

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From our councillor -

In January and February, a large number of residents have got in touch with me about buses – or rather the lack of them – asking me for help. Whilst most buses are run commercially – with Go North East (GNE) being our key operator for routes to Durham or Tyneside – it's clear that public funding and our local authority, Durham County Council, have an important role to play in promoting this lifeline through funding, route setting and school transport.

All parties agree with this public role in commercial buses – because whilst you need bus fares as a critical part of the funding stream to keep services open – buses need some public support for the wider social benefits provided by getting people to work, hospitals, shops, as well as friends, family and everything else, who might otherwise not, particularly the very old, the young and those on low income. Bus use has been suffering for years with the rise of the private car and the undoubted flexibility that gives, but this was made much worse by the lockdown and the pressure that put onto services as people stayed home – and then changed work, shopping and social habits afterwards.

The last Government did a lot of active work to support buses, using about $\mathfrak{L}2$ billion of public money in the three years after Covid, bringing in funding like the Bus Recovery Grant and the Bus Service Improvement Plan.

This allowed money for local routes like the No 6 to operate beyond

what might just be commercially feasible. This issue was taken to central Government in part because our last MP, Richard Holden, served as buses minister from October 2022 onward. It was under him that the £2 bus fare cap was brought in, benefiting bus routes and customers alike. The current Government continues to provide significant public funding for buses – though it has increased the £2 cap to £3 nationally.



GNE, like other companies such as Arriva, had experienced issues with driver shortage and maintenance back in 2021-22 when I first joined the Council, as we were coming out of lockdown. But I am very worried by recent delays which affect all sorts of residents and have made this clear to GNE.

To that end, I have been in close contact with GNE, residents and the Parish Council on this and I have also offered to work with our MP to lobby GNE. However, I continue to welcome resident feedback on buses as I need to know what is going on; as always, you can email me on douglas.oliver@durham.gov.uk

On the buses – sometimes!

Whether the reason is clapped out vehicles, cold weather or staff shortages, complaints in Lanchester have been growing around the reliability - or lack of it - of the local bus service. Even the intervention of our MP Luke Akehurst has yet to spark an improvement in the services to Durham, Consett or Stanley.

Residents have reported buses failing to turn up on a regular basis as they try to get to work in time. The peak time for non-attendance seems to be between 8am and 9am - the very time commuters are trying to get to work - and one theory is that the buses have been taken off their normal routes for school runs at that time.

Bus users in Lanchester and the wider community had to endure weeks of frustration at the back end of 2023 due to a strike by Go North East drivers. Now the frustration is caused by constant cancellations.

In January Mr Akehurst said: "I have written to the Managing Director of Go North East to share my concerns around the reliability of buses in the area following the cancellation of several services this morning.

"Constituents have let me know that they fear losing their jobs as a result of being late or unable to get to work. I have asked Go North East what action they will be taking to improve things."

Go North East (GNE) has blamed extreme cold weather for the removal of a number of buses which left passengers unable to commute or make hospital appointments and businesses paying for taxis.

But staff told the BBC that defective vehicles are rushed back into service while some newer buses were being sent to sister firm Go North West.

The company said it was "conducting an in-depth review" with the aim it "never again falls short of keeping a full fleet on the road at all times".

From the House

Since the beginning of the year there has been some positive news for Lanchester and the surrounding areas. Firstly, funding was confirmed to rebuild Shotley Bridge Hospital by 2030 as part of the New Hospitals Programme. The new hospital will provide a range of services, including sixteen inpatient beds and diagnostic and chemotherapy services, among other much-needed services. Secondly, 'Project Gigabit', which will

bring gigabit-capable broadband to 1,200 premises in North Durham, launches this year and Lanchester is set to be one of the places to benefit from new and improved broadband.

I have been dealing with a spike in correspondence relating to bus service cancellations and will be meeting with the management team at Go North East to talk about their plans for improving things. A large number of constituents have written to me regarding their constant struggle to get to work or school and things must change. I am aware that Lanchester in particular is served solely by Go North East and this will be raised during the

In Westminster, as well as representing the constituency, I have been appointed to the House of Commons Finance Committee, which has responsibility for scrutiny of the House of Commons budget. I voted for The Renters Rights Bill, and I served on the Bill Committee for the Armed Forces Commissioner Bill. I have asked oral questions on our defence procurement system, and on safeguarding measures in the Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill and I spoke during the debate on the UK submarine fleet and in favour of proportional representation in a debate on the voting system.

