girls. A display mounted in the hall showed the various activities, both indoor and outdoor, in which they were able to participate. PCSO Vanessa Gray sometimes joined in the activities to let the youngsters know she is a friend. Four boys are doing the Duke of Edinburgh Award and some of the girls are doing street dancing. A grant from the AAP will enable them to keep going for another three years. Unfortunately, due to the uncertainties about the future of the library, the proposed internet cafe has not materialised. Jill paid tribute to Simon Kenney

and Shane Marsh who assist her at the club and also thanked daughter Sally, husband Mike and Colm Doyle for their help. Maureen Loy gave the report of the **Transport Group**. The highlight of the year had been the 10th Anniversary Celebration of the Village Link Bus which had been very successful. She said it is always a struggle to raise the money but somehow they always manage to reach the target. She thanked Karen Bravington who works ceaselessly for this, as well as the users and Councils who also contribute. The AAP has taken on the road safety and speeding problem and the new Gateway scheme for marking the seven roads entering the village with a view to slowing down traffic will commence soon. Speedwatch, where members of the public assist the police, will start again soon. There is concern at the reduction in public transport on Sundays and evenings.

Sonny Shepherd from the Green Group began by giving the report prepared by Carolyn Wardle about the Paraiso Club. The new MPLC licence, combined with the large, drop-down screen and new sound system has transformed the viewing experience for those members attending the 'social' in the Community Centre where £2.50 entrance fee gives refreshments, a raffle ticket and the chance to see a film. (Membership costs £5 a year for 8 or 9 monthly films). There is now a wider choice of films and members are asked to suggest films. Average attendance is increasing and is about 30.

Sonny thanked the Trustees for accommodating the work of **Green Group**. It has been a positive year, raising awareness with meetings and talks. The Energy Fair, organised by Steve Bailey and opened by MP Pat Glass, was very successful, being attended by over 150 people. The Energy Group is now looking at ways to produce energy. Dora's Wood 10th

Anniversary celebrations went well and the Parish was given 420 trees to plant in the Parish. Some have been planted and the rest are being nursed by Paul and Sonny until later. The Litter Pick was a great Community Event - over one and a half lorry loads of rubbish were collected. The village is now looking better, but the main problem is in the lanes approaching the village as people throw rubbish out of their cars. Sonny thanked Jill Gladstone and her team of organisers.

Kate Wicks has sold over 100 cotton bags with the village green logo on them; profits go to the group. The Orchard Scheme - 25 households have signed up. For £10 a year, members put in some effort and are then able to share the fruit. Sonny said there is still a lot to do and thanked Mike Gladstone for his advice. Rob Latham has taken over the **Planning and Development Group**. He and some of the Trustees and Parish Council had gone through the County Durham Plan and submitted 7 pages of

comment. Another County Council document is now being monitored. The Partnership's views on 50 planning applications had been given. Most had been supported, some had required asking for appropriate conditions and occasionally it was felt necessary to ask for the application to be turned down. On the whole, 80% of applications turned out as the Partnership wished. Rob commented on how useful the Village Design Statement is.

Christine Lever gave a report on behalf of the **Friends of Longovicium**, whose aims are to encourage the interest in and increase understanding of our local Roman heritage. To this end, the Friends put on displays and Project Manager Rodney Hawkins gave talks in Lanchester and some of the surrounding villages.

Much interest was shown and a large amount of new information was received. A second booklet has been produced this year entitled 'Longovicium: A Roman Town at Lanchester' and is about the civilian settlement outside the fort which was discovered by a geophysical survey. The booklet is now being printed and the Friends are planning to launch it on Saturday 9th July from 10.30 am to 2.30 pm in the Community Centre. The booklet, talks, displays, children's activities, light refreshments and a raffle are all free and everyone is welcome. The event is supported by the National Lottery through the Heritage Lottery Fund. Cllr and Trustee Colin Burton spoke about the work done in liaison with the County Council and the Parish Council which had begun after the Village Appraisal in 2008. The Parish Plan followed and last year, the Locality Map which links the outer areas of the Parish with the village. Grants received also enabled the Parish Council to appoint a Development Officer, Sue

Charlton, for 18 months to work on this link. Cllr Burton also spoke of the Lynwood House project which is moving forward and the Fenhall Drift banner. The Parish Council is in negotiation with the Miners' Welfare Association who would like to see it in its home village. Finally, Cllr Burton stated that the Parish Council has a responsibility to help with the problem of the bus service cuts.

