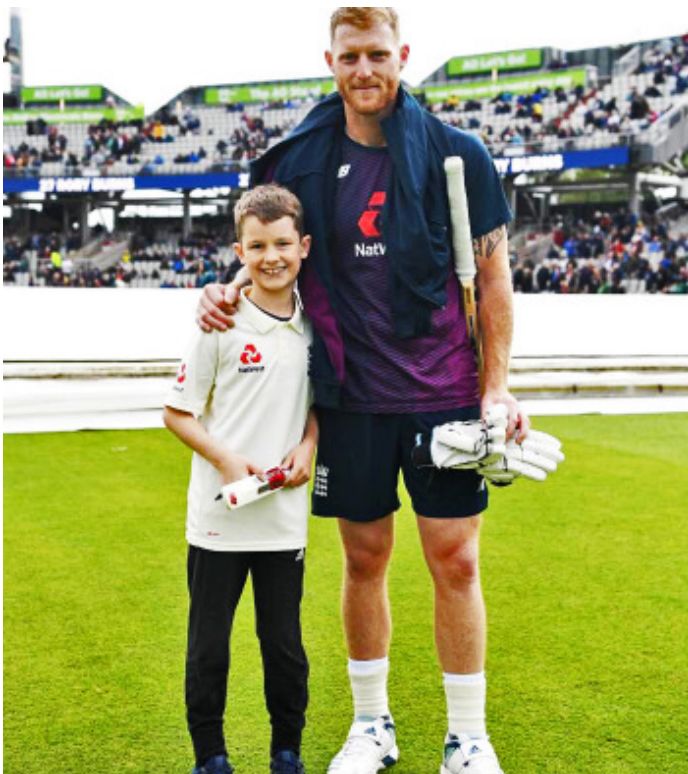

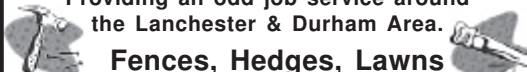

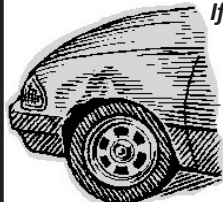

Notes from the meeting held on Tuesday 10th September 2019

Minutes - Ordinary Meeting 9th July, Finance Committee and Recreation Committee 31st July - approved.
Police report - received.
Correspondence
Lanchester Allotments Association - minutes of committee meeting received.
Environment Agency - Water Resources Abstraction Licences for previously exempt activities - information received.
Durham County Council - Long Term Empty Property Council Tax

Premium consultation - Members considered the consultation. Agreed that a response is sent to Durham County Council supporting the proposals and asking that the County Council act with discretion in sensitive cases.
Letter of thanks - Crocus Project - received.
Campaign to Protect Rural England - Summer newsletter - received.
The Clerk Magazine - July edition - received.
Neighbourhood Plan - The Lanchester Neighbourhood Plan

pre-submission consultation had taken place between 24th June - 9th August. A number of representations had been received. These responses have been put in tabular form and the working group will meet to consider all responses and amend the document accordingly. A Basic Conditions Statement and a Consultation Statement need to be produced. The Basic Conditions Statement was discussed and it was agreed that our planning consultant be asked to write this document which will take an estimated 5 days. The revised Neighbourhood Plan document along with the Basic Conditions Statement and Consultation statement will be submitted to the County Council who will then undertake a further consultation and forward the document to an independent assessor.
Councillor Vacancy - Members considered and agreed the co-option to the Parish Council. The matter to be ratified at the next meeting.
Proposed Traffic Regulation Order - It was agreed that

correspondence is sent to the County Council supporting the proposals.
Memorial Plaques on Seats - Members considered current arrangements and confirmed them to be satisfactory.
Northumbrian Water Ltd - Sewer System - Councillors were informed of information received from Northumbrian Water Ltd regarding network investigations in the Ford Road area and the modelling being used to better understand the impact of rainfall and the resultant flooding. They aim to have the results of the study in October and aim to share these findings with the Parish Council in December. Members were disappointed to note that the residents' survey had not yet taken place. Members also considered information received from a resident regarding a long term problem of water running down Cadger Bank. It was agreed that Northumbrian Water Ltd is asked to update the Parish Council every

