BUSES TO RETURN Use them or lose them!

The campaign by local people for the return of evening and Sunday buses has been successful. While a full restitution of services is not proposed, a partial return will come as welcome news to campaigners. Evening buses will return on Friday

and Saturday evenings thanks to Lanchester County Councillors Ossie Johnson (Lab) and Richard Young (Ind) who have given part of their council allowance to fund the buses.

Sunday buses are returning with support from Councillors Duncan

Barnett, Steven Robinson (both Benfieldside Ind), Alan Shield, Watts Stelling (both Leadgate and Medomsley Ind) and Owen Temple (Consett North Lib Dem). Support has also been forthcoming from the NHS to assist patients, visitors and staff to get to

the hospital. (see letter on page 2).

At a recent meeting organised by Pat Glass MP in Lanchester, Go North East showed their willingness to put on a service 'at cost' and have been credited as an important partner in this arrangement.

Mrs Glass and Owen Temple have made it clear that this return is for a limited time and long term provision of a service will depend on how much the buses are used. Go North East can collect accurate statistics of bus usage. The message is clear - Use them or lose them.

Dear Sirs

Early in the New Year the NHS has come on board a three way partnership with local councillors and Go North East to bring a return of Sunday buses between Consett and Durham. The service will provide public transport access to their local hospital to the people of Consett and Lanchester each Sunday, as well as shopping opportunities and access to rail services. After months of spadework and detailed discussions with the Transport Section and County Hall, Councillors Barnett, Robinson, Shield, Stelling and myself had already reached agreement about allocating funds for the restoration of this service.

We were therefore delighted when University Hospital of North Durham and the Primary Care Trust decided to throw their weight behind the scheme with a one-off grant of over £2,500 to help kick-start the scheme.

Everyone involved knows that this is a one-off opportunity. The scheme has to become financially self-supporting over the next two years because there will be no ongoing subsidy, but all the partners agree that if local people support the service, there is a future for Sunday buses. It has to be commercially viable to survive in the long run, so I very much hope that the people of Lanchester and the people of Consett will make regular use of the service. We'll have to use it or lose it again. There will be an inevitable delay in completing all the formalities, but the future looks a little brighter. In a few months' time this much needed service will have been restored.

Dear Sir

In the article 'Housing Estate on Old Maiden Law Hospital Site?' (December Village Voice), questions were posed about the Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) plans for the site.

A masterplan is being developed to support an outline planning application for housing on the former Maiden Law Hospital site, where the only remaining operational building is Willow Burn Hospice. The layout that was consulted on in December showed an arrangement for 47 houses.

Key aspects of the proposal are to:

- * Set the framework for a new high quality sustainable neighbourhood
 - * Provide high quality homes
 - * Ensure it is an attractive and distinctive place to live
 - * Foster a safe and strong community
 - * Ensure it is accessible for all
 - * Integrate the new houses and enhance the landscape setting
 - * Maximise access to existing and new open space
 - * Promote healthy lifestyles
 - * Contribute to the achievement of sustainable development
 - * Contribute to offsite delivery of affordable housing elsewhere in Lanchester
 - * Provide a Local Play Area
- There is an agreement with Durham County Council that the development of private housing on this site will financially contribute to offsite delivery of affordable housing elsewhere in Lanchester through a Section 106 Agreement. The HCA are in discussions with DCC regarding affordable housing on the Lynwood

House site and other Council owned sites in Lanchester.

The Agreement will also include a contribution towards creating and maintaining an Area for Play of about 100m². It is proposed to locate this adjacent to the new Hospice, the pedestrian/cycle entrance and community orchard.

Next steps are to take on board comments made during the consultation, then update and revise the proposals accordingly. The outline planning application will then be submitted. The HCA would like to obtain planning consent before marketing the site in spring/summer 2012, and a developer would then progress the application through a Reserved Matters application.

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LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

13th December 2011

Durham CC - Schools Admission Arrangements for September 2013/14. These remain the same and are available online.

Durham CC - Review of Household Waste Recycling Centres. The Annfield Plain site is to remain but with hours changed.

Etape Pennines 2012. This cycling event will take place on October 12th 2012, when 80 miles of road will be closed; so far 700 entries have been received.

Durham CC - Winter Salting Routes. Leaflets showing these were distributed

Letter of Thanks. A letter from Mr and Mrs Mike Gladstone in appreciation of their invitation to the Celebration event was received; they had greatly enjoyed the evening.