Mike thanked the leaders of the Working Groups. He said the Partnership had no serious money worries, that membership had increased and, for the third year running, he was able to say it had been the best year ever! The Action Plan for 2011-2012 was approved.

Pam Bygate told members that Mike had been invited to Windsor Castle last year to meet the Queen and other members of the Royal Family but that he had kept quiet about it. This was in recognition of all he does for the village and Pam thought everyone should know about this invitation. The items discussed under **Any Other Business** were reducing the speed limit outside St Bede's School to 30mph, the reduction in

bus services and land designated by the County Council for possible development, namely a stretch of land above Briardene and the Green School Site. All these subjects produced a great deal of discussion. It was decided that a letter should be sent from the Partnership to the County Council Highways Department suggesting a 20mph speed limit outside St Bede's during pupil arrival and departure times. Concern was shown about development on the two sites mentioned, particularly in respect of the increased amount of traffic on Newbiggen Lane and the A691. The reduction of bus services will be discussed at the next Trustees' Meeting.

Extending the route of the Lanchester Village Bus was also considered as there have been requests for it to go elsewhere, but this would mean running the bus hourly instead of half-hourly. This was thought to be impracticable and may cause problems for some of the present users. Mike invited everyone to partake of light refreshments, to look at the displays and to enjoy a chat.

MAKE WAY FOR THE CROSS

On Good Friday evening, Lanchester Methodist Church was full to overflowing. A huge audience gathered to hear the beautiful, yet powerful music of Graham Kendrick. In the busyness of everyday life it was really wonderful to find so many people gathering to mark such an important day.

The North West Durham Methodist Circuit choir with more than forty voices, conducted by Harry Carr and Margaret Coates

Gardening in June

June is a lovely month in the garden: flowers appearing; crops beginning to bulge; lawns green and fresh coloured. As the risk of frost has now passed, it is a busy month in your garden. It is also the month when daylight hours are the longest and it is time to enjoy the garden.

Borders

June is the time to plant out summer bedding including petunias, begonias, impatiens, etc and hanging up baskets that you have prepared perhaps using some of these plants. This month your tall growing perennials like delphinium, lupins, phlox, etc, need to be tied to their supports and clematis and other climbers need their new shoots training in the right direction. Also remember to deadhead the flower

spikes of lupins and delphiniums as soon as they fade to persuade the plants to produce more flower heads.

Vegetable Plot

Now is the time to plant out leeks sown in the spring when they are pencil thick and runner beans sown in May. Other tasks this month include

planting out other tender crops like outdoor tomatoes, sweet corn and courgettes; hoeing between rows to remove weed seedlings; and sowing winter brassicas such as cabbage and cauliflower. Another crop to sow directly outside in June is the increasingly popular salad leaves. These mixed leaves can be sown thinly into a pot or window box filled with multi-purpose compost, a grow bag, or well raked soil in a shallow trench. Leaves should be ready

in four weeks and can be harvested starting with the outer leaves when they are 4 to 6 inches long. You should avoid taking

the centre tips so that the plants keep growing. This sowing should be repeated each 2 or 3 weeks in the summer to provide a continuous summer crop.

General

Other jobs for this month include dividing primulas now that they have finished flowering, continuing to lift spring bulbs when the leaves have died down if you require the space, trimming back Clematis Montana after flowering if it is growing too much, and removing the dead flowers of rhododendron and lilac so that energy is not wasted in the production of seed but goes into the production of next year's buds.

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A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE...

I cannot believe that it is my first parliamentary anniversary already. A whole year has gone by since the general election, a year in which we have seen our first peace time coalition in operation. Local elections have been held in our Parish and in our cities. We have had a national referendum and a royal wedding. I have served on the Education Select Committee for a year as well as several Public Bill Committees. I have made great strides in learning the language and customs of Parliament and have set up constituency and parliamentary offices and a schedule of regular surgeries. I would like to tell you about two recent events that were important to me. The 3rd May was the first anniversary of the death of Sapper Daryn Roy from Dipton, who died while serving our country in Afghanistan. My first official duty as the MP for North West Durham was to attend Daryn's funeral, and whilst I did not know Daryn it is clear that he was an excellent soldier, a young man much loved by his family and respected by all his colleagues and the community. This was clear in the huge turnout of his colleagues from the regiment and local people from Dipton at the memorial service held at his graveside on the anniversary of his death.

