## A TRIBUTE TO BOB AVERY

A large local musical hierarchy gathered in the social club recently, in order to celebrate the life of a much loved friend, Bob Avery.

Most of those present, which included Martin Mathews, Chris Kelly, Trevor Davidson, Pete Thompson, Tom Gilfellow and others, had known Bob for many decades. He was a popular man, with a huge personality and wonderful sense of humour. As a result, there are a wealth of anecdotes associated with Bob, such as stopping a bus to apprehend a vandal, and a novel method of retribution when diddled by a local trader.

Bob was born in Seaham in 1939, and like his surviving wife Elaine, was a schoolteacher and lived for many years in Witton Gilbert. Their abode was emblazoned with the name 'Coastguard Cottages'. It also displayed a Plimsoll Line with '1840 Flood Level' painted on it. This attracted press attention as his house was around 300 feet above sea level and twenty miles from the sea!

Bob and Elaine lived latterly in France, but retained a bolt hole in Durham, where Bob was often seen at folk clubs and sessions and recently at Lanchester Social Club. He had his

Several helpers joined in to peel the onions while Noel Jackson and Burt Hunter gave the introduction and informed the gathering of 104 people which included 60 children, the history of the event and how the morning would proceed. They also spoke about the Wild Life organisation encouraging adults and children to join.

With speeches over it was off to find celandines, cow parsley, any other wild flowers and leaves to go with the onion leaves. Then it was wrapping the eggs time and families huddled together in groups to carry out this important task. With eggs wrapped, labelled and secure they were passed to Burt who inserted them into boiling water. With a

record number of entrants an extra pan and more than expected new cloths had to be used. Next it was the Egg Hunt. All proceeded to Paste Egg Bank where tickets had been placed around the perimeter of the field by Elaine Williams. Children scampered all over the field gathering these, to be rewarded with sweets.

With the hunt concluded it was back to Burt's van for the judging. This was preceded by the 'Paste Egging Song' performed by the 'Jolly Boys', Noel Jackson who also played his English Concertina, Burt Hunter and press ganged volunteer, Dr Ian Brunt. This was a super interlude which added to the already great atmosphere. After much scrutiny by the judges, Marnie, Catherine and Evie were announced as the winners.

Following the judging everyone walked up Paste Egg Hill again for

the bowling. There was tremendous enthusiasm with children and parents alike and very competitive! This year as Easter was late the grass was long and it was difficult to boule properly. Competitors began hurling the eggs down and many smashed. At 12.00 midday prompt, Noel ended the competition and the joint winners who bouled the furthest were Paul Deaville and Evan Toase.

It is four years now that 'Churches Together' have arranged something special for Easter Saturday, and this year they once again kept to the format of other years, as it has proved successful. # LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 13th May 2014

## Minutes

Ordinary meeting held on 8th April 2014 - approved.

### Lanchester Cricket Club

The club has secured a grant from Sport England to refurbish the changing room area. The conditions of the grant are problematic for the cricket club with their existing licence arrangement. The Parish Council could become the recipient of the grant, administer the grant and work with the cricket club to deliver the project. Following discussion it was agreed that the Parish Council becomes the recipient of the grant and that the Clerk and Councillors meet regularly with the cricket club to deliver the project.

**Neighbourhood Warden Report** - Neighbourhood

Warden report was received. Concern was raised of the incidents of fly tipping in the Parish. Councillors and members of the public were encouraged to report any incidents of fly tipping to the County Council.

**Lanchester & Burnhope Parochial Church Council** - letter of thanks for donation received.

**Data Protection & Data Controllers** - information received on a recent training course.

**Clerk & Councils Direct** - May newsletter received.

**Consett Neighbourhood Policing Team** - permission was given to use Kitswell Bike track and car park area for a bike security marking event.

### Lanchester Cricket Club Football Team

permission was given for an adult football team to use the football field at Kitswell Park for the 2014/15 season.

