VILLAGE HAS LOST DIRECT BUS TO NEWCASTLE

Lanchester no longer has a direct bus service to Newcastle. From 25th October, passengers for Newcastle will have to change buses at Stanley. Go North East say "Earlier in the year, we consulted upon a number of proposed changes to services. Nearly 3,000 responses were received during this consultation period, which gave valuable feedback to the proposals, all of which was taken into account before plans were finalised. These changes are designed to provide more fast, frequent and reliable services."

We wonder why the village newspaper, the Parish Council and the Lanchester Partnership were not informed about

this consultation. The closure of the direct link to the area's largest city is of major importance to people of Lanchester. Go North East say "At

Stanley Bus Station, services are timed to arrive and depart at similar times, making interchange between services simple and

straightforward." But what happens if a bus is delayed as often happens in city traffic? Passengers returning from Newcastle may have to wait up to 30

minutes to get a connection to Lanchester.

It is true that the Stanley to Newcastle service has been improved as it is now a 15 minute service but this is at the loss of Lanchester's direct link. For your information to get to Newcastle you need to catch the new Venture 30 bus to Stanley which is scheduled to run every 30 minutes and comes into stand F. Transfer to stand J for the X30, X31 or X32 which are now called 'ToonLink' to Newcastle. On the plus side, there are now 9 buses a day on Sunday for the 15A service to Durham or Consett instead of the previous 8 and the service now departs at a regular hourly time.

Many people will miss having a bank in the village and will have the inconvenience of travelling to Consett, Stanley or Durham if they need to visit the bank. However, many villagers will miss the staff more than the bank!

Kim Gourlay and Hilary McKay have worked on

the counter for 14 and 15 years respectively. They have always been efficient, kind and helpful to their customers and they didn't need Barclays training for that - it always came naturally. Both Kim and Hilary felt it was a privilege to work in Lanchester with so many lovely customers and are

very sad that the bank is closing and they will be moving on. Kim will be transferring to Consett Branch, while Hilary will have to travel to Durham, to Barclays in the Market Place.

Whilst at Lanchester they have both worked through several floods, which has entailed coping with

various problems, including one occasion where Kim tried to unblock a drain filled with leaves, with her bare hands. On the positive side it has been a delight to be involved in fundraising for local charities for which Barclays have given matched funding. Organisations which have

benefited from this are as follows: Willow Burn Hospice, Lanchester Partnership, British Red Cross, All Saints' Primary School, St Bede's Catholic School and Sixth Form College.

The bank closed at midday on Friday 23rd October along with the closure of the ATM machine.

LANCESTER COMMUNITY CENTRE NEWSLETTER OCTOBER 2015

I am pleased to tell you that our insurance claim of almost £4,000 has been settled and all of the damaged doors and the equipment stolen in the recent burglary have been replaced. The amount received from the insurance company will cover the cost of the stolen equipment, but we have had to spend more on the replacement doors to make the Community Centre more secure. We do have plans to replace all of our external doors as soon as funds become available. We have purchased a new computer for the administration staff from the £400 grant received from the Mid Durham Area Action Partnership and replaced one of the stolen laptops at a cost of £200. The car park has had some temporary repairs costing £900 but we will need to resurface most of it in the future and indications are that this will cost about £10,000. We have decided not to proceed with extending the Gym at present but we will be purchasing some additional weights and installing them in the existing Gym area.

The introduction of the Living Wage in 2016 is good news for our staff and I am delighted for them. However, as all of our salaries are linked to the minimum wage, this is going to cause us significant financial difficulty in future. We will need to find an additional £2,500 each year. We will do all we can to reduce expenditure, but it is likely that room rates will have to increase by more than the Retail Price Index.

POLICE REPORT

Our last PACT meeting was held on Tuesday 6th October. Over the past few months local officers have been tackling issues of Antisocial Behaviour within Lanchester village. Through extended patrols, targeting offenders and engaging with the community we are satisfied that these problems have reduced greatly, however we will continue to show a high level of presence in the village to prevent issues escalating again. Colleagues achieved a good result on Friday 16th October when officers attended the rear of The Green School and stopped a group of youths in the process of smoking cannabis. The group were all searched and a 15 year old male was found in possession of a quantity of cannabis. He is currently assisting officers. This action follows an increased volume of intelligence being received regarding drug activity in the village which will continue to be tackled.

Two good court results were achieved this month involving two residents from Lanchester - a male who was stopped driving while disqualified and a female who was stopped driving while under the influence of alcohol. The male was found guilty and

