LANCHESTER BUCKS TREND

In the latest Durham County Council elections, Lanchester bucked the trend of a swing away from the Labour party. Overall Labour lost 20 seats dropping from 94 seats to 74. Labour now has a majority over all other councillors of 22 seats, although the opposition to Labour is very diverse and contains many independents. However in Lanchester both seats went to Labour. Ossie Johnson retained his seat and Jude Considine narrowly defeated sitting councillor, Richie Young (Derwentside Independents). See page 5 for full results.

A Faith tea was held at the Farm on Friday May 12th to mark two very special events: Firstly, Betty Whaley née Howden, a

regular deliverer of the Village Voice, was celebrating living at Hollinside Terrace for 75 years, having moved in as a child.

Secondly, the occupants of Hollinside Terrace were celebrating its 125 year existence; the Terrace was built in 1892 to house miners from Ferens and Love's Colepike and Ford Drifts. Betty raised a toast to the recently restored Goose House and talked about her experiences of coming from Northumberland to Lanchester, and John Gall

gave an introduction to Hollinside Terrace and its associated history. Copies of the original plans, drawn up by John and William Rutter, Architects of Durham, were shown. The originals are housed in Durham County Record Office, as part of the Lanchester Rural District Council records, which detail many of the buildings in the parish from the 1880s.

A lovely evening was had by all, including residents of the Terrace, past and present, and surrounding farming families.

WI CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

This year the Women's Institute celebrates 100 years, 1917- 2017, and as part of the Durham celebrations, the Durham County Federation committee is hosting 8 afternoon teas across Durham for its members. PROJECT POPPIES 'LEST WE FORGET'

Project Poppies reaches the 1,000 mark

May is a busy month for the Poppy project with the workshop that took place on the 13th and a visit to be made to the Art Class at the Community Centre on the 25th. The workshop attracted around 50 people who enthusiastically either made poppies or painted them or both. It was again a hugely successful day as the total of 231 poppies made on the day took us past the 1,000 mark plus we had 171 painted. The current overall total is 1,111 made of which 501 are completed and in storage; 171 are painted and 324 are dried or drying and waiting to be painted. It is seven months since the first workshop in November 2016 and at the current rate of production we estimate a total figure of around 4,500 poppies

will be made, finances allowing. The starting figure of 2,515, which is the number of names from World War 1 on the war memorials in Derwentside, is likely to be achieved at the workshop in January 2018. A great deal of praise must go to those members and organisations of our community who have participated in the project. The list for the special poppies for those who want to remember someone, with a poppy

carrying a dog tag with the person's name on it, is now open. These poppies cost £10 each and will be displayed outside the Methodist Church during October/November 2018 with the rest of the poppies and will then be given to the person who has ordered it together with a commemorative certificate for them to keep. Orders have already been received from Consett, Stanley, Gateshead, Chester le Street, Jarrow and Chelmsford and an

enquiry has been received from Toronto, Canada. The current newsletter which is being updated for every workshop was available with the main points being the setting up of a Facebook page (Project Poppies) which carries all the latest information and a list of

workshop dates for the remainder of 2017. These are 24th June, 23rd September and 4th November. Further workshops will take place in 2018 starting in January and the dates for these will be confirmed in due course.

LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Annual Meeting held on Tuesday 16th May 2017

Councillor Ossie Johnson was elected as Chairperson for the ensuing year and signed his Declaration of Acceptance of Office. Councillor Keith Harrison was elected as Vice Chairperson for the ensuing year. Councillors were selected to sit on committees and working groups. Lanchester Parish Council confirmed that it meets the criteria to adopt the General Power of Competence and adopts the Power. Banking arrangements were confirmed.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 16th May 2017

Minutes

Ordinary Meeting 4th April, Planning Meeting 4th April - approved.

It was agreed that information is sought from Durham County Council on progress following the refusal of a retrospective planning application.

Police Report - The Police report provided by PCSO Lisa Jackson was read out. Local youths are meeting again under the bridge to the rear of the King's Head Pub. Patrols have been increased by local officers and Neighbourhood Wardens. Evidence has been found to support suspicions that drug activity is attracting individuals to the area. Work is currently underway to revise the fenced area to prevent access.

There was no increase in anti-social behaviour over the Easter holidays.

On 22nd April a Police pursuit took place. The vehicle was stopped within Lanchester and the occupants were arrested. Members discussed the building works at the EP Primary School which is causing ongoing problems with traffic congestion and inappropriate parking. It was agreed that the Police are asked for an update on the situation and invited to the next meeting to inform Members.

1. Letter - resident - repair of street signs - It was confirmed that the maintenance of street signs is a County Council responsibility and that the matter be passed to them to action.

2. Letter - Parish Church - use of Park House Play Area It was agreed that permission be given to the Parish Church to use Park House Play Area for a family picnic in July.

3. National Association of Local Councils (NALC) and County Durham Association of Local Councils (CDALC) - annual subscription agreed.