New Hospital at Shotley Bridge

The long-awaited construction of a new hospital will begin within the next five years, the government has announced.

Regional health officials have received confirmation that the proposed Shotley Bridge Hospital will be built after years of delays.

Health Secretary Wes Streeting announced in Parliament last month that the new Consett facility is within wave one of the revised New Hospital Programme.

He added that construction was expected to start between 2026-2027.

The 16-bed in-patient rehabilitation ward, outpatient services and urgent treatment centre would replace the current facility in Shotley Bridge. It would be located on Derwent View, Genesis Way, Consett, opposite the large Tesco store.

Local History Society

We met again in January for our now annual Show and Tell event. We were not disappointed by the items brought to the meeting. One we inherited this year kindly donated by Mavis Datta, a former member, and was reprint of a Plan of Lanchester Fell as rode and ambulated Monday July 15th 1754 by the Order of the honourable and Right Reverend Richard Lord Bishop of Durham.

Another was the Plan of the 1951 Explosion area of Eppleton Colliery Busty Seam 69A (Hetton Le Hole). This document annotated with all the locations the items as they were recorded by the surveying team involved with the colliery investigation. The

notes on the document were an incredible insight to the fastidious investigation and its findings about this tragedy where, sadly, nine men lost their lives.


From a completely different walk of life we were presented with a beautifully delicate collection of shoes. These were in a range of materials, glass, porcelain and metal detailing the many styles from the past.

One last offering was an 1893 Consett Iron Company Description of the Works published by Mawson Swan and Morgan Newcastle upon Tyne. This was an illustrated book, and those illustrations were produced by the Swan Electric Engraving Company. Before we set off walking a nice lady from Willow Burn thanked us all for coming and said the walk had raised over £1,000 for the hospice. We walked along the line past the old railway platform and crossed Station Road before heading in the direction of Malton. After a short while we veered off into Dora's Wood which was excellent walking because the cold temperatures had made the ground firm underfoot with an absence of mud. (Not that I mind mud, but it means I have to get sluiced down in the garage on returning home before I am allowed back in the house.)

We eventually left Dora's Wood by rejoining the railway path,

walking under a large metal pipe and climbing a short flight of steps. We carried on walking in convoy towards Malton and crossed the car park at the picnic area before turning right and walking across the bridge over the River Browney. The walk took us along to Malton and we turned right to pass in front of the row of houses there, before going left and along a footpath leading to a nature reserve. We had to cross a stile there - there were quite a few stiles on the walk - and passed through the nature reserve.

After crossing another stile, we turned right and walked along a narrow footpath through a wood to yet another stile. This led us into a field which we climbed, quite a steep incline, before going through a small gap into the hedge into another field. We turned left into one of the farmyards which we crossed and passed through a gate. This led us to another public footpath which took us downhill past a barn filled with haystacks on our right and back to the railway path. By this time, we were nearer Langley Park than Lanchester. But by turning left we headed back through Malton and then Lanchester.

Of course, the bare bones of this walk fails to mention the countless offshoots for curious dogs like me to explore in the woods on either side of the railway path.

But two hours after setting off we were back on Station Road, Lanchester and I think most of the walkers thoroughly enjoyed the experience. I certainly did.

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Virgin Media – Lightning fast until it stopped – twice!

After all the disruption and the incredibly hard work from the team installing the cable in the streets of Lanchester, I was looking forward to high-speed internet for the first time in the village. After I was connected last year, all went well with consistent high speeds and no interruption that I was aware of. That was until Saturday January 25th when the service stopped, and we were without internet. Virgin Media kept sending update texts until it was fixed the next day in the afternoon. I thought, well these things happen, and communication was good.

However, this was just a rehearsal for a much bigger outage later that week. On Wednesday 29th January the service failed again, which Virgin Media confirmed. I had a series of texts that day, and early on Thursday, saying that they were working to fix it. Then the messages stopped. I contacted them by Chat and, although the system was showing no outages in the area, they confirmed that there was indeed a problem with "some" connections in Lanchester. He said the latest he had was that the system would be running again at a date in the past (!) and acknowledged that was wrong and registered me for compensation.

Facebook was alight with complaints about Virgin Media and the difficulty in getting any information from them. Any times given for restoration of the service came and went! Some people contacted Virgin Media to cancel their service and were told that it would

cost them £400 to leave. At one point somebody complained that the text communication system was not working, and they were told that the technical team supporting this did not work on a Sunday.

