## HEAVY SNOWFALLS IN LANCHESTER BRING HAVOC

After the rain came the snow with devastating affects for some, tremendous enjoyment for others. Travel by whatever method became difficult and delayed, with the climax being an Eddie Stobart lorry which jackknifed on the bypass near the Parish Church. Another large tanker failed to negotiate the turning into Broadoak Drive off Newbiggen Lane and had to reverse all the way down the hill. The snow also brought regional and national recognition to the village with St Bede's (interview with a young lad), All Saints and the EP School being featured on national and local BBC News programmes. Karen McKenna, Head Teacher of All Saints spoke at length on BBC Look North about school

## TACKLING FLOODING RISK - UPDATE

Please do not think that last year's floods have been forgotten and nothing is being done.

### The County Council

The County Council is now the "Lead Local Flood Authority" for Lanchester.

It has investigated the causes of flooding and is now looking into potential preventative measures. It has awarded a contract to Aecom (a firm of consulting engineers) to carry out a feasibility study which, it is hoped, will identify and assess possible measures.

This study is likely to focus on both rainwater flow down Newbiggen Lane and the culvert that carries Alderdene Burn under Front Street, and is due to be completed by mid-April. If it identifies one or more schemes that appear to be worth developing into actual projects then the County Council will try to obtain funding for detailed design, land acquisition and construction. However, the earliest that a scheme

could be delivered would be 2014/15.

The County Council has carried out a CCTV survey of the Smallhope Burn culvert, which it found to be in good condition. Also, it will soon carry out works to prevent surface water running down Ford Crescent from Ford Road. Unfortunately the display of house protection devices that it planned for January had to be cancelled and has not been rearranged.

### Northumbrian Water Limited

NWL has said that it does not have any operational issues with its drainage system. Nonetheless it has carried out some improvements - for example at Ford Crescent and Victoria Terrace.

### Environment Agency

The Environment Agency has removed an obstruction from the Smallhope Burn beneath the Valley Walk bridge. This work was done in two parts; the lower section was removed a few days after the flood using the EA's

emergency powers and the upper section was removed later, following consultations with the landowner.

### Pat Glass MP

Our MP and her staff are helping people who are having insurance problems following the flooding.

**Front Street Shopowners**  
Ged Peardon and other Front Street shop-owners are making sure that the most critical Front Street gullies are kept clear.

### Village Residents

The County Council is also reviewing with the Environment Agency the possibility of training members of the community as Community Flood Wardens. Wardens may be able to assist by monitoring flood levels, checking that gullies are clear and distributing sandbags.

### Collection Boxes

And finally, the collection boxes in Spar, the Post Office and Sweets & Treats have so far collected nearly £80. Thank you, everyone.

## HOLIDAY CHALETs AT ORNSBY HILL?

The owner of the field behind Ornsby Hill has applied to build 8 holiday homes on it. If you want to know more about this proposal you can look it up electronically on the County Council website - Environment and Planning - Planning - View Planning Applications Online - Former Consett Area Office - Application Ref No 1/2012/0628 or ask Sally Laverick (Tel: 521 957) to let you look at a paper copy.

The Lanchester Partnership thinks that if the holiday homes were built then they would

provide one job, would probably bring a small amount of custom to the village shops, and might encourage some tourism, but set against that:

- \* residents of Ornsby Hill would be badly affected by the extra noise, light pollution and increased activity;
- \* road access off Howden Bank could not be made safe;
- \* the site is outside the Village Development Limit;
- \* the site is in rural countryside, in an area of high landscape value that forms the

rural setting for the village;

- \* the site lies across a major wildlife corridor that would already be damaged by the Maiden Law Hospital site housing; and
- \* a precedent would be set for building on this important hillside.



# LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL

## Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 12th February 2013

### Minutes

Ordinary meeting held on 8th January 2013 - approved.

Finance, Development & General Purposes Committee Meeting held on 30th January 2013 - approved.

**Police Report** - Lisa Jackson, the new PCSO for Lanchester, attended the meeting and presented the police report which covered a 2 month period (see separate article). Congratulations were passed to John Henderson on his recent promotion to Sergeant. The Neighbourhood Warden report for December was also discussed.