**The Clerk Magazine** - received.

### Area Action Partnership and Parish Councils Committee

Members considered the Village Action Plan prepared by the Area Action Partnership.

Members noted that the grass was being damaged by vehicles on the Village Green. It was agreed to seek prices for a post and chain fence in this area.

### Training

It was agreed that the Clerk should attend a training session on 'Village Greens'.

### Park House

Members were informed that the notice to vacate the office at Park House comes into effect on 28th May. However it is likely that the current owners and new owners will extend this to August. Clerk will progress.

### Neighbourhood Planning

Members agreed the minutes of the first working group meeting. It was agreed that the Parish boundary should be the geographical area for the plan. The geographical area needs to be submitted to the County Council for approval.

### Banner Celebration Event

Members considered and agreed the minutes of the working group meeting which gave progress on the organisation of the

event which will take place on Friday 27th June.

### Maintenance Progress Report

Members considered the report. Thanks were given to David Maddox for his work in the Parish.

## LANCHESTER COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLAN

Early in May two workshops took place to continue the work started last year to produce a Community Emergency Plan for Lanchester. The workshops were facilitated by Carole Lawford from the Civil Contingencies Unit who is working with communities on a national initiative to produce local emergency plans. A draft document

for Lanchester has been prepared by the community. This draft document can be viewed on the Lanchester Partnership website from the beginning of June via the following link [www.lanchesterpartnership.org.uk/links](http://www.lanchesterpartnership.org.uk/links) Comments and suggestions on the draft plan can be forwarded to Sally Laverick on 01207 521957 until 20th June.

## A NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN FOR LANCHESTER

The Parish Council report (above) records that the Council have decided to proceed with the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan for the Parish. It also records that we are asking the County Council to designate the Parish boundary as the geographical area to be covered by the Plan. This request starts a six week consultation to be carried out by the County Council during which representations can be made regarding this proposal. The County Council can then confirm the designation or modify it in the light of any representations received. Please keep an eye on the Parish Council notice board and the County Council website for further details.

The Parish Council have convened an initial working group to undertake this task which

is likely to take 18 months to 2 years to complete. This group has representatives at present from the Council itself, the Lanchester Partnership, the Campaign to Protect Rural Lanchester Group, the Farming community and several members of the community. Representatives from other appropriate organisations or individuals are welcome - please contact Sally Laverick, Lead Officer (01207 521957), or Councillor Mike Wardle who is chairing the Working Group (01207 521622).

The Working Group intends to draw upon work already done in the Parish and published in the Village Design Statement, the Parish Plan and the Locality Map with initial concerns focussing on: The Historic Environment; the

Settlement Limit; designation of Green Spaces; Flooding; Wildlife Corridors; areas of Landscape Value; Sustainable Development and Alternative Energy - however it is likely that there will be a range of additional issues that the plan will consider.

There will be opportunities to input into the plan throughout the process, however if you have any immediate concerns please let either Sally or Mike know.

It is intended to keep everyone informed as the Plan develops by a variety of forms of consultation and the final version will have to be put to the vote of the whole Parish before it can be approved. When it is approved it will be a significant part of the whole planning process as it applies to Lanchester. It will be an important document.

The original banner will be displayed at the Parish Church which will be open for people to attend and view.

Please come along and enjoy the first outing of

our community banner. This event is dependent on favourable weather conditions. The event will finish at approximately 3.00 pm and children will return to their schools in time for normal school pick up times.

## PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AT NEWBIGGEN LANE

Following DCC receiving the planning application in relation to the Newbiggen Lane proposed development to build 151 properties, The Campaign for the Protection of Rural Lanchester together with Lanchester Partnership, have organised a public meeting to discuss these plans in more detail and formulate their main response. The meeting is organised for Wednesday 28th May at 7.30pm at Croft View Halls and will have already taken place by the time this publication is distributed so they have allocated another evening, Tuesday 3rd June, 7.30pm at Croft View Halls for anyone who has missed the public meeting or is wondering how to reply to this proposal.

