TOM COWIE GRANT

The Community Centre has been awarded a grant of £4,100 from the Tom Cowie Foundation to go towards the purchase of new gym equipment. The gym fundraising team has also raised £1,900 over the past two years from the sale of refreshments, books and profits from raffles. This £6,000 will be used to purchase a Crosstrainer and a Cycle to replace equipment that was bought some ten years ago. The gym is open seven days a week and offers a local facility to improve the health and wellbeing of the community.

LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL
MEETING 12th June 2012

After the usual preliminaries, Sheila Parmerly, Durham County Council Schools Places Strategic Manager and Jane Lesage from Durham County Council Children and Young People Department discussed with Members the proposed future use of the Green School, namely that of Local Education Alternative Education Provision. This will be for 50-70 year 10 and 11 students who cannot cope with mainstream education for one reason or another but who are not stated or have special needs. A full report will follow next month.

A letter from Lanchester Adult Football Team, requesting the use of the football field for the 2012/13 season was considered. It was agreed that consent be given with the proviso that the commencement of

playing might have to be delayed due to the very wet weather and consequent state of the pitch.

Update regarding the former 6th form college

The Estates Officer at Durham County Council has advised the following:

'...brick pillars which have collapsed, we originally thought this was due to criminal damage however a recent inspection has confirmed

that the collapse is due to a structural problem with the wall.'

'We have also increased the night time patrols however we cannot employ 24 hour cover as we don't have any budget to do so.'

'The building is due to be occupied again from September this year by the Council so hopefully the incidents will die off. In the meantime works will be commencing to bring the building back to a habitable state so there should be more on site presence over the coming weeks.'

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

I was honoured to be asked to open the Lanchester Lions Carnival on 19th May. The weather was not great but the rain stayed away for most of the day. I have the greatest of respect for the Lanchester Lions who do a huge amount for our village, some of which is very visible like the Carnival, the OAP Christmas lunch and the bonfire night fireworks, but much of which goes on quietly behind the scenes. I

was really pleased to be able to announce that the bonfire fireworks will go ahead this coming November but I want to call on people who can and who are interested to get involved with the Lions, to support their work in the village and to make sure that work can continue into the future.

Gardening in July

July is the time when schools break up and all of the family can make good use of the garden. This can be rugs on the lawn and meals outside. Just ignore any weeds that you see whilst you are eating!

Flowers

The main jobs this month involve keeping up a good watering scheme for containers as well as beds and borders, removing faded flowers to encourage a continuity of blooms, and sowing biennial seeds for next year. Rising temperatures bring extra demand for water but the use of the sprinkler is not really viable even though, thanks to Kielder, we do not have a hosepipe ban. You need to concentrate your supply on plants that

need it to keep them flowering and cropping but leave established plants to fend for themselves. Pots and baskets need daily water but do this in the evening and use hand watering methods to ensure that it gets to the roots. All plants will benefit from the removal of dead blooms but particularly sweet peas and roses so that flowering will continue until autumn. Also cut back lupin heads so that a new one will form just below your cut. Seeds that need to be sown this month for next year include Bellis (Double Daisy), Sweet William and Violas all of which are good value, easy to grow and which can be used for spring flowering of beds, borders and baskets.

Vegetables

July is the month to enjoy picking and eating fruits such as strawberries, raspberries, cherries and currants. With summer fruiting raspberries, blackberries and hybrid berries, cut down the fruited canes once you've finished harvesting. You need to increase your watering of tomatoes and feed them regularly once the first truss has set. As soon as crops have come to an end, like broad beans, you need to lift them and make more use of the land.

General

Cut your lawns regularly not forgetting to trim the edges and put your clippings to good use by turning them into compost. Remove any suckers from the base of roses, trees and shrubs.

HERITAGE WALKS 5 - South Ridge

A dry day tempted me to do this 7 mile walk before the forecast rain arrived, so with my friend and our four dogs we set off up Cadger Bank with a strong wind against us. We turned off the busy road just before Hollinside and walked through a farm and fields, most of the stiles on the way having a convenient, user-friendly

gate next to them. One stile, however, which was high and narrow, with not much of a gap between the rails for the dogs to squeeze through, was into a field in which there were four horses. On seeing us, they started galloping about, bucking and kicking, coming alarmingly close, the biggest one coming nearest, of course. It was rather unnerving, but we continued through the property into another huge field, where the horses were curious but did not come too close, until we reached a quiet lane. This led us to a long field, at the other end of which was another lane which we followed until we reached a road. We began a long, steep climb, tiring at this point of the walk as we had been out for some time. Then through a cornfield; keeping to the edge where the ground was uneven and hard going. There were quiet,

open fields all around us with only sheep and lambs for company; we forget sometimes how much lovely, unspoilt countryside is all around us. Another track led to a road, and eventually we were turning for home. The rest was road work; we could have taken a short cut across a field according to the map, but the grass in it was very long, so we kept to the road, which was just as well as we probably couldn't have got the dogs over the stile at the other side. Eventually we reached Bargate Bank, which as usual was busy with fast traffic, and by the time we got home (having walked an extra half-mile each way to the village starting point), we had been out nearly 4 hours. This is the only walk where I have been stiff the next day, and I must be fitter by now!

