Thank you from Lanchester NSPCC committee

Our small committee has been busy fundraising over the past few months. In October we held an Autumn Draw and ticket sales from this amounted to £227. Prizes for the Draw included donations from Marks and Spencer, the Metro Centre and more locally, The King's Head Restaurant in Lanchester.
In early December we were fortunate to be given a day in the Tesco store at Delves Lane, Consett to collect for our charity, and this raised £174.
We would like to thank everyone who bought tickets, donated prizes and contributed to our collection in Tesco. We are very grateful for your support for this very worthwhile charity.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy and Peaceful New Year.

The rainfall that caused the village to flood in June was phenomenal. When compared with climate records it was calculated to be approximately a once-in-100-years event.

But that doesn't mean that the chance of it happening again in our lifetimes is very small - the climate is changing and extreme weather events are becoming more common. In this year alone in County Durham there has been exceptionally severe flooding on six separate occasions.

It will be very difficult to protect ourselves against another phenomenal rainstorm in the future, because all of the straightforward things that could be done were done in 2003-4, when over £¼ million was spent on improvements and repairs to the village drainage system. However three things are being attempted.

1. The Environment Agency is reviewing the

existing river model to improve the understanding of flood risk from the Smallhope Burn in the village. A structural report on the walls which run along the west bank of the Smallhope Burn has also highlighted areas for improvement. The Environment Agency plans to provide each landowner with a copy of the report and offer advice towards any remedial actions identified.

2. The County Council and Northumbrian Water are working together in conjunction with EA to look to see where improvements might be made to our drainage and sewerage system. For example they are considering diverting the surface water running down Newbiggen Lane into Smallhope Burn before it reaches the village.

3. All of our gullies, drains and sewers need to be cleaned and inspected frequently but the

Government has required the County Council to reduce its total budget by 40%. Our County Councillors Ossie Johnson and Richard Young and our MP Pat Glass are making sure that everything possible is being done.

In addition, we should try to protect our own properties. With the best will in the world the Environment Agency, Northumbrian Water and the County Council are not going to be able to carry out major works in the near future, so if you think that your house is at risk you should consider your own protective measures. Jed in Lanchester Hardware will probably get in some simple products and Karen Gibson, the County Council's Community Flood Engagement Officer, will again display various protection devices in the village in January.

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SILVER JUBILEE OF DEACON ANDREW O'CONNOR

Rev Andrew O'Connor celebrated 25 years as Permanent Deacon on Saint Andrew's day at Minsteracres Monastery and in the All Saints Catholic Church on Sunday.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 11th December 2012

Minutes

Ordinary meeting held on 13th November 2012 - approved.
Finance & Development Committee Meeting held on 28th November 2012 - approved.
Planning Committee Meeting held on 28th November 2012 - approved.

Police Report - received. Members were informed that Inspector Dave Turner has been promoted and that his replacement Inspector Chris Davies is in post. In addition PC John Henderson has been promoted and we are awaiting details of his replacement.

Correspondence

(1) Forestry Commission - consultation on three woodland grant schemes. Members discussed and received the information.
(2) Area Action Partnership and Parish Councils Committee - residents survey. Members discussed and received the survey results.
(3) Letter from resident - parking in the village. Members acknowledged that the issues of restricted time parking and provision of disabled parking bays have previously been explored and agreed that a response is sent to the resident informing them of the outcome of these previous investigations.

(4) County of Durham School Benevolent Fund. Members discussed and agreed not to send a donation.

(5) Durham County Council - Network News. Members received the information.

Area Action Partnership & Parish Councils Committee - Members received an update.

High Sheriffs Award 2013 - Members were informed that nominations are currently being sought. It was agreed to forward the information to the local schools.

National Tree Week Grant - Members were informed that the recent grant application for trees at Kitswell Park had been

successful and would be planted soon.

Tree Works - Village Green & Kitswell Park - Members were informed of essential tree works in these two areas. The cost of the works was agreed.

Financial report - discussed and received.

Accounts for Payment - approved.

The Chair informed Members that two local Councillors had been involved in separate accidents. It was agreed to send cards of support.

Salary Review - Press and public were excluded from this item.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 8th January 2013 at 7.15 pm.

Budget Position

The Lead Officer presented the finance information. Recommended - that the report be received.

