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LANCHESTER BANNER CELEBRATION EVENT

On Friday 27th June the streets in Lanchester came alive with music and dancing to celebrate the conclusion of a year long banner project.

The Fenhall Drift Lodge Banner was made in 1960 and carries illustrations of the Parish Church on one side and a Roman Figure and Miner on the other side. Following the closure of the mine in 1963, the banner was relocated to several communities across County Durham.

The Banner is owned by Durham Miners' Association and was returned to Lanchester in 2012 under the custodianship of Lanchester Parish Council.

Lanchester Miners' Banner Group was formed in 2012. They raised over £24,000 and over the last year have delivered a comprehensive community project which has included: necessary conservation works being undertaken on the original banner; the production of a replica banner; art and dance workshops in the schools and the production of a community information leaflet and schools pack. A celebration of the banner project organised

by Lanchester Parish Council with support from Lanchester Miners' Banner Group took place on Friday 27th June. Front Street was closed to traffic as the banner was paraded along the street. At 1.30 pm the replica banner led by representatives from the churches: Rev Rupert Kalus; Ray Hill and Canon Bob Spence; followed by Lanchester Brass Band and accompanied by several hundred local school children paraded along Front Street from Lanchester EP Primary School to the Village Green. It was a magnificent spectacle.

At the Village Green the children provided a magnificent display of maypole and traditional miners' rapper dancing. In addition, music was played by Lanchester Brass Band and singing by students from St Bede's School. Light refreshments were available.


Proceedings opened with a speech from Councillor Ossia Johnson who thanked the Banner Committee drawn from all sections of the community; all schools who took part; Jim Davenport and Kate Stockwell for their

conservation skills; Emma and Edgar from Durham Bannermakers; Aubrey O'Brien and Burt Hunter for teaching maypole and rapper dancing to the children at the primary schools; Lanchester Brass Band; students who sang so well from St Bede; Michael Knowles Mk Print; all volunteers; and of course Sally Laverick who led the whole project which took many hours of work, and for all those who contributed to delivering it.

This memorable event which involved so many people and children will long be remembered in the history of Lanchester.

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TRIBUTE TO BRIAN CUTHBERT

The funeral of a lifelong Lanchester resident, Brian Cuthbert, who died on July 1st, took place in Lanchester Methodist Church on Monday 7th July. The service was conducted by Mr Douglas Graham (brother-in-law of Brian) and Mr Ian Andrew. The size of

the congregation showed the high regard in which Brian was held. Brian was born in Greta Place on 19th July 1937 and attended school at the old EP School, (now the Community Centre) and The Green School. As a young boy he joined The Life Boys, and he remained a keen member of the Boys' Brigade for many years. He played the bugle in the BB Band and became a lieutenant. On leaving school, Brian started work as an apprentice bricklayer for a local builder, Mr Dodie March, and was later

employed by Lanchester Rural District Council, then by Stanley Urban Council, and when Derwentside Council was formed he was transferred to that authority. Brian worked there as a builder for the rest of his working life.

He married his wife, Elsie Graham, in 1960 at Lanchester Methodist Church and they started their married life at Colepike Farm Cottages. They moved into Prospect Terrace in 1964. They had 3 daughters, Janet, Karin and Alison, and 4 grand daughters,

Caroline, Joanne, Kate and Chloe.

In his spare time Brian was always busy doing jobs for family and friends, building garages, doing makeovers to houses and repairing farm buildings etc. As Elsie was the chapel caretaker, Brian did a lot of practical jobs to help her at Chapel such as doing repairs and seeing to the heating for extra services. When Croft View Hall was first renovated, Brian did a lot of the building work and when the Chapel was significantly altered Brian would work in the church

before and after his regular Council work.

At 52, Brian had to give up work after suffering 2 heart attacks. As part of his recovery. Brian took to walking and was often seen on the footpaths in and around Lanchester, enjoying conversations with everyone he met. He enjoyed family occasions, especially spending time with his grandchildren, who enjoyed his banter, stories and rhymes. He will be greatly missed and fondly remembered by all his family and friends.