IT IS BLOSSOM TIME IN THE COMMUNITY ORCHARD!

For those of you who do not know where we are, the orchard is at Margery Flatts Farm, just up Newbiggen Lane. After the article in the April edition of the Village Voice where it was reported that the first trees had been planted, we are all pleased to see the first blossom. Although we will not let the trees fruit for a few years yet, so that all the effort goes into maturing the tree, we are looking forward to some soft fruit from our other plantings soon.

The orchard is a Lanchester Partnership project, part of the Environment Group, to help make the community greener and to help reduce 'foodmiles'. If you are interested in joining, the subscription this year is £10 per household. This ensures a share of the fruit eventually, in return for some work in the orchard, physical effort as well as

helping to run the group. However there are other ways to help us. Several very generous people have donated unwanted tools for the allotment plots that are on the same field. The orchard group is also keen to help recycle any unwanted items. You can be assured we will put them to good use. Contact details below.

Also, having had some success grafting our own trees last year, this summer we are going to try another method of increasing the tree stock, budding. For this we need prunings of new wood from suitable trees. If you have a good apple, or any other fruit tree, pear, plum, damson or cherry tree and you would like to help add to the number of trees in the orchard, please let us know. It would entail the collection of the normal summer pruning wood, short twigs of about

500mm long. This pruning normally takes place in late July/early August and we would be grateful if you could make contact, if you would like to donate these stems so that we can grow on trees with a local origin. The fruit trees, when the

orchard is fully planted, will be arranged around the newly established allotment garden plots managed by the Margery Flatts Allotment Association. More about this venture below. There are still some plots available for which it

would be possible to cultivate this year. Contact Kate Wicks if you have any queries about the Lanchester Community Orchard or would like to donate any unwanted tools or prunings, Tel: 01207 520258.

MARGERY FLATTS ALLOTMENTS

Despite the very inclement weather which we have been experiencing this year, in what is supposed to

be our summer season, the 'allotmenters' are all enjoying the opportunity to grow their own fruit and

vegetables in what is some very pleasant surroundings. Some of the current members are taking the

opportunity to try different methods of organic gardening, for example some are using a 'no dig' approach, while others are following the more traditional methods of digging over the soil and planting their seeds and/or small plants. For those budding gardeners out there who feel they would like the opportunity to 'grow their own' there are now some full (10 sq m) or half size allotment plots

which have become available. Even though the season is some way through the plots can be worked for planting leeks or autumn vegetables or indeed worked for planting next year. LANCHESTER LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY 9th June 2012

The unseasonable cold, showery weather did not dampen the enthusiasm of the 24 members who attend the outside meeting. Led by Georgina Plowright, who is curator of the four English Heritage Museums on Hadrian's Wall, members were taken by minibus to the temple of Antenociticus at Benwell. Hidden in the midst of a quiet estate of semi-detached houses, the remains of the temple and two altars were well-preserved (some parts being replicas as the originals are in a museum). Georgina gave an interesting explanation of the Romans in this area, Antenociticus having an important position in the Army. Next we went to Hexham, where, after an hour and a half to have lunch and browse round the shops, we were met in the Abbey by historian Margaret Snape. She told us about the history of the Abbey and in two groups we went into the tiny crypt which contains

many interesting Roman stones taken from various Roman sites. After this we drove to Carrawburgh, not far from Chesters Roman fort, Georgina pointing out interesting facts about the Wall as we passed parallel to it. Here we plodged over wet fields, sheep taking no notice as they must be used to humans passing by, to see the remains of one of the three Mithraen temples found this section of the Wall. Again, Georgina told us many fascinating facts about the worship of Mithras and the

construction of the temple. We set off for just after 4 pm. Chairman Lanchester along the Military Road, again running alongside the Wall, vallum and ditch,

and the work she had put in preparing her talks. Judging by the comments as we all departed, everyone had thoroughly enjoyed the day.

CHURCHES TOGETHER

An Evening with Professor Paul Murray

On 17th May members from all the churches in Lanchester and Burnhope were addressed in Lanchester Methodist Church by Professor Murray, Head of the Centre for Catholic Studies at Durham University. Paul Murray is currently undertaking research in 'Positive Ecumenism', a mouthful, but which, as he explained, is simply about encouraging all the denominations to learn from each other and as a result grow stronger themselves and closer together. Professor

Murray impressed with his easy style, the obvious depth of his international reputation, but yet his 'feet on the ground' interest in local churches. He was impressed with the efforts Churches Together have made in Lanchester and Burnhope, and encouraged us now to seek to tackle some of the more difficult issues out of which he believes even greater progress towards unity can be made. There was a lively question time at the end and refreshments were enjoyed by all.





Suddenly, from behind several vehicles Dennis appeared running at a fair pace resplendent in white tracksuit, torch aloft, confident, happy and smiling. Then it was over in a flash. The kiss was made with the other relay runner's torch who had by this time been ushered to the centre of the road. His torch was lit and Dennis raced off to a waiting bus. The whole exercise was quick, slick and perfect.