Lanchester Miners' Banner Group

Members were informed of progress and considered the minutes and actions from the last meeting. Recommended - that the information be received.

Christmas Lights

Members discussed the recent Christmas Light Switch On and agreed that it had been successful. Members were informed that the new LED lights had been installed on the middle tree on the Village Green. It was agreed that they provided a good display and were an improvement on the existing provision which is dated.

Members were informed that the current provider of refreshments for the

event had informed the Council that they would be unable to provide the service in future. This generated a discussion on the event and possibilities for future years. Recommended - that the item is placed on the next agenda for discussion.

Kitswell Park Football Field

Progress is being made on seeking the soil samples to analyse the soil content. It was agreed to inspect the pitch in the New Year to ascertain whether the football teams can recommence playing.

Jubilee Oak

Arrangements are being made to plant the jubilee oak near to the path on the Village Green.

Members were informed that a recent application for a tree grant had been successful and that the project to plant a small number of trees at

Kitswell Park would be progressed.

Budgets 2012/13 and 2013/14

Recent correspondence received from the Government suggests that the tax base for local councils will not be protected. This means that the tax base is likely to be reduced.

In addition it is not known if the County Council will also still remove the double taxation grant which Lanchester currently receives of £1645 per annum.

It was agreed that a decision on precept could not be made until more information was made available.

Recommended that:

- the budget be agreed pending further discussion on the salaries;
- the decision on the precept be deferred to a future meeting.

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Planning Committee meeting on Wednesday 28th November 2012

Members considered the following planning applications:

- (i) Listed building consent to replace five windows within the rear elevation at 7 Hollinside Terrace, Hollinside. No objection.
- (ii) Reduce and reshape two maple trees, felling of one horse chestnut tree at 4 Lee Hill Court, Lanchester. No objection but request that the felled tree is replaced with a suitable alternative.
- (iii) Pruning of two sycamore trees at 8 Lee Hill Court, Lanchester. No objection.
- (iv) Proposed alterations to front of property at 21a Front Street, Lanchester. Members raised the following objections to the application:
 - (a) the proposed columns and timber boarding both in style and materials are

out of keeping with the surroundings being in a conservation and article iv area.

(b) the proposed step could be a hazard and encroaches on the public highway.

(c) the additional lights above the sign would be unwelcome. In addition it appears that the lights have already been installed and are operating.

(v) Replacement of thirteen windows and one door at Lanchester Methodist Church, Front Street, Lanchester. No objection.

(vi) Erection of single storey rear extension at 11 Hurbuck Cottages. No objection.

(vii) Construction of bay window at front of site dwelling at 6 Humberhill Drive, Lanchester. Members expressed

concern that the proposals created a break in the current building line. In addition there was concern that this development may cause a privacy issue to neighbours.

The following planning applications had been approved by Durham County Council:

- * Creation of access off Langley Lane into agricultural field (resubmission) on land to the South West of Fair View House, Fair View, Burnhope
- * Crown lifting of three Chestnut trees at

Alderdene House, Cadger Bank, Lanchester
 * Reduce height by 20% and pruning of one sycamore and one lime tree at Hinderwell, Durham Road, Lanchester

* Felling of three pine and one spruce tree, various removal of branches and deadwood and crowning of ten pine trees at 6 The Paddock, Lanchester

* Erection of two storey side and single storey rear extensions at 1 Watling Way, Lanchester

* Erection of agricultural storage building (retrospective) and erection of rain water storage at Colepike Home Farm, Lanchester

* Erection of a grain dryer cover and siting of a shipping container on land to the North East of Dunley Ford House, Newbiggen Lane, Lanchester

* Removal of two lower branches and deadwood of one ash tree protected by a tree preservation order at 7 Front Street, Lanchester

* Increase roof height by 2 metres to incorporate new first floor. Installation of velux windows and demolition and rebuilding of garage at Tall Trees, Cadger Bank, Lanchester

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LANCHESTER LIONS SENIOR CITIZENS LUNCH




Senior Citizens assembled together for the Lions Christmas Lunch

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
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


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VILLAGE VOICE AGM 2012

At the Village Voice AGM, Brian Oram, Chairman, presented the Annual Report which covered the main issues and activities over the last twelve months together with a forecast for the year ahead.