I also attended a second memorial

service, this time to celebrate our mining heritage and to remember those who died in the pits of the Deerness valley. The long list of those killed included my great-grandfather Andrew Corrigan and his brother, Peter Corrigan. Whilst this was a personal tragedy for my family, it happened in September 1918 at the same time that the rest of the country was dealing with the national tragedy of the First World War that wiped out a generation of young men, including another of my great-grandfathers, Alick Wright and his brother, Jack. Our mining heritage should always be remembered. It provided us with jobs and enriched our communities, making us much of what we are today. However, it also brought us tragedy and there are few families in this area that did not lose someone to King Coal.

Finally, I went camping over the Easter holidays. I slipped in the shower block and have broken my right wrist in three places. Unfortunately I am right handed so dressing, eating etc is a bit of a challenge, although I am getting very good at one fingered, left hand typing.

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DAWKINS, HAWKING AND GOD

A talk by Dr David Wilkinson, who is both an astrophysicist and a theologian, proved to be a very popular event. An appreciative audience listened to him expound difficult scientific concepts in humorous and down to earth terms explaining why he felt no conflict between his Christian faith and the latest scientific theories about the origin of the earth and the universe.

After a short introduction involving video clips of Dara O'Brian making fun of beliefs and practices of Christianity and of Richard Dawkins rejecting a belief in God, Dr Wilkinson gave us a summary of the ideas of Paul Davies who claimed that the more he learned

of scientific theories the more it inclined him towards the idea of God, if not religion.

The main body of his talk was divided into three parts - the Universe, theories on the origin of the Universe and the Big Bang, and finally the latest questions being raised by scientists on the origins of the Universe and the Big Bang. Difficult concepts were illustrated by everyday situations and well known incidents in the Bible. Dr Wilkinson ended by explaining his commitment to Christianity and how he was able to reconcile this with the latest theories and questions being asked about the origin of the Big Bang.



LANCHESTER PRAYER ROOM

In January, the Lanchester Methodist church set up a 24 hour prayer room. People in the church signed up for one hour prayer slots for the whole 24 hours - day and night! We wanted to do this to bring the church together in a prayer event that was different. The event was part of the 24/7 prayer movement, a global project which takes place in prayer rooms. As such, it was decided to become something the church would like to do regularly, so the next prayer room will be from noon on Friday 10th June to Sunday 12th June, this time for 48 hours.

We would like contributions from as many people or groups as possible about prayers they would like. Please drop prayer requests into the church on 11th June during the Saturday coffee morning. We would also love people to come and drop in and see what it is all about, and spend time in the room. We will be running the prayer room quarterly, and aim to eventually increase the time to a full week of continuous prayer. This will need many people from Lanchester to join in with an aim to bring the whole village together in prayer.

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21 MONTHS IN AND STILL GROWING...

The Mid Durham Area Action Partnership's Annual Report 2010/11 has just been published and provides an update on the projects supported in 2009/10 and highlights

those progressing from 2010/11. Collectively the AAP, its associated elected members and their partners have committed over £700,000 into the mid Durham area during 2010/11, with over 160 different projects benefiting. Here are just some of the highlights...

◆ The AAP has a Public Forum made up of over 250 contacts which in turn has links to over 100 different organisations and services including Parish Council's and community groups operating in mid Durham.

◆ It has developed 9 major projects addressing the AAPs key priority themes, committing £150,000 of its Area Budget towards an overall project investment of £434,994 into mid Durham. **£1 of Area Budget invested has attracted a further £1.90 into mid Durham.**

◆ The AAP has enabled hundreds of local residents to feed in their views into the County Durham Plan, Durham County Councils Medium Term Financial Plan and consultation on the indoor leisure facilities review.

◆ The AAP has consulted with over 630 local residents of all ages to gain their views on what it is like to live in mid Durham. The results have helped structure the work of the AAP for 2011/12.