4. Society of Local Council Clerks (SLCC) - annual membership fee agreed.

5. County Durham and Cleveland County Training Partnership - training - Councillors and Chairmanship - Members received information on upcoming training opportunities for Councillors and on Chairmanship.

6. Society of Local Council Clerks - Regional Training Seminar - agreed that the Clerk attends the seminar.

7. Letter of thanks - for the Heritage Audit Report.

8. Letters of thanks were received for donations received from:

Citizens Advice County Durham, All Saints' Catholic Primary School, All Saints' Parish Centre, Great North Air Ambulance, Lanchester and Burnhope Parochial Church Council.

9. Clerk & Councils Direct - May magazine received.

10. The Clerk Magazine - May magazine received.

11. War Memorials Trust - May Bulletin received.

Councillor Induction Sessions

Members considered arrangements for an Induction Session for new and continuing Councillors. It was agreed that an informal question and answer session would be useful.

Area Action Partnership (AAP)/Parish Councils Committee (PCC)

Members were informed of the arranged sports and environmental activities for children which would take place on Monday and Thursday mornings in the first five weeks of the summer holidays. These activities are arranged through the AAP and this is the second year of a 2-year programme. It was agreed that a contribution of £250.00 towards the activities for 2017 be made. The AAP is organising forum events across the area during June and July to gather information from communities to formulate

Village Action Plans. A session has been arranged in Lanchester to take place at Lynwood House on Tuesday 11th July between 4.30 pm - 6.30 pm. It was agreed to ask the AAP to consider putting an article in the Village Voice to promote the forum and to send the AAP the community information which was gathered through the Neighbourhood Plan questionnaire.

Members were provided with an update on the joint purchase of CCTV fly tipping cameras. The cameras have been deployed at eleven sites across the AAP area, four within Lanchester. Three separate incidents are currently being investigated.

Neighbourhood Plan

The minutes of the meeting were approved. Members were informed that work continues on progressing the Neighbourhood Plan. The Heritage Audit documents are now distributed and work continues to develop policies for the plan.

Hanging Baskets - It was agreed to provide hanging baskets in the village in 2017.

Maintenance Report - received.

Insurance Premium 2017/18 - it was agreed that the insurance premium be accepted.

Internal Audit Report 2016/17 - received.

Financial Year 2016/17 - End of Year Accounts

It was agreed that the council approves: the Annual Return - Annual Governance Statement, the Annual Return - Accounting Statement and the financial position for the end of year.

Financial report - discussed and approved. **Accounts for Payment** - approved.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council to be held on Tuesday 13th June 2017 at Lynwood House at 7.15 pm.





LANCHESTER COMMUNITY HERITAGE AUDIT

The Lanchester Community Heritage Audit was commissioned by Lanchester Parish Council. The Lanchester Heritage Audit was carried out by a group of volunteers from the local community with support from North of England Civic Trust (NECT).

60 local residents attended a mapping session in January 2016 and over 200 'Heritage Assets' were identified. Assets identified included significant buildings, archaeological sites, industrial remains, key views and evidence of military activity over the years. Following review 170 assets were confirmed. A group of 20 volunteers were trained in field recording, basic assessment of condition, principles of heritage conservation and understanding the concept of significance. The 20 volunteers worked over a 6 month period to record, describe and evaluate all the assets.

The result of the work has been the production of a Lanchester Community Heritage Audit report, a gazetteer providing information on all the

identified assets and a catalogue of photographs. The full range of documents can be viewed at the Library, Community Centre, the Parish Council office at Lynwood House and the archive section at County Hall.

Copies of the Heritage Audit Report can be picked up from the

Library, Community Centre, Post Office and Lynwood House.

We hope that you will enjoy the Heritage Audit documents.

THE BISHOP AUCKLAND CASTLE PROJECT

The History Society enjoyed a glimpse into the future plans for this 900 year old Bishop's Palace and the town.

Chris Walkinshaw gave us a brief history of the Harrowing of the North in 1068 and the appointment of the first Prince Bishop, William Walchier. This new role of both political and military presence in the North was to prevent further rebellion in the area and to prevent invasion from Scotland in these turbulent times. By 1832 with the Reform Bill, this appointment and all its roles terminated and the Bishop of Durham was

stripped of his powers. Lee Brownson explained how Jonathan Ruffer bought the Castle and the famous Francisco de Zubaran painting and set up the Auckland Castle Trust. This was a turning point in its history, opening for the first time in 2012. At present the Castle is closed for refurbishment - re-opening spring 2018. Jonathan Ruffer's vision, plans and £100million project investment is very exciting in terms of opportunities - employment, visitors, volunteers and the wider regeneration of Bishop Auckland.

The Mining Art Gallery opens first (October 2017 - Old Bank Chambers building) showing mining's impact and exploring why miners chose to paint - 300 pieces of work including Norman Cornish and Tom McGuinness.

