



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WORKING WITH DRONES AND NATURE TO REDUCE FLOODING

Lanchester landowners have recently joined a new three-year natural flood management initiative that will aim to reduce flooding in the town centre. The initiative has been developed by Durham County Council, Wear Rivers Trust, Durham University and landowners to improve flood resilience by working with natural processes to slow down the flow of water before it reaches the village centre. Opportunities to slow the flow and store water away from the centre were investigated using Unmanned Ariel Vehicles or drones. The focus area for this research was the Alderdene catchment which includes Newbiggen Lane, Lanchester Dairies and multiple small holdings. Drone flyovers enabled the project team to produce a detailed 3D representation of the catchment which could then be used to identify suitable areas for water storage and design and assess measures to slow and store water. These included the planting up of hedgerows and creation of infield water storage basins to intercept runoff from entering the burn. The results of the drone surveys were presented to various landowners throughout the Alderdene catchment in September 2018. Billy & Geoff Austin of Upper Houses Farm said "It's great to be working in partnership with the Wear Rivers Trust and other landowners on this project. By working together we have been able to share our knowledge, experience and expertise to help develop projects which will contribute towards reducing flooding and restore and maintain wildlife habitats." The natural flood management measures will be delivered over the course of the next 3 years and will be co-ordinated by the Wear Rivers Trust. The works will be funded by Durham County Council and The Durham Hedgerow Partnership. Durham County Council has already contributed £10,000 and has pledged a further £20,000 over the next 2 years.

HAVE YOU MISSED THE CHIMING OF OUR CLOCK?



Residents of Lanchester, have you noticed something missing in our village? Yes, the quarter chimes of our church clock have gone missing. Our clock engineers have had to visit the site on two occasions to attend to issues in respect of the quarter chimes getting out of sequence. Records also indicate that the strike, on

occasions in the past, has also malfunctioned. Many years ago, the original mechanical hand-wound clock was converted to automatic winding on the time side, with direct motor drive on the strike and quarters. The exact age of the equipment is not known but believed to be in excess of 40 years since it was installed and it is primarily the age and design of the system that is leading to the problems we are currently experiencing. There are many clocks throughout the UK that were converted to direct drive in this way but have, in recent years, been gradually upgraded to a different method of operation. The newer method makes the switching

much simpler and the counting is carried out electronically rather than mechanically. Our engineers have provided us with a quotation to manufacture a new switching system, controller and interface for the strike and quarter chime, this will cost over £3,000.

We are currently looking at ways of raising the funding to restore our chimes and would be interested to hear from any local organisations who would donate to this cause and allow the Parish Church chimes to ring out again over our wonderful village. Please contact our Churchwardens or any of our Church Officers if you are able to help.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on 9th July 2019

Minutes - Ordinary Meeting and Planning Meeting 11th June - approved.

Police report - PCSO Lewis Formosa attended the meeting and presented the police report.

Correspondence

* **Lanchester Cricket Club Football Team** - the request to use the football pitch at Kitswell Park was approved.

* **Clerk & Councils Direct** - July edition received.

* **BT Proposed removal of telephone box on Front Street** - Members received information on the proposed removal of the telephone box on Front Street.

* **Changes to local bus services** - Members received information on changes to the Lanchester bus services which will come into effect on 21st July. It was agreed to ask Go North East to place new timetables in the bus shelters and send

an article to the Village Voice explaining the changes.

Neighbourhood Plan

Mike Wardle, Chair of the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group attended the meeting to provide an update. The minutes of the meetings held on 23rd May and 5th June were approved.

The Lanchester Neighbourhood Plan pre-submission consultation document and summary document were distributed to councillors. The consultation will take place between 24th June - 9th August. The pre-submission draft document has been placed in key community locations. A display will be displayed in the Community Centre between 1st - 20th July. During this period a number of staffed sessions will be held. Written feedback will be welcomed. Feedback can be dropped into boxes in community

locations or posted or emailed to the Parish Council. Information is available on the Parish Council website. Following the consultation period the working group will meet to consider all responses and amend the document accordingly. The County Council will then undertake a further consultation and forward the document to an independent assessor. The assessor can amend the document and approve it to proceed to referendum. The working group were thanked for their continued work on the plan.

Maintenance Report - received.

Crocus Planting on the Village Green - Members were informed that a community meeting had taken place to progress the project, co-ordinated by Croft View Halls. The estimated cost of a project to plant 20,000 crocus bulbs on the Village Green is £1100. Some funding has already been secured towards the project. Local schools and organisations have been contacted and are interested in being involved. The aim is for the bulbs to be delivered

in October and planted at the end of October. It was agreed that a donation of £100 be made towards the project.