remains disqualified pending test passed, was also issued with an 8 week sentence suspended for 12 months, 6 penalty points on his licence and a fine of £600. The female was also found guilty and has been disqualified from driving until September 2018. The darker nights are slowly creeping in so now is the time for everyone to be vigilant regarding home security and ensuring everything is locked and secured. In order to help and reassure residents, PCSO Lisa Jackson will be hosting a free bicycle marking event outside Johnson's Newsagents in Burnhope on Sunday 1st November between 2-4pm so please come along. Lisa will also have a quantity of security advice information for the home, sheds and vehicles for residents to take. On Saturday 31st October between 2-4pm Lisa will be hosting a bicycle marking event at Consett Police Station in the Front Office. Everyone who visits and gets their bicycle marked will receive a free set of bicycle lights.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Parliament resumed on Monday 12th October after a hectic conference season. I returned not just to my role as the MP for North West Durham but also as a new Shadow Education Minister. Having spent 25 years working in education this is a dream role for me. I have never been particularly interested in promotion and would not have taken just any role but to be offered education and to have my expertise recognised is gratifying. Childcare and early years education are not strictly speaking my areas of expertise but then I am probably as expert as anyone else in Parliament given that the Minister I 'shadow' was an investment banker until 2010. It is a bit of a baptism by fire as there is a Childcare Bill about to hit the House of Commons. The Bill began life in the Lords and is expected to reach the Commons in late November / early December. I will be leading on the Bill through 2nd Reading,

Committee and 3rd reading. The main purpose of the Bill is to provide 30 hours of free child care for working parents of 3 and 4 year olds, which is great. However, as always, the devil is in the detail and it is the detail I will be wanting to see and properly scrutinise. Last month in this article I talked about the refugee crisis in the Mediterranean and the people that I spoke with who are camped at Calais. The seasons seem to have moved on very quickly and we are now in the season of mellow fruitfulness, days are getting shorter and noticeably cooler and winter will soon be upon us. With this in mind I am supporting the Red Cross who are

LANCHESTER BRASS BAND PATRONS CONCERT

Over the years, Lanchester Brass Band has given many concerts, all of which have been enjoyed and acclaimed by their various audiences. Saturday September 19th was no exception. It was their Patrons' Concert which is held every year in the Methodist Church. All those who attended would agree that it was a very commendable concert. Lewis has been the Musical Director of the band since 2013 and has brought the band to a new level of confidence and performance, with his expertise, personality, talent and skill. It is with much regret that he has had to

relinquish this role due to increased work commitments, going into his final year of study at Durham University.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Creamy Red Pepper and Butternut Squash Soup

It's October, days are growing shorter and nights becoming a bit chilly. Autumnal weather needs warming home made soups and this one is easy to prepare. It's smooth and thick and has a wonderful colour and taste.

Serves 4, suitable for vegetarians and suitable for freezing.

INGREDIENTS

Butter 1oz (25g)

Onion, 1 large, chopped
Butternut squash, 1 medium, peeled, deseeded and chopped into chunks. You'll need roughly 500g (1lb 2oz) when peeled and deseeded.

Red pepper, 1, deseeded and chopped

Vegetable stock cubes, 2, dissolved in 450 ml hot water

Cream cheese, 7oz (200g)
Milk 450ml

Chives 2 tablespoons, chopped

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

METHOD

1) Melt the butter in a very large saucepan. Add the onion and fry gently for about 3 minutes, until softened but not browned.

2) Add the butternut squash, red pepper and vegetable stock. Heat until the mixture starts to simmer then turn the heat to low and cook gently for about 20 minutes, partially covered, until the

vegetables are soft and tender.

3) Transfer the mixture to a blender or food processor and add about half the cream cheese. Blend together for about 15-20 seconds, until completely smooth.

4) Return the mixture to the saucepan and add the milk and half the chives. Stir thoroughly and reheat until piping hot. Taste and adjust the seasoning.

5) Ladle the soup into warmed bowls and top each portion with a dollop of the cream cheese. Sprinkle with the remaining chives and a little extra ground black pepper, then serve.



THREAT TO SMALLHOPE BURN



The photograph has been taken from the bridge at The King's Head, as an example of the text. Many others photographs could have been taken along Smallhope Burn.

Long time village resident and former Parish Councillor, Michael Carr, has brought to the attention of The Village Voice, the situation regarding Smallhope Burn and other waterways in the vicinity of the village. It would appear that there will be a major risk of flooding again if action is not taken soon. There is an enormous amount of Himalayan Balsam, also known as Indian Balsam, Jumping Jack and Policeman's Helmet, related to the Busy Lizzie family, on the banks and in Smallhope

Burn. The botanical name is Impatiens Glanulifera. This plant, introduced to the UK in 1859, is now rampant in many rivers and streams nationwide. It grows to a height of about two to three metres and each plant expels up to 2500 seeds per pod. It is purplish pink in colour, sometimes but rarely white. It grows in moist soil anywhere, but particularly on river banks. It encroaches down the sides of the banks into the river, as our photograph shows. It tolerates low water levels, shades out other

vegetation, impoverishing habitats.

It can be controlled by pulling out or cutting. Chemicals may be used but only after contacting the Environment Agency for approval. Although introduced as a flower all those years ago it is now considered an alien weed, rampant, particularly in Smallhope Burn which could eventually affect the village. This is a nationwide problem. In Somerset, 'Friends of the River Frome' has been formed to try to alleviate this problem.

On a lighter but pertinent note, the next Duck Race to be organised, probably next year in aid of Willow Burn, may well be ruined, or even cancelled, as the burn is gradually getting clogged up with this outrageously uncontrolled plant. Hopefully, the relevant authorities will learn of this serious problem and do something about it quickly during the next few months.