◆ The AAP team are working in virtually every village throughout mid Durham providing support to numerous projects including play areas, bike tracks, community buildings, village surveys, luncheon clubs, youth provision and community gardens.

◆ The 8 Durham County Council elected members for mid Durham have committed their support to 27 projects via their Neighbourhood Budgets and 64 through their Members Initiative Fund, equating to an overall investment of £293,069. Projects supported include parking, traffic control, sports, clubs, community venues, play and youth provision, equipment, trips and events.

◆ Community Speedwatch has been used in 9 villages on over 80 occasions with Castleside, Cornsay Colliery and Lanchester receiving the most visits. Where necessary enforcement has been instigated.

◆ Castleside and Lanchester Gateway schemes are starting in April and May 2011. Design work is ongoing in Maiden Law and Ushaw Moor alongside other highway works.

◆ Support to the 2 Credit Unions operating in mid Durham has seen their memberships increase by 243 with 7 new collection points and 14 volunteers.

◆ The small grants fund has supported 62 different community groups through £21,865 of Area Budget; these groups have in turn brought in a further £37,323 into mid Durham.

◆ Developed a joint project with Durham AAP to support community venues, aiming to increase awareness of the venues, get more people through the doors and in turn increase income.

◆ Supported the development of 7 new playsites throughout mid Durham.

◆ Worked in partnership to sustain youth work provision in Castleside, Lanchester and Burnhope and extend provision in Esh Winning and Langley Park.

The centre acts as a focal point for many village activities, catering for all ages from toddlers to the elderly. Even if you do not use the centre now, you may be glad of its facilities in the future so give it some support if you possibly can.

You can become a Friend of the Community Centre by donating £2 (the price of a cup of coffee) each month. This can be done by monthly direct debit or by an annual payment. You can of course donate more and that would be greatly appreciated, but if all villagers became Friends it would go a long way to keeping the Community Centre in the black.

Your donation can help in three ways. Firstly the donation itself, secondly if you are a tax payer the centre can get 28 pence extra for each pound donated, finally if the

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LANCHESTER LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The May meeting was held on Friday 6th May in the Community Centre, when the speaker was Margaret Hedley with a talk on The Victorian Woman in the Pit Village. Members and friends were introduced by Chairman John Thompson who then introduced Mrs Hedley, who was paying her third visit to the Society and who specialises in family history, mining history and women's history. She gave a fascinating talk describing the life of the pit women (either the wife or daughter of a miner) in an East Durham pit village in 1881. These women, who were illiterate, suffered many hardships, not least the emotional hardship of knowing that if their father, husband or son was killed or badly injured and unable

to go down the mine, they would be homeless and penniless. The talk was accompanied by a plan of a typical pit village and many interesting facts about the life and homes of the mining families. Questions were asked and answered and then Chairman John Thompson thanked Mrs Hedley, saying that it had been a lovely way to end the year of the Society's indoor meetings. The annual outdoor meeting will be on Saturday 25th June, with a visit to the working example of a Wurlitzer organ at Howden le Wear, to which family and friends are invited. Next year's programme will start on 2nd September in the Community Centre, when the subject will be Betty Surtees.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Devilled Mushrooms

Mustard, Olive oil and Worcestershire sauce give these mushrooms a wonderful spicy flavour, creating tasty juices during cooking. (Work time 10-15 minutes. Cook time 8-10 minutes. Serves 4. Good for a meal starter or lunch time snack.)

2tbsp wholegrain mustard
2tbsp olive oil
2 tbsls Worcestershire sauce
2 garlic cloves, crushed
8 large flat mushrooms

1 tsp paprika

140g bag of mixed salad leaves, with ruby chard and watercress

French or crusty bread, to serve

TAKES MINUTES TO PREPARE

1 Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6/Fan oven 180C. In a large bowl, mix together the mustard, oil, Worcestershire sauce and garlic, then season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

2 Add the mushrooms to the mixture and toss well to coat them evenly. (You can do this ahead and let them marinate.) Place them stalk-side up in a roasting tin and sprinkle over the paprika. Bake for 8-10 minutes.

3 Divide the salad leaves between 4 serving plates. Put two mushrooms on each plate and spoon over the juices. Serve straight away, with French or crusty bread.