two months, a representative of Northumbrian Water is asked to attend the December Parish Council meeting to present the results of their investigations and that Northumbrian Water is informed of the ongoing problem of water running on Cadger Bank.
Manor Grange Play Area - Councillors considered and agreed a leaflet for distribution to houses on the Manor Grange estate and Deanery View estate. The leaflet would inform residents of the proposed play area and seek information on demand for the facility. The leaflet would be delivered by Councillors at the end of September.
Annual Return 2018/19 - External audit confirmed that no matters had come to their attention which gave cause for concern. The Annual Return was approved and accepted.
Financial report - discussed and approved.
Accounts for Payment - approved.
 The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 8th October 2019 at Lynwood House at 7.15pm.

EP SCHOOL LEAVERS SERVICE

A special service is held annually in the Parish Church in July. It is the School Leavers Service, which the whole school attends. Mrs Davis introduced the service and praised the Year 6 pupils who had brought so much to the school with their various personalities and strengths. They had matured into confident young people and were now ready to take up the challenges of a new school and their secondary education. Each Year 6 pupil traditionally receives a 'graduating' scroll and a book in which is written a testimonial of their time in the EP School. Parents

watched proudly as their child stepped forward to receive their scroll and book from either Mrs Davis or Mr Knighton and their testimonial was read out. There is an emphasis not just on academic and sporting skills but on the characteristics of each pupil, such as kindness, caring, team spirit, helpfulness, willingness, positivity, good manners, honesty and a sense of humour. Every child is encouraged to be the best person they can be, and they are nurtured and cared for with great dedication. Other awards were then presented. Attendance Awards for pupils with

100% in the last academic year, The Rotary Club Award for the 'Make a Difference' group, this being a group which has made a difference both in School and Community, with a special project. The Citizenship Awards were received by Charlotte Roe in Year 2 and Anna Niranjan in Year 6 and the Henry Dancer Award was given to Alex Hall. The Reverend Stephanie Clarke concluded the service with a short address in which she encouraged the pupils to use all their skills and attributes in their next school to the best of their ability.

Well, it is quite delightful, beautifully appointed, as one of our number decided it was totally 'de-lightful and de-lovely'. As you can gather - we were quite impressed.

A warm welcome from the staff, lovely oval table, exactly right for 8 people. It was a very elegant dining room with a nice atmosphere and we were soon perusing the menu. They have an à la carte and a lunch menu of 2 courses for £16.50 and 3 courses for £19.50. Also a sandwich option which one of us tried which consisted of roast pork, roast onion, crackling and

thyme gravy. For the rest of us it was for starters, Curried veg soup, Smoked salmon, goats cheese, herbs and toasted sourdough and Chicken liver pâté, crispy onion, plum chutney, herbs and toasted sourdough. Mains were Grilled pork tenderloin, honey and red wine braised cabbage and Stonebass with crushed pots and seasonal vegs in herb oil. Puds were an ice cream selection and a lovely option of tea/coffee with petit fours.

The food was excellent. We did have a slight mishap with one of our meals, but the situation was rectified, recompense made and everyone was perfectly happy. We shall most definitely be going again. The 'impeccable pig' was impeccably turned out!

Children from the village once again led the way recently in encouraging us all to say no to unnecessary single-use plastic. They held a stall in Lanchester EP school yard, encouraging people to ditch single-use water bottles and buy a reusable bottle, also giving out information about where to re-fill bottles in the village.

The stall was supported by the national Refill campaign and charity behind the campaign, 'CitytoSea', which works to end plastic pollution in our seas.