You may be aware that the Community Centre is having a difficult time since The Richmond Fellowship ceased to operate in Lanchester. Not only were they our major user of the Dining Room but they also rented our office to carry out their business. To reduce the impact of this we have taken steps to reduce our expenditure,

but the full effect will not be seen until next year. In the meantime we are working hard to introduce new users to the Centre. I am grateful to those individuals and organisations that have donated £1,800 in the first six months of the year, so please keep the donations coming in and help us secure our future for many years to come.

Our task this year is to reduce the anticipated loss of £10,000 to zero and it is still possible to do this with your help, so please make a donation, become a Member or a Friend and why not join our monthly Community Draw where you will have the opportunity to win up to £50.

WHAT'S NEW

We have been fortunate to raise £6,000 in grants from the Area Action Partnership and the County Durham Community Foundation

and donations from our organisations of £1,000 specifically to refurbish the Main and Small Halls. This money has been used to decorate both halls, for new chairs, curtains and blinds and to extend storage space in the Small Hall.

We need to do some outside work to replace the guttering and re-point

the building. The perimeter wall needs repairing and parts of the car park need resurfacing. We also need some new external doors. All this work will cost in the region of £7,500. We have already started to seek funding and Durham County Council has awarded us a grant of £1,617 for some of this work. POLICE REPORT

At our recent PACT meeting on Tuesday 1st July, we discussed the previous month's priority which was speeding on Station Road and Cadger Bank. We have been monitoring the area with the use of our Community Speedwatch and Laser Gun equipment. On Station Road no vehicles were identified to be speeding over 25 mph, however on Cadger Bank 7 vehicles were seen speeding and warning letters were sent to the registered keeper's address. The community decided to change the priority for this month to parking on Peth Bank due to the volume of vehicles in the area, some of which are causing unnecessary obstruction to other road users and to pedestrians using the pavement. Police have been implementing various problem solving methods to try and resolve the issue on a long term basis instead of just issuing fines to drivers which is only a short term solution. Officers are however monitoring the area on a daily basis and issuing

£30 Fixed Penalty Notices to any vehicles seen causing unnecessary obstruction.

On Sunday 10th August between 1-4pm we will be at Malton Picnic Site hosting an Operation Spoke security marking event, so if you would like your bicycle or scooter marked for free please pop along to our event. Since Operation Spoke was introduced in January 2014 we have managed to security mark over 4500 bicycles across County Durham and Darlington with 620 marked within Consett and 130 in Lanchester.

On Sunday 6th July we were at Lanchester Agricultural Show with colleagues from Farmwatch and volunteers from Stray Aid providing free dog chipping. During the event we managed to raise almost £200 for Stray Aid and almost 20 dogs were chipped.

Our next PACT meeting will take place on Tuesday 5th August at 6.30 pm outside Burnhope Primary School.

The practice is planning to have an official Open Session on the afternoon of Thursday 18th September from 2.00 pm to 5.00 pm where patients can come and meet the staff and have a look round the new building.

GOODBYE TO MINISTER



We say goodbye to Methodist Minister, Rev Gavin Hume, his wife and family who leave Lanchester after seven years. Gavin will be taking up a post in Newcastle on 1st September, whilst his wife, Tracey, will continue her work as Deacon in the Gateshead area. The family will reside in the Manse at Whickham.

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SIR TOM COWIE DAY HOSPICE OPENS

In glorious weather to suit the occasion, on Wednesday 9th July, the first phase of the new hospice was opened by Lady Cowie, wife of the late Sir Tom, who died in January 2012. He had donated £500,000 towards the project. Day palliative care will begin on 10th July for up to 20 patients. It was appropriate that Willow Burn is now in its 25th year. Over one hundred people, all supporters of Willow Burn in one form or another gathered in the new building to hear CEO, Helen Mills, open proceedings by introducing Lady Cowie and new Chairman of the Trustees Board, Durham businessman, and member of the Durham and Darlington Foundation Trust, Mike Waterston, who gave a brief

introduction of his vision for the future. Lady Cowie unveiled the plaque with a lovely speech saying that her late husband would have loved to have been here today to see the fulfillment of the project named after him. She was presented with a bouquet by young boy Arron Woodhead, and a sapling from the tree planting area of land, also donated by Sir Tom to the hospice, presented by Helen Mills. At the end of formalities Helen Mills made a passionate speech about the dedication of Willow Burn staff, volunteers, and her hope for Phase 2, the inpatient 6 bedded hospice, to go ahead, for which fund raising has already begun. This will be followed by Phase 3, again dependent on

money available, which will hopefully be completed by 2020. This project will include: physiotherapy; hydrotherapy; steam room; sauna; living kitchens and bereavement suite. She concluded with the announcement of a sponsorship scheme for individuals, groups and companies who are asked to sign a pledge to raise £1000 in the coming year to go towards the new planned developments. In excess of £2 million is needed to complete the whole project. The afternoon ended with tours of the new building and a Strawberry Tea.