The new Welcome Building (Spring 2018 - information and meeting facilities) features a 29 metre high tower and 15 metre viewing platform representing a siege engine.

The Walled Garden (Spring 2019) will produce food for the restaurant and hopes to grow pineapples (as in

past centuries). Romag Ltd, Consett is supplying glass to form a unique architectural 'domed' building similar to the Eden Project.

A Faith Museum (Spring 2019) comprises 10 galleries, a quiet contemplation room, with artefacts including a Tyndale Bible 1526. A Spanish Gallery and Research centre (2020) will bring together art from The Prado Museum, Madrid, and opportunities to learn basic Spanish. A Tapas restaurant will provide further cultural experiences.

Following Kynren's success and with a shortage of bed spaces, two local hotels will be refurbished for overnight visitors.

There are many opportunities for local people - jobs, apprenticeships, volunteering and suppliers. Interested? View www.aucklandcastle.org.

We are all looking forward to this very exciting and truly inspirational venue within County Durham. We were delighted to get such an insight into this marvellous development. Not long now ...

NEW EQUIPMENT FOR WILLOW BURN

It was an exciting day at Willow Burn Hospice on Thursday April 27th because they were expecting a special delivery. Mr Gary Williams who is the Operations Manager from the MRS Training and Rescue Centre (which used to be Mines Rescue Service) was bringing some potentially life saving equipment to the hospice. It is designed to give people the best possible quality of life whilst avoiding the need for hospital admission. This equipment will mean that maximum

support will be given to people at a very emotional and sensitive time in their lives.

The hospice first approached Gary Williams at the centre, which is based at Houghton, because they required some first aid training and Gary offered to provide this free of charge. A few weeks later the hospice got in touch again, as they had been awarded a grant from the Gannett Foundation. The grant was for some first aid equipment, namely defibrillators, evacuation

chairs and resuscitation trolleys and Gary was able to source this equipment. In addition

equipment purchased. It is worth noting that this training is valued at over £1000. What a wonderful gesture from Gary.

Diane Morgan, Day Hospice Co-ordinator of Therapies said, 'We are thrilled with the award from the Gannett Foundation and the fact that the MRS Training and Rescue Service has been able to secure that equipment for us at cost, and is also providing free training. Willow Burn Hospice was one of only two charities in the region to benefit in the current round of Gannett funding.

The morning was a great success. Gary and several members of his team were a delight to meet and of course the Willow Burn staff were, as always, so courteous and welcoming, which in all was a great example of what can be achieved when local organisations work together for the good of their fellowmen and women.

It was a very worthwhile and enjoyable occasion for everyone and indeed a privilege to attend.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Summer Vegetable Pasta

This is suitable for vegetarians and to freeze ... a great pasta bake using fresh vegetables.
Pasta shapes, 175g (6oz)
Butter, 50g, (2oz)
1 red onion, sliced
1 garlic clove, crushed
Sun-dried tomatoes in olive oil, 50g (2oz) drained and chopped
Button mushrooms, 150g (5oz), wiped and sliced
1 courgette, sliced
Baby corn, 110g, (4oz) sliced in half
Tomato pasta sauce, 1 x 275g jar
2 eggs
Greek-style natural yogurt, 300g, (11oz)

Mature Cheddar cheese, 150g, (5oz), grated
Basil or oregano, 1 tablespoon, chopped, plus sprigs to garnish
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
METHOD
1) Preheat the oven to 200 degrees C/400 degrees F/Gas 6.
2) Cook the pasta shapes in boiling, lightly salted water until just tender, about 8-10 minutes, or according to pack instructions.
3) Meanwhile, melt the butter in a large frying pan and sauté the onion and garlic gently for 5 minutes. Add the sun-dried

tomatoes and all the remaining vegetables and cook for 5 more minutes, stirring frequently.
4) Drain the pasta well and add to the vegetable mixture with the pasta sauce, stirring to combine. Transfer to a large buttered ovenproof dish.
5) Beat together the eggs and yogurt, then stir in the cheese. Add the basil or oregano and season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Pour evenly over the pasta and vegetables. Bake for 20-25 minutes until set and golden brown. Serve, garnished with fresh herb sprigs.

Tour of 'Heathland Heartlands' project sites around Morrison Busty

On 9th May a group of wild Lanchestrians popped up the road to sunny South Stanley. Laura Tedstone from Durham Wildlife Trust guided us around areas where she has worked with community volunteers for 3 years to restore their 'doorstep' heaths, funded by Heritage Lottery and Natural England. The sun provided a wealth of invertebrates including Peacock, Orange-tip and Large White butterflies. The

prize was the declining Dingy Skipper - Laura has worked to create corridors of habitat to connect sites favoured by this butterfly. The ground was literally leaping with Green Tiger Beetles, bees were buzzing and bright coloured Large Red Damsel flies added further colour to the spectacle. The UK has 20% of Europe's lowland heath. Since the 1800s, 80% of this habitat has been lost.