Pupils from the EP directed parents, staff and fellow pupils to the newly registered Refill stations. Four venues in

the village have worked in partnership with members of the Plastic Free Lanchester group and now welcome residents and visitors to drop in to re-fill their water bottles. They are:

KaffeeHaus Amadeus, Lanchester Community Centre, Lanchester Methodist Church, British Red Cross shop. Local resident Hazel Bloor said: "In the past we sometimes felt awkward about popping in to a café or centre to ask them to refill our bottle; I feel much more comfortable going somewhere which is actively encouraging people to ask for a water refill. Just look out for the Refill sticker in the



window and you'll know you are welcome!"

A big thanks to these local venues for coming forward and joining the campaign to reduce unnecessary plastic production and end plastic pollution.

DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING

Paul Brolly from the North East Ambulance Service delivered a training session on defibrillators at Lynwood House on Tuesday 17th September. The session was well attended with 23 members of the community taking part.

Paul delivered an excellent and entertaining training session which was thoroughly enjoyed by those attending. The session enabled people to understand how the defibrillator can be accessed and used as well as seeing the defibrillator in action.

The defibrillator can be used by anyone. If you see someone who is unconscious and not breathing normally call 999 for help. As well as guiding you through CPR, the call operator will be able to advise you if there is a defibrillator nearby. If there is, they will ask you to stay with the patient and continue CPR but ask someone around you to go and fetch the defibrillator. The 999 call operator will give you the code to unlock the cabinet so the portable defibrillator can be removed. Once

activated the defibrillator will give the person using it clear audio instructions. You cannot hurt someone with a defibrillator because it won't work unless the person is in cardiac arrest.

A defibrillator is located on the outside wall of the pharmacy on Front Street. It has been installed in the centre of the village for the benefit of the community. The defibrillator is available to members of the public 24 hours a day to use in the case of a life threatening emergency.

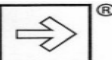

STEVEN WHITE'S WORLD CHALLENGE

Leg 2 Section 2 One lucky son of a gun

In the latest instalment of Lanchester's Steven White's World Cycle tour he describes dicing with death on the Bangladesh roads. I don't class myself religious but, after crossing India to Thailand I do think there's a guardian angel looking out for me, here's why...

Moving from Kolkata I headed straight for the Benapole border, Bangladesh. Despite an early start (5am), on arrival the queue was huge but I'd

prepared myself for a long wait, bike in hand. On speaking to a security guard, who enquired where I was from, I was asked to wait and minutes later I was instructed to follow him, so I awkwardly skipped past the mile-long queue to the front. Having been granted my visa the customs officer asked me to sit tight as he was organising an armed escort!

So I followed the escort down the road. After 10km we stopped and just like clockwork the next team

of police took charge. Next day I set off from Jessore. I had a big day ahead, I was aiming to make it all the way to Dhaka, crossing the Ganges, about 130 miles in total. Eventually I arrived at the river crossing, just under 90 miles at this point. We all squeezed on the boat and everyone grabbed the shade! I was left roasting in the sun. Arriving on land the next section proved to be as crazy with traffic.

Sadly, the inevitable happened... on continuing my journey to Dhaka the traffic became denser and more chaotic. Suddenly, out of nowhere a truck accelerated, crossing our road and heading directly into me. My front wheel hit the bonnet, twisted and sent me flying into the windscreen - smashing it on impact, the brunt taken by my right shoulder, but as I slid down the back of my hand was cut open with the broken glass. Landing on my feet I looked to the bike and thanks to my guardian angel we'd both survived, sort of!

People gathered round to help me get off the road and the driver gave me his scarf to wrap up my bloody hand. With some support we straightened the handlebars out and people informed me that there was a hospital in the direction I was heading. I limped into the hospital centre and one x-ray and some stitches later I was released and despite medical advice needed to get on the bike and find somewhere to stay.