A691-bypass - Members supported information received from Durham County Council on proposed accident remedial measures on the A691/B6296 junction following a recent spate of accidents.

It was noted that the 20 mph scheme is now in operation outside St Bede's School.

It was agreed to seek timescales on the proposed traffic regulation order which included works to the junction of Peth Bank

and Durham Road and the junction of Manor Grange and Durham Road.

Newbiggen Lane - It was agreed to seek clarification from the County Council on an area of grass verge up Newbiggen Lane which has been sprayed with weedkiller.

Annual Report - approved for distribution.

Financial report - discussed and approved.

Accounts for Payment - approved.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 10th September at Lynwood House at 7.15 pm.

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WILLOW BURN HOSPICE

On a beautiful summer morning, June 28th, there was a very auspicious occasion at Willow Burn Hospice. It was the culmination of a vision that originated from 1989 when the idea of a hospice for Lanchester was first launched. A building on the old site of Maiden Law Hospital was operational while the money was raised for a brand new hospice. Chairman Mr Paul Jackson explained in his speech of welcome that the building was to be built in two phases. The foundation stone for it was laid in 2011 by Sir Tom Cowie. The first phase The Sir Tom Cowie Centre was completed in 2014. Phase Two began in 2014 to include 6 new bedrooms

and a new lounge, containing equipment for resuscitation or other medicalemergencies. Now complete, the 'Helen McArdle Wing' was officially opened by Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of County Durham, Mrs Sue Snowden. This new wing and subsequent completion of Willow Burn was only made possible by a generous donation of £1.5 million from Mrs Helen McArdle, who was present for the dedication of the wing that bears her name. She is a local businesswoman who over thirty years has built up a successful business, providing care for the elderly. It is for this work that she was awarded her CBE. The redevelopment

also included the refurbishment of the Sir Tom Cowie Centre, which was made possible by the support of local businesses and members of the community. Willow Burn is now a beautiful building and is termed a State of the Art Centre for Palliative (terminally ill) Care. Each patient is given personalised care, enabling them to be as

independent as possible while keeping their dignity and true self intact. Lives are transformed. From the depths of despair people have found hope and peace. Lieutenant Snowden and Mrs Helen McArdle gave short speeches in praise of the high standard of work done at the hospice. Mrs Snowden thanked the nursing staff, volunteer staff, the fundraisers, the

office staff, the officials, the chairman and committee, and praised them all for their dedication and integrity, not forgetting the relatives of the patients whose support was invaluable. The many guests that day included Mrs Elsie Robson, Mrs Cowie, Ossie Johnson, our local MP Laura Pidcock and various trustees and officials. *Brenda Craddock*

'STORIES OF SANCTUARY' COME TO LANCHESTER

Lanchester has always been a welcoming village and recently several local residents have taken part in various projects to support refugees from Syria who have moved to Co Durham. To celebrate our connection to those seeking support in our county, we are delighted to welcome 'Stories of Sanctuary' to our village on Friday 6th September at 7.30-9.30pm in Lanchester Methodist Church.

This is a song-writing project that brings together people from different backgrounds to share their stories of seeking sanctuary in the North East of England. The project weaves together tales from the past

with modern day stories of finding sanctuary from war and conflict, to tell a different narrative about what it means to be living in the North East today. The project launched in 2018 in Durham Cathedral to excellent reviews and has since gone on a national tour. The concert features the Sanctuary Seekers Choir and is accompanied by viola player Raghad Haddad from the National Syrian Orchestra, herself a refugee from Syria. The project's curator and singer songwriter Sam Slatcher will also be performing some of his songs which are inspired by poems written by the refugees. Tickets are £8 for adults or

£4 for under 18s, unemployed or low wage earners and are available from www.storiesofsanctuary.co.uk or from Sonia Filmer (soniaanddavid@btinternet.com) or Hazel Bloor (hbloor77@gmail.com). Profits will be split between the local food banks and the Stories of Sanctuary project. There will also be refreshments during the interval and profits from these will go to the Hardship Fund at the West End Refugee Service. The concert has been described as "timely, emotional and beautiful" and is a wonderful opportunity to welcome world class musicians to our community.

ST BEDE'S MEET ASTRONAUT MICHAEL FOALE

In June, 24 pupils from Year 7-10 at St Bede's were lucky enough to have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to meet an Astronaut Michael Foale who is an astrophysicist and NASA astronaut who, having been on six space missions, has spent over a year in space in total.