Personnel: Brian reported on the movement of personnel including the resignation of Mavis Datta as reporter on the Parish Council after 6 years of dedicated service. Sally Laverick, Lead Officer/Clerk of the Parish Council has agreed to provide this information for the Village Voice. Chris Boundey, Technician, agreed to provide information about events at St Bede's School.

Activities: During the year monthly issues of the paper had mainly been 20 or 24 pages and Brian thanked all the contributors which included members of the public and certain organisations who had been encouraged to send in their news. The

newspaper had been delivered to all households in Lanchester and some of the surrounding areas by approximately 40 volunteers. The organisation of the delivery system was completed by Mike Stoddart who received thanks for his hard and diligent work as were all of the volunteers who go out in all weathers to deliver their allocation of papers. One edition of the paper, the June Jubilee Edition, was 28 pages in length and was well received by the general public. Brian congratulated the Editorial Team/Compilers, Christine Monaghan and Ian Reece, for their achievement.

The newspaper is wholly funded by advertisement revenue from businesses in the local area and the Chairman thanked all advertisers for their continued support. The newspaper depends wholly on volunteer efforts from local people. Printing costs and other expenses are paid from the advertising revenue, but no one receives any remuneration for their time and effort. The Forecast for 2012/13 is anticipated continuance of the size of the paper at 20/24 pages, advertising of the 70 advertisers to continue to take about 20% of the space, and a print run of 2,700 copies per issue. John Hurran had secured the vast majority of regular long term advertisers for 2013 and was congratulated for his continued hard work. The Chairman reported a reasonably healthy bank balance and assets. He reported an improved efficiency of accounting by encouraging advertisers to bank electronically and by Paypal making a saving in costs. The Treasurer, Ken Todd, had been able to reduce bad debt to nil during the year and he was thanked for this fine achievement.

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Gardening in January

There is always something to do in the garden. January is not the best month but some jobs are given below for some of the finer days.

In the Flower Borders
Prune wisteria cutting back the summer side buds to 2 or 3 buds and prune roses now that they are dormant. If you haven't already done so, cut down old stems of perennials like sedum, phlox, lupin, delphinium, etc taking care not to damage any

new growth. Remove any faded flowers from winter flowering pansies and violas to keep them flowering.

In the Vegetable Plot
Keep harvesting your parsnips and leeks and remove any yellowing leaves from brassicas. Start chitting early potatoes by standing them in old egg boxes on a light, frost free, window sill. If you want an early crop of, say, peas, place a cloche over an area prior to sowing in a few weeks time.

General
Do not walk on your lawn if it's covered by heavy frost or snow as this will damage the grass beneath and brush heavy snow off hedges and conifers to prevent the branches from snapping. Shred your Christmas tree and add to your compost or, alternately, keep the branches as they make excellent pea sticks. Check any bulbs and tubers in storage and remove any that are showing signs of rotting.

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
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CHRISTMAS PARTY FOR CHILDREN

This was accompanied by a glass of wine and rounded off with tea or coffee. For main course we sampled traditional turkey with chipolatas, sage and onion stuffing, cranberries and bread sauce, roast pheasant

with smoky bacon cabbage, hazelnut butter and cider sauce, rare breed pork cooked two ways with Stornaway black pudding, crisp crackling and apple sauce. For puds it was brown sugar parfait with roasted pear, and chocolate meringue with brandied cherries, vanilla and chestnut cream. As the picturesque puds appeared it was 'oooh - oh and look at that', they look too good to eat - but of course we did. As one we all raved over the meal, we so enjoyed it. Finbarrs - somewhere special!



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

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Leek and Potato Soup

Serves 4

Ingredients

- 200 g potatoes
- 200 g leeks
- 1 onion
- Shake of black pepper
- 300 ml water +
- chicken stock cube
- 200 ml milk
- 2 - 3 sprigs of parsley

Method

- 1 Wash and peel potatoes. Cut into small pieces. Wash and slice the leeks.
- 2 Peel and slice the onion.
- 3 Put the onion, leeks, potatoes in a saucepan with the water and stock cube. Simmer for 30 minutes or until the vegetables are tender.

- 4 Wash, dry and chop the parsley finely.
- 5 Place the soup in a liquidiser and liquidise for 1 minute or press through a sieve with a wooden spoon.
- 6 Return the soup to the pan. Add milk and pepper. Reheat, but do not boil. Serve in soup bowls, sprinkle with parsley and serve with slices of toast.