Gardening in August

August is about school holidays and, for us gardeners it is traditionally harvest time when we enjoy the benefits of our endeavours, consume what we can and pickle, preserve and freeze what we can't to enjoy in the lean winter months ahead. The month also means keeping on top of routine chores such as watering and pruning.

In the Flower Borders

Jobs in borders include dead-heading bedding and perennial plants to stop them seeding and encouraging further flowering; trimming lavender plants after they have finished flowering but not cutting into old wood; cutting back faded perennials to keep borders tidy; pruning climbing and rambling roses once they have finished flowering;

and taking cuttings from tender perennials such as pelargoniums and fuchsia to propagate them for next year. Also keep patio plants well watered and feed with a liquid fertiliser once every two weeks. If you sowed seeds of winter bedding (eg pansy, violas, bellis, etc) last month, they should now be transplanted and grown on in their own pots ready for planting out next month.

In the Vegetable Plot

In August harvest, eat and freeze peas, runner and French beans and pinch out the tops of runner beans once they have reached the tops of their supports to encourage the formation of side shoots and further flowering. Keep harvesting courgettes to stop them growing too big. Check for cabbage white butterfly eggs on

the underside of brassica leaves and squash any that are found. Pinch out the tops of tomato plants to encourage growth of the fruit already formed when five or six trusses have been produced on each plant. Lift and dry onions, shallots and garlic once the foliage shows signs of dying and bending over. Store them in onion bags to stop them going mouldy.

General

August is a good month to give hedges a final trim before they stop growing. Turn your compost in the compost bin to keep it well aerated and speed up the decomposition process. Use water butts as much as you can to water your plants and recycle water by putting washing-up water in a bucket for watering beds, lawns, rhubarb patches, etc.

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A DAY AT THE SEASIDE

Reception and Year 2 Classes from All Saints' Primary School enjoyed a really fantastic seaside day at the beach at South Shields on Tuesday 8th July. The heavy downpours that had been forecast previously on the news, were over by the time we arrived at South Shields and the weather improved gradually all day, ending in a very warm and really sunny afternoon.

The children were kept busy making sand sculptures in small groups, learning about the hazards of the beach, and about the tides and the sea from the very informative

RNLI lifeguards. They also played beach ball games and, of course, had a picnic. The South Shields beach was an excellent venue for them with clean and safe sand and plenty of facilities.

This term Year 2 have been learning about the history of holidays at the seaside and the geography of human and physical coastline features so the visit fitted in well with their studies.

The staff are grateful to the many parents and helpers who made sure that the children had a wonderful day out.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Summer Roast Vegetables with Chick Peas

Make use of the plethora of summer vegetables that are so readily available in both shops and gardens at this time of the year for a healthy and very colourful summer supper. The quantities below serve four people.

Ingredients
3 courgettes, thickly sliced
1 aubergine, cut into thick fingers
3 garlic cloves
2 red peppers, deseeded and chopped into slices
2 large baking potatoes, peeled and cut into bite-sized chunks
1 onion, chopped
1 tbsp coriander seeds
2 tbsp olive oil
400g tin chopped tomatoes
400g tin chick peas, drained and rinsed

Crusty bread to serve

Method
1. Heat oven to 220 C/ 200 C fan/gas 7. Tip all the vegetables into a large roasting tin and toss with the coriander seeds, most of the olive oil and some seasoning. Spread everything out to a single layer, then roast for 45 minutes, tossing once or twice until the vegetables are roasted and brown around the edges. Remove from the oven.
2. Place the roasting tin on the hob over a low heat, then add the tomatoes and chick peas. Bring to a simmer and gently stir. Season to taste and drizzle with the remaining oil. Serve from the tin or pile into a serving dish. Eat with hunks of bread.

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
