An issue raised by a number of local residents in the residents' survey that I conducted earlier this year was that of the library scaffolding. This work is a blight on one of the village's most important buildings, not to mention extremely inconvenient for residents with prams, pushchairs, wheelchairs, or walking aids. There has been very little sign of progress, so I have pursued this issue, not only via the Parish Council, but also through a Freedom of Information Request to the County Council.

The County Council's response does not make happy reading. Confirming that the County Council originally granted a licence in January 2016, they have renewed the licence for the scaffolding on three occasions, and have now given the owner of the building an 'open-ended' licence for scaffolding. Unfortunately, that means that the County Council have made it very difficult for themselves to put any pressure on the landowner to move quickly. Meanwhile the County Council have

advised that the scaffolding is there "to prevent any roof related debris falling away onto the public below." I have learned that the County Council are not willing to meet the Parish Council to discuss this issue. I think that it is ridiculous that the County Council have given such a blank cheque to the owner of the building to leave scaffolding up on that building for as long as they wish. If there is a health and safety risk to Lanchester residents,

they should take action with the building as a dangerous structure. If the scaffolding is there because works are to be undertaken, they should sort this out with the landowner as quickly as possible. Either way, they need to get this sorted. To then refuse to even meet the Parish Council to discuss this shows how little interest the County Council has in the views or concerns of local people.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 12th September 2017

Minutes

Police Report - The Police report was read out.

The Community Speedwatch equipment has been deployed at Ford Road, Durham Road and Maiden Law and the laser gun has been deployed at Peth Bank and Newbiggen Lane to address speeding vehicles. Attention is to continue with enforcement action being taken where necessary.

Incidents of bogus officials have been recorded at St Bede's Court and Foxhills Crescent.

Information has been received of youths congregating at The Green School and Kitswell Park to consume alcohol. Patrols are ongoing to stop and identify those involved and seize alcohol where necessary.

8. Isolation and Loneliness - Welcome Guide - information received.

9. Durham County Council - Medium Term Financial Planning and 2018/19 Budget Setting - information received from the County Council giving details of projected tax base and Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme Grant for 2018/2019.

10. County Durham Association of Local Councils - date of AGM received.

11. Campaign to Protect Rural England - Summer 2017 - received.

12. The Clerk Magazine - July 2017 - received.

13. Clerk & Councils Direct - July and September Newsletters - received.

Area Action Partnership Members considered the Village Action Plan which had been developed following the recent Village Forum event.

Neighbourhood Plan Work has continued through the summer on policy development, mapping requirements and amendments to the Village Design Statement. A budget was approved to accommodate the

remaining stages of the plan.

Kitswell Park Play Area - Annual Inspection Report - it was agreed that the identified works be addressed.

Councillor Training - councillors gave positive feedback to recently attended training.

Outdoor Adult Fitness Equipment - Members discussed a possible project to install outdoor adult fitness equipment. It was agreed that a working group be set up to consider cost, location, need and funding.

Library Building Members were informed of recent correspondence from the County Council stating that they would be unable to attend a Parish Council meeting.

Northumbria Water Ltd Members considered the response of NWL to recent planning applications. It was agreed that a letter is sent to NWL asking for clarification on the capacity of the sewage system.

Annual Return 2016/2017 The Lead Officer went through the papers

returned from external audit. External audit confirmed that no matters had come to their attention which gave cause for concern. The Annual Return was approved and accepted.

Financial report - discussed and approved.

Accounts for Payment - approved.

Chairperson's Announcements - The Chair confirmed that Burnhope Parish Council and Lanchester Parish Council are considering a joint project to provide a beacon in 2018 as part of the 100 year commemoration of the end of World War 1.

Questions from Members

Councillor P Jackson raised concern about crossing of the roads in the village which can be problematic for many members of the community.

It was agreed that a letter is sent to the County Council asking them to consider options to address the matter.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council to be held on Tuesday 10th October 2017 at Lynwood House at 7.15 pm.

POLICE REPORT

16th September 2017

This month we have seen a reduction in the number of reports regarding youth related antisocial behaviour in the village. We are however continuing to

monitor various locations throughout the village which are prone to youths congregating to consume alcohol and/or drugs.

I have also been made aware of some graffiti which has recently appeared on the shelter near to the village green which was quickly cleaned away. However we are actively seeking to locate the offender/s in order to deal with them accordingly and to prevent similar issues throughout the village. This month we have received reports of some significant crimes which Police continue to

investigate. These included the theft of a trailer and scrap metal from an address at Durham Road on 7th September, an arson at an isolated farm whereby approximately £10,000 worth of hay was destroyed on 11th September and finally a 2 in 1 burglary which occurred at St Bede's Court on 13th September. If you have any information in relation

to any of these crimes please do not hesitate to contact Police on 101 or by emailing PCSO Lisa Cullen-Jackson. Local officers will be hosting a Street PACT event in Front Street on Saturday 14th October between 10-11 am. 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REDUCING FLOOD RISK IN THE VILLAGE