Eventually, as if by magic, the system was restored on Wednesday 5th February and a message pinged in from Virgin Media saying we were reconnected.

Next thing is compensation. Their terms and conditions say that they will pay out £9.76 per day of outage after 48 hours. People are now trying to confirm that they will get compensation from Virgin Media but it's proving a struggle as they didn't seem to realise that some parts of Lanchester did not have service despite being told so by many people. What to do next? If you're dissatisfied, then you can switch (but at a cost before your contract ends) however Virgin Media are the only providers of fibre internet to our homes at present. So, you would have to switch back to low-speed "fibre to the cabinet" with copper wires to your house from the cabinet. Openreach have said that they have plans to connect Lanchester with fibre in the future but have not given a firm date and it's definitely not in the next 12 months. Quite a dilemma. Are you staying or leaving?

"Four Now Missing In Lanchester" reads the headline for the front page of the local paper. There's more than four missing, but that's all they know for now.







Wildlife Notes

A heart-warming wildlife rescue story was brought to our attention recently. The subject of the rescue was the majestic Peregrine Falcon, once heavily persecuted and impacted by pesticides in the food chain and still persecuted by some people today. Peregrines are the fastest bird in the world; they often hunt by tracking their prey in flight from above and going into a diving stoop, reaching speeds of up to 200mph. This species' strongholds are the uplands of the north and west, most major cities, and rocky seacoasts, where they can find their main prey of medium-sized birds such as wildfowl and pigeons. In the winter they often move from coastal cliff areas and quarries to estuaries and lower coastal areas.

Peregrine falcons are similar in appearance to Kestrels, but are bigger, with darker grey feathers on the back and a barred/striped breast, depending on sex and age. Look out for the broad, pointed wings and a short, square tail that is generally fanned when soaring, as well as the striking yellow ring around their eye.

Local wildlife photographer and contributor to Wild Notes, Ian Appleby, was recently notified about a bird that had taken up residence on farmland in Lanchester. He managed to identify the bird as a peregrine and took some brilliant photos with the farmer (see below), after the bird had become accustomed to the farmer doing his livestock check on his guad bike.

Ian then saw a post in the New Year during the period of hard snow and wind, about an injured peregrine found in Cornsay Colliery. It turned out to be the same bird. A real team effort ensued, with the rescue of the bird by Cornsay resident Gail, advice being sought from 'Paws for Thought' wildlife rescue centre in Sunderland and help from a local Falconer. The bird was also identified via a numbered ring on its leg, through the British Trust for Ornithology; this revealed that it was a wild peregrine, ringed in Cheshire as a nestling last summer.

The British Trust for Ornithology, and their nearly 3,000 registered volunteers across Britain and Ireland, play a crucial role in monitoring bird populations and help to inform efforts to protect them.

The bird was named Phoenix by Gail's son Reece; she was nursed back to health and subsequently released back to the area of Lanchester which she'd temporarily made her home. Thanks to the knowledge, care and efforts of local residents, a Peregrine lives on in our local community of wildlife, to bring joy and wonder to those taking some time out in the landscape to observe what and who is around us.

All providers of MECATS services bring specialist knowledge and expertise using the latest ophthalmic equipment, ensuring that patients benefit from this NHS enhanced eyecare service.

The surgery is often the first point of contact if you have a problem with your eyes, here the reception team use MECATS to navigate you to the best service to deal with your eye problem.

Referral to a Minor Eye Clinic- If you have an eye problem listed below you will be referred to a local Minor Eye Clinic where you will have a consultation with an expert with a wealth of experience in ophthalmic healthcare.

- Red Eye, possible conjunctivitis in adults and children of any age
- · Sore or painful eyes or if they are sensitive to light
- · If your eyes are uncomfortable, feel gritty, itchy or dry
- If your eyes are discharging or sticky
- · Any lumps or bumps in the vicinity of the eye
- · Watery eyes
- · Contact lens stuck in the eye
- Any foreign body in your eye or scratches
- Suffering from flashing lights or seeing floaters in your eyes or patches in your eye where you cannot see
- Double vision







Referral to Eye Casualty- For eye problems outside the remit of MECATS, listed below, you will be referred to an NHS Eye Casualty department who have the expertise and facilities to treat these problems.

- · If you have had recent eye surgery

Referral for Cataracts- once an optician has diagnosed cataracts, the optician writes to the surgery asking for a Cataract Referral for the patient.