Luckily my guardian angel intervened for a second time that day... as I was leaving the hospital I was

approached by a young man, asking if he could help. On sharing what had happened he explained that he was part of a cycling club, hence he knew where I could get the bike checked over. The bike was easily sorted and my need for accommodation and food was resolved by an invite to stay with his family. I was well looked after, even my cycling gear was laundered ready for the next day when I'd complete the last few miles to Dakar.

CRICKET NEWS

It was a dramatic end to the season and the fantastic news was that the club will play in The North East Premier League next season for the first time, the highest level for a club side. However, Alnmouth won, so the team couldn't top the league, but Consett did us a huge favour in beating Tynedale, which meant we finished second. Alnmouth couldn't be promoted as they didn't meet the range of strict criteria, so Lanchester made that leap instead. It wasn't how we wanted to achieve this, but it was a brilliant conclusion to the season. Part of the criteria required us to achieve the ECB Clubmark accreditation, which we

finally fulfilled earlier in the year. Meanwhile the seconds went 15 games unbeaten since 1st June to romp away with their divisional title. Johnny Green made two centuries in the final four weeks. Our teams made five cup final appearances in the final weeks, The firsts beat Philadelphia in a high scoring final at Whitburn, but lost in two others. The under 18s were well beaten by Burnopfield, while the under 13s gained some satisfaction by thrashing Beamish. The seconds have a final to play after this was written. It has been an awesome season.

THURSDAY CLUB

On 15th August Sharron Vincent continued with part 2 of the Mitford sisters.

Nancy 1904-1973. In 1933 she married Lt-Col Hon Peter Rodd and divorced in 1958. She lived in France for most of her adult life and had a long standing relationship with Col Gaston Palewski (Charles de Gaulle's Chief of Staff). A writer of many novels including 'The Pursuit of Happiness' and 'Love in a Cold Climate' she was also a biographer of many historical figures. While seriously ill with cancer in 1972 she received the CBE and the Légion d'Honneur. She died in Versailles in 1973 and Gaston was with her.

Pamela 1901-1994. Married and divorced millionaire Derek Jackson. After her divorce she became a lifelong companion of Italian horsewoman Guiditta Tommasi. Childhood polio left her with a lame leg and she did not ride or hunt as did her sisters. She transitioned from debutante to farmer learning about husbandry and even

becoming a self taught poultry expert. Thrifty and with a good head for business she could be tough and was forced to make difficult decisions during World War II. In 1994, after falling down some steep stairs, she had an operation to mend a broken leg - a blood clot formed and she died shortly after.

Diana 1910-2003. In 1929 she married aristocrat/writer Bryan Guinness leaving him in 1933 for the British fascist leader Sir Oswald Mosely. During the second World War she was imprisoned in Holloway prison for three years. Apparently she remained a devotee of facism and Adolf Hitler. She died following a stroke in 2003.

Unity 1914-1948. Widely publicised was her adulation and friendship with Adolf Hitler. She tried to commit suicide by shooting herself in the head, days after Britain declared war on Germany, but did not die of her injuries. She died of meningitis, caused by the bullet, at a cottage hospital on Inch Kenneth - a small island

off the west coast of the Isle of Mull.

Jessica 1917-1996. Eloped with Esmond Romilly to the Spanish Civil War. In 1939 they went to the US and at the outbreak of 2nd World War Romilly joined the Royal Canadian Airforce. In 1941 he was killed during a bombing raid. In 1943 Jessica married Robert Treuhaft - both joining the American Communist party until 1958. A writer and campaigner she wrote several memoirs and the best selling 'The American Way of Death' about the funeral industry. Jessica died of lung cancer in 1996.

Deborah 1920-2014. In 1941 she married Andrew Cavendish who became the Duke of Devonshire in 1944 following the death of his older brother who was killed in action. Together they turned his ancestral home, Chatsworth House, into one of Britain's most successful stately homes. Deborah was a writer and memoirist who loved dogs and country life. She died in 2014 and is survived by three of her seven children.