Letter of Thanks. A letter from Jane Davis, Head Teacher of the EP School was received. Mrs Davis thanked Sue Charlton, the Development Officer for Agriculture, Wildlife and the Environment, for all the work she had done with the school and how much, she, the staff and the children appreciated this.

Locality Map Project. Members considered the Annual Report and remarked on all that Sue Charlton has achieved so far; they discussed how her work might be continued after the

present funding has ended. Thanks to be passed to Sue for the work she has undertaken.

Localism Act/ Neighbourhood Planning. It was agreed that an officer from Durham Rural Community Council be invited to attend a future Planning meeting to give a presentation on Neighbourhood Planning and that Members of Lanchester Partnership should be invited to attend.

All Saints RC Church Monday Club. Cllr Mrs Gray gave Members background information on the Club, which commenced in October and is held every Monday from 6.30pm to 8.30pm in All Saints RC Church Hall. It is intended to provide support for people in the community who are isolated, young or old, but everyone is welcome. So far there are 14 regular attendees and volunteers. Transport is available and Churches Together are working to promote this new venture.

Budget and Precept 2012/13. The proposed budget was agreed and the precept raised by 2.5% for 2012/13.

Questions from Members. Cllr Wardle spoke about the recent community consultation on the Maiden Law site undertaken by Arup and the Homes & Communities Association and concern was expressed about the consultation process. It was resolved that a letter should be sent to Durham CC and the HCA expressing concern about the time scale, promotion and notice given for the consultation. Mike Gladstone of Lanchester Partnership also expressed concern about the need to consider the proposals seriously.

10th January 2012

Lanchester Lions Bonfire and Firework Event. The Meeting was attended by the Club's President, Vice President and Junior President, who told Members that they are greatly concerned about the Health and Safety aspect of this event, due to the ever-increasing number of people attending and the Club's dwindling membership, which means that they do not have enough stewards to ensure adequate safety. They outlined various alternatives to the present format:

1 to have fireworks only in another part of the field;
2 move to a different venue or
3 not hold the event at all.

All agreed that this is the last thing they want to do as it is an important part of village community events and it would probably result in bonfires and fireworks being lit all over the village, which would also cause health and safety problems. Various suggestions were made such as ticketing the event (considered impracticable, due to possible gatecrashers) and different ways of obtaining manpower, including grants which may be available. Another suggestion was a list of helpers for the firework display. Traffic and parking was also discussed. Chairman Cllr Johnson said that much as Members would hate to see this very popular annual display disappear, as it brings people and revenue into the village and particularly to the cricket club, the Council is not able to donate more than the usual amount as the Budget is very tight.

Correspondence. **Maintenance Report.** The Lead Officer was asked to thank David, the village handyman for all his hard work, which is greatly appreciated by Members and residents.

Former Maiden Law Hospital Site. A letter was received from the Homes and Communities Agency regarding the above proposed development. Durham County Council has agreed to keep Lanchester Parish Council informed. It was emphasised that at the present time this development is only a concept.

Buckingham Palace Garden Party on 22nd May 2012. Members were asked if they would like their name to be put into a draw to attend this ceremony.

Small and Medium Local Councils Forum. This is a new idea and the first meeting will be at Peterlee on Friday, 17th February. Two Members from each Council can attend.

Christmas Lights Project. A working group was established to progress this project.

Date of Next Meeting. This will be held in the Conference Room, Park House, Lanchester, on Tuesday 14th February at 7.15pm.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Parliament has been in recess over the Christmas break so this month I thought I would write about my work as a member of the Education Select Committee. There are 11 members of the Committee: 5 Labour, 5 Conservative and 1 Liberal-Democrat. Members are elected to the committee and the current chair is Graham Stewart, MP for Beverley in North Yorkshire. I am the current senior opposition member and Vice-chair. Select Committees exist to scrutinise the work of government and so far this parliament the Education Select Committee has conducted inquiries into services for young people, 16-19 participation and on the role and work of Ofsted.