Members of both The Campaign for the Protection of Rural Lanchester and Lanchester Partnership will be on hand to assist and answer any queries you may have. A development of this size will affect everyone in the village in relation to Transport, Parking, School places, Flooding etc, so please don't leave it to others. Your comments are required to show DCC the strength of opinion in the village. DCC have kindly extended the date for comments to be received to Friday 6th June 2014. Comments should be emailed using dmstrategic@durham.gov.uk or posted to County Hall Durham quoting application number DM/14/00763/FPA.

## POLICE REPORT

Over the April period the PACT priority for Lanchester has been road related matters on Howden Bank especially in the area of Ornsby Hill. Concerns include speeding vehicles from Ornsby Hill towards St Bede's Court, incorrect alignment of the roadside mirror and road signs being obstructed by foliage. Community Speedwatch Equipment has been deployed in the area and identified 16 speeders who will receive warning letters to the registered keeper's address. A site visit has also been completed between Durham County Council, Police and a local resident to discuss the mirror and road signs which will be cleaned and adjusted in the near future.

At the May PACT meeting the community

decided to change the priority to parking with the problem areas being identified as Peth Bank due to the increase in vehicle size, and residential estates near St Bede's School including Fenhall Park and Bishop's Meadow. Officers have visited St Bede's School and provided a letter for distribution to all sixth form pupils regarding their manner of parking. Until Friday 30th May officers will be visiting the areas daily to monitor parking concerns and any vehicles seen to be causing an obstruction to pedestrians, pushchair or wheelchair users will be issued with a Traffic 173A Warning Notice with a view to try and educate drivers. After this time any vehicles seen by officers to be causing an obstruction

will be issued with a £30 Fixed Penalty Notice. The date of the next PACT meeting is Tuesday 3rd June at 6.30 pm in Burnhope Primary School, everyone is welcome. Over the coming weeks local officers will be in Lanchester All Saints Primary and Lanchester EP School offering free security marking for bicycles and scooters to all pupils as part of Operation Spoke. Full details will be sent home with pupils closer to the time. Officers are also in the process of organising further marking events in the village over the coming months. ## A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Tristram Hunt MP, the Shadow Secretary of State for Education, visited Lanchester at the beginning of May to meet with my North West Durham Youth Forum at St Bede's School and then later to meet with a group of teachers, Head Teachers, College Principals, Durham Education Officers and Councillor Ossie Johnson who is Durham County's lead Councillor for Children's Services. Tristram was there principally to meet with the young people, listen to their concerns about what is happening with education and how it affects them and to ask what he would do differently if he is Secretary of State for Education in May

2015. Some of the things they asked about were: what is going to happen to tuition fees, will AS levels continue and what role will continuous assessment and course work play in future GCSEs. The students asked very mature questions that received well thought out and reflective answers.

The Q&A session with Headteachers from the primary, secondary and FE sectors made Tristram aware of the concerns about fragmentation and lack of co-ordination in the system, the way in which 'Fair Access Protocols' are working or not working and the importance of qualified teachers. I was also keen to share my view that teachers

are not just adults who stand at the front of classrooms or on football fields or even in science labs, who impart knowledge but have no wider responsibilities to the child. In my view, and considerable experience, a teacher is someone who has responsibility for the well-being, safety and academic progress of his/her pupils. I would want qualified teachers for my child and would expect no less for yours.

It is always good to welcome people to our community who may be in a position to exert national powers that will ultimately influence our schools locally. It was really good to see how well Tristram interacted with the young people and to see how seriously he took the views of both the young people during my youth forum and the adults he met afterwards. 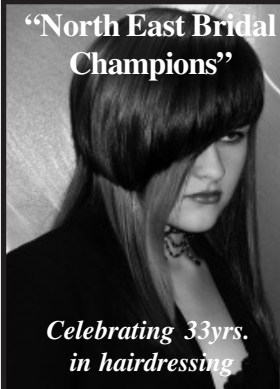

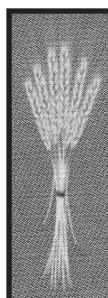

## RECIPE OF THE MONTH

### Tuna Sweetcorn Burgers

The recipe serves four and is useful as a quick supper or can be taken on a picnic.