He spoke to us about his missions including how he replaced components of the Hubble Space Telescope during an 8-hour spacewalk and some scary moments including when during a mission, a module was struck by a resupply vessel causing it to roll. Michael, with his Physics degree was able

to advise those in ground control how to stop it which must have been nerve-racking. It was really inspiring to hear Michael talk about his career and after a 26-year career, where his skills have now taken him to. Who knows, we may have future NASA employees in our school!

DURHAM UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY FUN DAY

Following on from our involvement with the Durham University Celebrate Science event, we were asked to demonstrate at the first Durham University Community Fun Day. What an honour. 10 eager St Bede's Science Ambassadors worked alongside Miss White to plan 6 'Household Science' demonstrations for the public and on a sunny (finally) Saturday met many families and young budding scientists to show them how to make Oobleck, homemade lava lamps and their own insect pooter jars to make and use at home. Parents were able to take photos of our instructions sheets to recreate these exciting experiments at home and we hope to have inspired some new scientists to

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LONGOVICIUM GETS ANIMATED

At the June meeting of the Friends of Longovicium, Lanchester resident Darin Smith showed The Friends some computer work he has been doing. Taking the geophysical results of surveys conducted by Archaeological Services Durham University, Darin has been preparing animated sequences showing what some of the buildings in the Roman fort may have looked like. So far Darin has prepared views of the gatehouses, corner towers, granaries, headquarters building and a visualisation of the fort in the landscape. These videos are available to see on the computer by going to the **Friends of Longovicium** site, **Videos**. They are also available through the Facebook

page of the Lanchester Partnership. Please be aware that this is 'a work in progress' and will occasionally be updated whilst Darin fills in the fort buildings within the walls and visualises the houses, workshops and other buildings of the vicus or civilian settlement outside the fort.

Darin hopes that by the time he's finished you'll be able to see a complete representation of what the Roman settlement at the top of Cadger Bank looked like.

LANCHESTER LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The July meeting clashed with several village events leading to a low attendance. However for those of us who made it, there was a fascinating talk from Mike Gladstone about the Design and Construction of the New Tyne Bridge. That's the one that gets mixed up with the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

Mike had access to the archives and took us on the journey using old photographs and design drawings of the project. He supplemented his talk with some models and practical visual aids which brought the subject to life. There had been 3 previous proposals to build a bridge in 1834, 1860 and 1867 all of which faltered and were unsuccessful until 1924

when, due to high unemployment, a government subsidy of 65% helped get the proposal actioned. The bridge was to be beautiful and the biggest arched bridge in the UK at that time. The demands of the project were clear, no piers in the river, the deck had to be 84 feet above high water level, it had to be the full width of the river with the river clear at all times considering services, traffic, wind and weather and finally it had to be easy to maintain.

Mike walked us through the painstaking process of clearing the area to provide workspace for building the 4 towers not forgetting they were still using horses and carts to move soil and rubbish. Much of the

fabrication was done on the bankside and access roads enabling on site fabrication, then the structure being pushed out over the quayside. The pictures showed how the cranes and cradles build up platforms then had to be reassembled at the next level as the structure grew. The retaining walls used stone from the former Newcastle gaol, which was being dismantled at the time and was evidenced in a photo dated 26th April 1927. We were enthralled by many more photographs showing the rope system for support and the progress of the structure into the river from both banks. We all enjoyed an informative and worthwhile night out.

Lanchester has our first Plastic Free Champion! Many congratulations to Pauline Gill and her husband Keith, who run the The Old Post Office luxury Bed and Breakfast in the centre of Lanchester, for significantly reducing their single use plastic. Pauline, who has had a life long concern about the environment, has taken the issue of unnecessary plastic seriously.

Over the last 5 years of running the bed and

breakfast she has found many ways to reduce plastic waste. All shampoos, conditioners and washing up liquids are bought in bulk and containers refilled for the guests. Sheets that were once returned from the laundry individually wrapped and hanging on plastic coat hangers are now returned folded and no more than 3 bags used at a time. These bags are then used for refuse so that they have a further life. Refillable glass bottles are used for water in the guest rooms, returnable jars used for the locally made marmalade and preserves and the meat

which is sourced from the nearby Crinnions is bought and stored in Pauline's own reusable containers.

It's great to see local businesses making a stand against single use plastic. If you know of other businesses that are making changes then do let us know at plasticfreelanchester@outlook.com and maybe they too could become Plastic Free Champions.

Meanwhile well done to Pauline for turning the tide on plastic. I'm sure she won't stop there in her drive to reduce her plastic use.