**Correspondence**  
(1) Campaign to Protect

Rural England - over responsibility. newsletter - received (2) Lanchester Partnership - Litter Pick - permission was given for use of the Village Green for this event on 23rd March.

### Grass Cutting Contract 2013

Press and public were excluded from this item.

**Grassed Area - Lanchester Valley Railway Path** - between Station Road and Newbiggen Lane

The Chair gave the background to this item in that the County Council have stopped cutting the grass in this area which they own and have approached the Parish Council to ask if the Parish Council would wish to take

Following discussion at a previous council meeting, information had been sought from the County Council on maintenance and liability issues particularly in relation to the burn, culvert and trees in this area.

The response from the County Council to these enquiries was reported and discussed.

Residents attended the meeting and raised a number of concerns and issues.

It was agreed that the County Council be approached to consider whether a formal agreement could be put in place which would mean that the County Council

would retain ownership, management and liability for this area and which would allow the Parish Council to cut the grass.

**Area Action Partnership & Parish Councils Committee** - Members received an update on recent meetings.

**Parish Council Newsletter** - The quarterly newsletter was discussed and approved for distribution.

### General Power of Competence

Members discussed adoption of the power. Members resolved that they met the criteria and adopted the power.

**Financial report** - discussed and received.

**Accounts for Payment** - approved.

**Dog Fouling - Kitswell Park** - Members were informed that there have been recent incidents of dogs fouling on the football field and of damage being done to the playing surface from dogs being exercised on this area. It was agreed to consider the signage and also to contact the Neighbourhood Warden to report the problem of dog fouling.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 12th March 2013 at 7.15 pm.

## LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT

This article is to explain to residents the level of precept that the Parish Council has agreed for 2013/14 and the reasons behind this decision.

The Parish Council considered its precept requirement at a recent Council meeting and set the precept for 2013/14 at £50,624.00.

The Parish Council considered a number of factors which combined to reduce the income received by the Council.

\* The removal in 2012/13 of the annual £6,000 payment previously received from Derwentside District Council and then from Durham County Council.

\* The removal from 2013/14 of the annual £1645 double taxation payment previously received from Durham County Council.

\* The introduction from 2013/14 of the Local Council Tax Support Scheme managed by Durham County Council. The effect of this is that the council tax base will be reduced although the Parish Council will receive

a grant to partially cover the loss of income.

The net effect of these factors is to reduce the annual income received by the Parish Council by over £8300.

The agreed precept of £50,624 for 2013/14 is the same as the precept request for 2012/13. However the reduced council tax base will result in an increase in council tax per household. A property in band D will see an increase of £3.05 (9.3%) this year. This equates to less than 6p per week.

The Parish Council were reluctant to impose any increase in precept but realise that there was a need to partially bridge the gap caused by the reduction in income received. The Parish Council will continue to work hard to realise efficiencies and to develop projects for the community. Over the last 4 years almost £195,000 has been secured by the Parish Council and in partnership with other organisations to deliver projects in the Parish and improve services.

# CAN IT REALLY BE SPRINGTIME - FINALLY AFTER A LONG, COLD AND WET WINTER?



Snowdrops, like the ones shown in this picture, can be seen at this time of year in many gardens in the village and are often seen poking their white heads out of the freshly fallen snow. After such a long and cold winter they give a clear indication that Spring is on the way.

## Gardening in March

There is always something to be done in the garden even in these early months of the year. Some tips for next month are given below.

### In the Borders

If the soil is workable, March is a good month to dig in an inch (or more) layer of compost or well rotted manure into your borders to help with the growing in the months ahead. Any bulbs that have finished flowering indoors such as hyacinth and daffodils should now be planted in the garden and if you want to divide snowdrops that have finished flowering, now is the time to do this whilst the leaves are still green. Also it is

a good time to lift and divide herbaceous perennials to both improve their vigour and produce new plants. Prune winter flowering Jasmine and early Clematis that have finished flowering to encourage new growth for next year's flowers and trim winter flowering heathers as the flowers disappear. Deadhead Daffodils as they finish flowering and deadhead Hydrangeas before new growth appears.

### In the Vegetable Plot

Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing all weeds and forking in plenty of compost and cover the soil with plastic sheets to keep it drier and warmer ready

for planting. At the end of the month plant any early potatoes outside in the ground or in potato growing kits on a patio. Start to sow seeds of carrots, radishes and lettuce in sheltered borders directly or under cloches.