#### Ingredients

85g/3 oz white bread, torn into pieces  
198g can sweetcorn, drained  
2 x 185g cans tuna in spring water, drained  
25g/1 oz grated cheddar cheese  
3 spring onions, finely chopped  
1 egg, beaten  
2 tbsp vegetable oil  
Wholemeal buns, lettuce and salsa, to serve

#### Method

1. Whizz the bread to crumbs in a food

processor, tip into a bowl, then whizz half the sweetcorn until finely chopped and tip into the bowl. Add the remaining whole corn, tuna, cheese, spring onions and some seasoning to the bowl and mix well. Add the egg, bit by bit (you may not need it all), until the mixture is sticky enough to be shaped into 4 equal sized burgers.

2. Heat the oil in a non-stick pan, then cook the burgers for 5 mins on each side until golden and hot through the middle. Stuff into wholemeal buns with your favourite lettuce and a good spoonful of salsa.

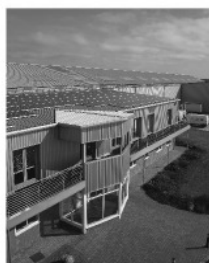

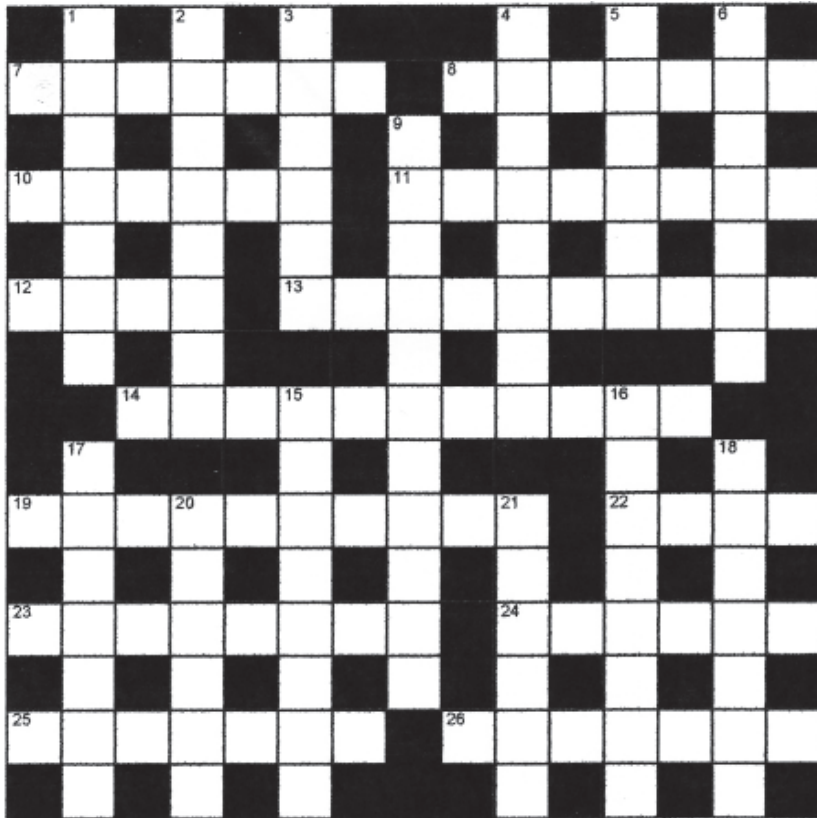

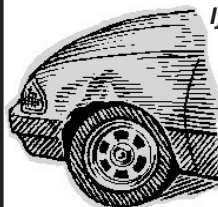