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STEVEN WHITE'S WORLD CYCLE CHALLENGE

Leg 2, Section 1

So what happened during the 1,267 mile crossing from Mumbai to Kolkata? (12 days riding)

Having completed Leg 1 of my journey, cycling from Lanchester to Istanbul, I flew to Mumbai and stayed at a fantastic hostel, 'The Social Space', where the guests and staff were like a family. Ready to move on, I left the hostel at 6 am hoping to clear the city but it took me two hours to get out since with the sun coming up the city came alive. The fumes from the city were incredible, I could barely breathe through my nose so I knew my throat was

going to take a hammering and it did.

Stopping at the only traffic lights in Mumbai, where you actually have to stop apparently, a young boy approached me begging for food which brought home the fact that I was a long way from Europe and this would be a recurring theme.

I rode through the heat of the day (43 degrees) savouring my hydration tablets, which I'd reserved for this section, but needless to say in the following days I learnt to play the game of taking an afternoon siesta, which I found impossible

to achieve but basically, wherever I landed I had to stop - the sun was so strong it was almost like being pinned down by the heat.

By day three I knew what I had to do: cycle hard and get across as fast as possible! So, I was on the road by 5 am hitting 70 miles before 11 am. This was my target.

Come evening, when things were cooler, this is when I could stock up on the calories; a typical meal would include: 2 butter naans, 1 paneer masala, with rice, one chilli chicken with rice and maybe a couple of roti - seems like a decent

amount but wasn't enough to replace all the calories, just enough fuel for the next day's riding. The intense heat was sapping everything from me. I found wearing my bandana over my mouth, nostrils and ears helped but I could feel my eyes frying from the heat and simply had to grit my teeth as I pushed on. In addition, the attention from locals intensified ... I have never experienced anything like it. If you pull over just for a second, vehicles would stop and ask what I was doing and request selfies. I remember a few times people explained that

they'd never seen a tourist before which absolutely blew my mind! (See photo on back page.) It's fair to say most days I was running on pure adrenaline. So, on arriving in Kolkata I had a good three days' chill, a fantastic city to explore which if I had the energy to do properly, I would! RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Aromatic Lamb Curry

Lamb is a very adaptable meat, good in sweeter dishes and great in this curry. It's an easy to prepare meal and best slow cooked for 1 hour. These quantities serve 4 people.

You need:

400 g lamb shoulder, bone out
2 large onions
1 large aubergine, (800 g in total)
2 tablespoons Rogan Josh curry paste

200 g natural yoghurt
Red wine vinegar
Virgin olive oil

1) Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Put a large shallow casserole on a high heat.

2) Dice the lamb into 3 cm chunks and place in the casserole, fat side down.

3) Peel the onions, dice the aubergines to the same size as the lamb, then stir into the pan.

4) Season with salt and

black pepper, stir in the curry paste and 1 tablespoon of red wine vinegar, and transfer to the oven for 1 hour, or until tender, stirring halfway and adding a splash of water, if needed.

5) Taste the curry, season to taste, ripple through the yoghurt, drizzle over half a tablespoon of virgin olive oil, add some black pepper, and serve.

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

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ANOTHER 70 YEARS OF NATIONAL HEALTH?

Lanchester Patient Participation Group

As the health service marks its 70th anniversary we are hearing worrying reports about its future. Nationally there are falling numbers of GPs, this coming at the same time as a population growth; the result is more patients per permanent GP, an increase of 8%. More patients doesn't just mean greater demand for appointments, it means more work for all surgery staff, more paper work, test results and administrative work. Surgeries employ locum doctors to bridge this gap. Although

experienced and capable, their role does not include the administrative work associated with each patient and they are an expensive drain on surgery budgets. Add the fact that more care is being moved from hospital into the community and our unstoppable cycle of need becomes a whirlpool.

Little wonder that concerns are being raised over the health and wellbeing of the GP workforce. A recent Commonwealth Fund survey showed that UK GPs were the most stressed in the West with one in five saying they planned to leave the profession within the next five years. Lanchester Medical Centre is not exempt from this; over the past three years a steady increase in patients registered at the surgery

has grown to 4,232. A cohort of these patients is the elderly and children who often have more complex needs requiring more GP time.

Sadly no matter how we love our area and value our local surgery, recruiting GPs up north to a small practice is not so appealing as working in larger practices where there are more clinicians to share the workload.

All evidence agrees that continuity of care is something we all want. To achieve this and with no way of filling the gap between the supply of GPs and the need for them, greater use of other professionals, Nurse Practitioners, Physiotherapists and Pharmacists will be the future of our National Health Service.

Nowadays, it can be too easy to take some things for granted, especially when they are quite literally on our doorstep! With access to so much technology in our homes now, the fantastic resources available in our local library, at times, might be overlooked.