The Committee recently published a report critical of the government's launch of the English Baccalaureate (E. Bacc). It is currently carrying out a detailed inquiry into the child protection system, and a shorter but timely inquiry into the examination system. More details of the work of the committee and its reports can be found at www.parliament.uk/education-committee. My work on the Education Select Committee is one of the most important things that I do in Parliament. It gives me an opportunity to use the experience I gained over many years working in education and the research facilities provided for the committee enable us to examine government

policies on education in detail. Ultimately I want those policies to work, for our young people to have access to good teachers and schools, and to acquire qualifications that mean something to them and to future employers. I hope that my contribution, as part of what is an important and powerful committee that holds Ministers to account, helps make that happen. Happy New Year. 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

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Planning Applications

i Fell flowering cherry tree at 32 Lee Hill Court. Following consultation with the Chair of the Planning Committee, a response had already been forwarded to the principal authority. RESOLVED. That the action taken be confirmed.

ii Replace four existing windows with white upvc double-glazed to similar

design and replace front and back doors with composite doors at 3 The Square. RESOLVED. That the action taken be confirmed (as i above).

iii Demolition of existing bungalow and erection of replacement bungalow at Summerdale, Cadger Bank. Kevin Leary declared an interest. RESOLVED. No objection.

iv Reduce height by 50% of five conifer trees, cut back branches to one willow tree on neighbouring property at Beck View, Ford Road. RESOLVED. No objection.

v Felling of one spruce tree, lowering of limbs of two pine trees and one spruce tree at 1 The Paddock. RESOLVED. No objection but requested that the felled tree be replaced with a suitable alternative.

vi Reduce height by 4m and reshape crown of two birch trees at West Grange, Cadger Bank. RESOLVED. No objection.

vii. Link garage and leisure pool extension to side and rear at The Firs, Browney Bank. RESOLVED. No objection.

viii Erection of outdoor horse arena at Black House Farm. Keith Harrison declared an interest. RESOLVED. No objection.

ix Installation of 91 PV panels on south elevation of Garden Centre's Retail Building at Lanchester Garden Centre, Bargate Bank. RESOLVED. No objection.

x Orangery extension at Greystone, Crow Hall. Keith Harrison declared an interest. RESOLVED. No objection, subject to complying with the Village Design Statement criteria.

* Demolition of existing garage and utility area, erection of single storey replacement extension at 1 The Paddock.

* Erection of 1100mm balcony safety railings and amended scheme of fenestration at Ragpathside Farm.

* Erection to front and rear of dwelling, raising roof to accommodate loft conversion. Extension to existing garage to provide residential unit at Greystone, Cadger Bank.

* Erection of car port to front of existing detached garage in separate garden to rear of dwelling at 8 Hollinside Terrace.

* Installation of solar panels to south facing roof slopes of stable block at Durham Road.

* Erection of agricultural storage shed at land to the north east of Dunley Ford House, Newbiggen Lane.

* Sun roof extension to gable at Sylvan Lea, Ford Crescent.

* Crown lifting and crown reduction of one beech tree at Magadi, Cadger Bank.

Gardening in February

Normally this month brings us the first signs of spring. However, due to the mild weather in January, these signs have already appeared with many spring bulbs showing above the earth and snowdrops out.

Borders

February is a good time to prune trees and summer flowering clematis before the sap rises and to cut back any overgrown shrubs. You can start sowing impatiens, cosmos and petunia flower seeds under cover. It is also a good time to mulch borders with old compost to help keep weeds down and maintain moisture and to

propagate new plants from cuttings of Honeysuckle, Buddleia and Spirea. Gentle heat can be provided by an electric propagator on a windowsill for seeds and cuttings. Just make sure that seeds are taken out when they are small to stop them getting leggy.

Vegetables

Autumn fruiting raspberries should be pruned back to the ground and a general fertilizer applied to fruit trees and bushes. You should also plant any bare rooted fruit on a fine day when there is no frost in the ground. Early crops of peas and broad

beans can be sown in the ground although I prefer to use root-trainers for my broad beans. Peppers, chillies and tomatoes can be sown indoors now or under heat. It is a good time to get potatoes started. Place the tubers in egg boxes on a light windowsill to encourage shoots of two inches in length before you plant them next month.

General

You can replant any tired houseplants and replace the top inch of outdoor containers with new compost to give them both a 'lift' and provide them with new life.

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



whilst a young choir sang a selection of Christmas music and carols outside SPAR. This happened despite the gale force wind and heavy rain.





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
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FUNDRAISER FOR COMMUNITY CENTRE


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