On Tuesday 12th September Durham County Council, the Environment Agency, Northumbrian Water the Wear Rivers Trust and Mott MacDonald Bentley together displayed their plans for preventing flooding in the village. They explained that the flooding in Front Street in January this year occurred at a time when they had water gauging equipment in place inside the village culverts, so they were able to monitor how the culverts actually worked during a storm. This information allowed them to design a scheme which would be less intrusive and less expensive than previous ones, as it consists of a set of relatively minor works. These are, in addition to the substantial

improvements already made to the gullies in Newbiggen Lane and the 'Beany' kerbs in Front Street:

- to reduce the flow towards the village in both the Smallhope and Alderdene Burns, when in flood, by 'natural flood management' - eg leaky dams, artificial meanders, etc;
- to reduce the run-off onto Newbiggen Lane from adjacent fields;
- to insert a very big gully grid, rather like a 2 feet wide cattle grid, across Newbiggen Lane, at a location up the road from the community orchard;
- to insert another across Newbiggen Lane opposite the Social Club;
- to insert a third one, 50 yards long, at the bottom of the grassy

bank below the fish and chip shop on Front Street;

- to improve the connection of a very old gully on Front Street.

In addition, schemes are being developed for

dealing with flooding on Maiden Law bank. These all look like sensible ideas which together should help a lot if they are constructed and are then properly

maintained. Whether they will be enough to deal with the next major cloud-burst only time will tell. Mike Gladstone, Chair, Flooding Action Group


BAPTISM CELEBRATION

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

A SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR THE HISTORY SOCIETY

Over 25 members and visitors came to our AGM. Marian Morrison gave an outline of the year and the successful speakers who have informed and entertained us, covering a varied range of interesting subjects about our social history. A summary of accounts and the positive outcomes for the society was given by David Friesner (Jean Doughty was unable to attend, and we thank her for taking on the treasurer's role and her efficiency). 'MyDad, My Hero'
Lynn Defty spoke to us about Sgt John Morrison, from 'Telegraph Boy to Bomber Boy'. Lynn's close and open relationship with her father, and her interest in her own family history and further research was quite unique. We often

wish we had asked our parents about their own history growing up in the early 1900s through to WWII, but time passes us by.

Her grandfather survived service in WWI and her father 'stepped up' and started his wireless operator training in Blackpool in 1939, before moving from 78 squadron, with Whitley's aeroplanes to 35 squadron, flying in Halifax's at Linton. He took part in many bombing raids including the Renault works in France, Cologne, Hamburg, and three Tirpitz raids up to 1942. After his plane crashed (W1053G) in Fjetten Fjord in Norway, he was helped by local people who clothed and fed him. With his escapist kit of Bovril cubes and a silk map he set off, but was captured later and was told 'his war was over'. He was taken to Stavanger jail before eventually being taken

to Stalag Luft 3 (the Great Escape camp). Lynn has incredible photos of his crashed plane, camp huts and has visited these areas with her father. They met farmers who helped him initially in Norway and remembered the episode and crew fondly. They even surprised John by presenting him with his burnt pilot's leather helmet that they had kept hidden and safe throughout the rest of the war to the present day. John survived the war, the Long March in 1945 and was demobbed in Gosforth.

Lynn gave us the frightening survival

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

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Fish Pie topped with Cheesy Mash

I've used this recipe for a long time, it's easy, the ingredients are readily available and it is a really delicious dish.

You need ...

1 small onion, chopped
1 bay leaf
600ml milk
300 ml double cream
200 g salmon fillet
200 g smoked haddock
60 g king prawns
100g butter
50 g plain flour
30 ml (2 tbsp) chopped chives
30 ml (2 tbsp) chopped flat leaf parsley
1.3 kg King Edward potatoes, peeled
Salt and ground white pepper

60 ml (4 tbsp) grated mature Cheddar cheese
30 ml (2 tbsp) of crème fraîche
1 egg

METHOD

1) Put the chopped onions in a large pan with the bay leaf, 500 ml of milk, cream, salmon and smoked haddock. Bring to the boil and simmer for about 9 minutes.
2) Lift the fish out, break into large flakes and place evenly in an ovenproof dish with the prawns.
3) Strain the cooking liquid into a jug.
4) Melt 50 g of butter in a pan, add the flour and cook for 1 minute. Take

off the heat and stir in the cooking liquid.

5) Return to the heat and bring to the boil, stirring. Simmer for 8 minutes.

6) Remove from the heat and add the parsley, chives and seasoning.

7) Pour the sauce over the fish.

8) Boil the potatoes for 20 minutes, drain and mash. Add the egg yolk, remaining butter and milk, seasoning and the crème fraîche.

9) Spoon the mash evenly over the fish and sauce. Sprinkle the cheese on top.

10) Cook in a preheated oven 200 degrees C/400 degrees F/gas mark 6 for 35-40 minutes.