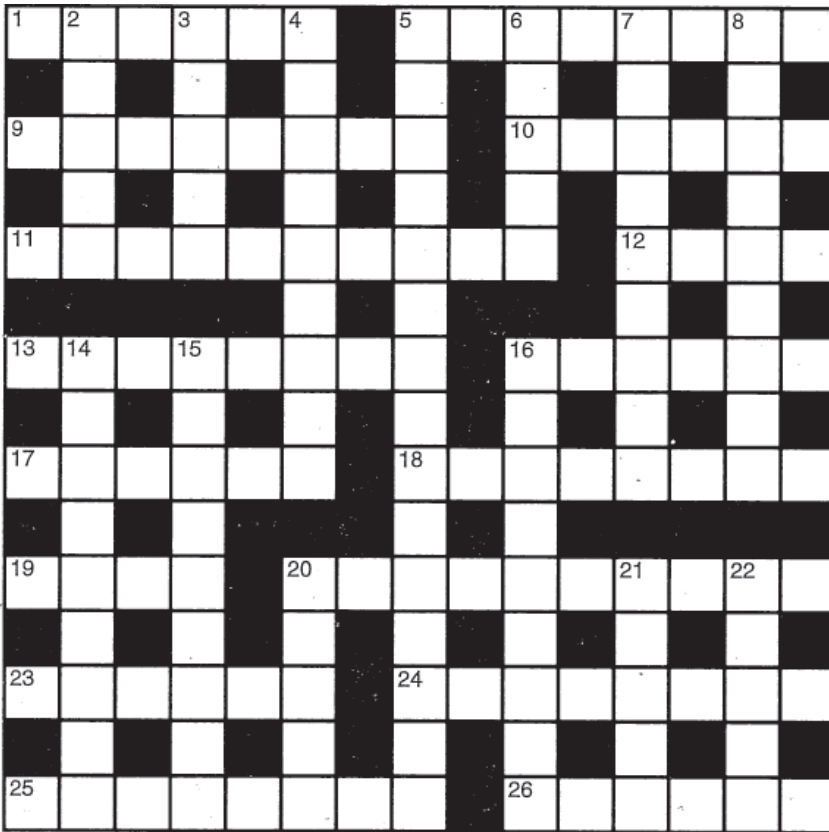

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Penne Carbonara

Pasta has rapidly become a favourite dish for many people over the past few years, and it's important to remember that the very best recipes are often simple and plain, reflecting the rustic origins of the food.

You need ...

455g, 1lb dried penne pasta

10 slices of pancetta or dry-cured smoky bacon

Olive oil

5 egg yolks

100ml or 3½ oz double cream

125g, or 4½ oz Parmesan

cheese, grated

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

METHOD

1) Cook the pasta in salted boiling water until al dente. While the pasta

is cooking, slowly fry the pancetta in a little oil until crispy.

2) Break it up a bit, then put it to one side. In a bowl, whip up the egg yolks, cream and half the Parmesan.

3) When the pasta is cooked, drain it and immediately toss it with the warm, crispy pancetta and the egg mixture. If you add the penne immediately the residual heat is enough to cook the eggs and for the sauce to stay smooth.

4) Season well, using plenty of freshly ground black pepper, adding extra Parmesan to taste. Serve straight away with salad and maybe some red wine?

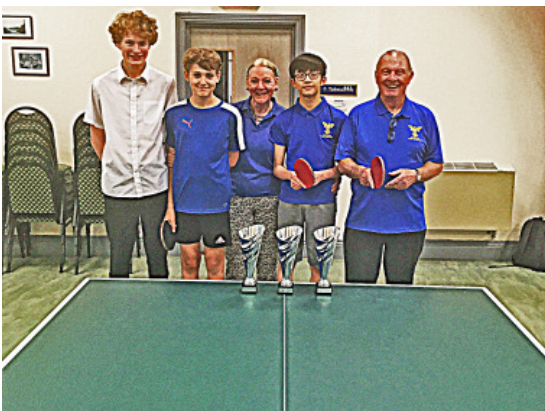