### General

Other jobs in the garden include top dressing containers by removing the top 2 inches of compost and replace it with new. Mulch fruit trees with well rotted manure or garden compost taking care not to mound up around the trunk and mulch rhubarb. Start sowing bedding plant seeds so that they are ready to plant out after the late frosts.

# HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND HELPS THE STUDENTS FROM ST BEDE'S

The Heritage Lottery Fund has helped students from St Bede's School to celebrate the history of the Lindisfarne Gospels.

St Bede's Catholic Cluster of Schools in Derwentside has received a grant of £9,600 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for their project 'The Lindisfarne Gospels: A Transition Journey'.

Inspired by the exhibition of the

Lindisfarne Gospels in Durham, the project will give the pupils in all nine of the Catholic schools the opportunity to explore, participate in and celebrate the heritage of this hugely significant manuscript throughout 2013.

Primarily, the activities will be focussed on Year 6 pupils making the transition to St Bede's. They will take part in a hands-on, creative project

supported by the Sixth Form volunteers and led by the professional artist, Vicky Holbrough. The pupils will use the intricate artwork and iconography of the Gospels to inform their own design ideas. They will learn skills in metal embossing and the application of ink in order to create a collaborative piece of art that will showcase their response to the Lindisfarne Gospels and its symbolism.

The creative element of the project will conclude in July 2013 when the resulting collective piece of art will be unveiled by local author and storyteller Adam Bushnell at a celebration event at St Bede's Catholic School.

The students will conclude the project in October by visiting Holy Island and seeing where the Lindisfarne Gospels originated for themselves. During

the visit the children will take part in the various activities based on the Gospels and the Northern Saints, bringing the project full circle.

The Lindisfarne Gospels book is one of the greatest landmarks of human cultural achievement. Created by the community of St Cuthbert on Lindisfarne it is one of the best examples of creativity and craftsmanship from Medieval times.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Hansard tells us that the work of the cross-party select Committees involved in scrutinising the legislature is improving public perceptions of Parliament. It points to the work of the Public Accounts Committee in naming and shaming big companies who are avoiding paying tax, the Culture & Media Committee in phone hacking and the establishment of the Leveson Inquiry and lately the Education Select Committee's influential role in a governmental change of heart on scrapping GCSEs.

I was part of that Committee and heard overwhelming evidence from schools, head teachers, universities, and learned bodies, employers, exam boards and even from the independent regulator that whilst reform is needed the GCSE brand still delivers what is required of it. There is evidence of grade creep and equivalences and incessant re-sits but we were told loudly and

repeatedly that those are issues that can be addressed within the brand. We also heard evidence of concerns that wholesale education market reform and competition and franchising with examinations could result in problems similar to those we now see in the energy and rail industries. I do not take full credit for the Secretary of State for Education's change of heart on GCSEs and market reform but I do think that the Select Committee report was probably just the last straw and I am proud to have been part of that inquiry and delighted at what I think is the best possible outcome for our young people.

So, just for you, we stayed in the village for our January get together and we'll endeavour to stay in some more during the coming year. It was really cold and wintery for our first outing of 2013 and nowhere could have been nicer, more cosy, nearer and totally picturesque as the snowflakes were falling outside the window onto the village green - we were of course in our very own King's Head

which is always very popular with villagers and the wider public alike. Lovely and warm and very welcoming the King's Head is always on hand. They have a lovely pensioners' special, an extensive *ala carte* with chefs regularly changing specials + themed nights - one was coming up when we were there which was the Burns Night - 2 courses for £9.95/3 courses for £12.95 - and the piping in of the Haggis. Meals are really nicely presented on oblong plates with vegetables and their various sauces in individual containers which allows for personal choice of how much to add. We were quite full but - they had treacle sponge and it was a very cold day and it is practically impossible to resist such an item - with custard/cream totally scrumptious, some had sherry trifle which was also very nice. So, we had a most enjoyable lunch and we would highly recommend you popping down to see the lovely Leanne at the King's Head Lanchester. Maybe we'll see you there someday.




## Amigos and Friends Reunited
