

# **Upcoming tree planting sessions in Lanchester**

The 'Trees for Lanchester' initiative is part of the Lanchester Partnership Environment group, and we are gearing up for this year's tree planting season.

Volunteers from the Parish have already planted approx. 6000 trees on 11 local sites since March 2021, and will be planting on 4 more sites in the Parish over the next couple of months.

We source native broadleaf trees via 'The Conservation Volunteers' and the Lanchester Orchard Tree Nursery, and from residents who have collected and grown trees from locally sourced seeds.

The aims of 'Trees for Lanchester' are to:

- · reduce the collective carbon footprint of the Parish
- support increased biodiversity
- enhance enjoyment of the local landscape for residents

It was such a wonderful evening we intend booking the two bands for a Christmas Concert in December 2025, a definite one NOT to miss.



# Poppy's walks

Good day readers and the walk I am about to describe to you takes place at the seaside. It has long been a family tradition for my Humans to spend New Year's Day at South Shields and get the benefit of some VERY bracing sea air. But because the weather forecast

was so grim for January 1, they decided to go on the Sunday beforehand.

Either way I am always eager to get onto the beach.

As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale Terrier who enjoys sharing with you the walks I lead my Humans on. So, we piled into the car and made our way to South Shields, about 45 minutes drive away. The male Human drives along the riverside route and turns right at the Sea Hotel along Ocean Road, and then right again up Lawe Road.

We park on the Lawe Top. This is a wonderful expanse of green with panoramic views over to the mouth of the River Tyne, and ships at sea beyond the harbour piers. But I am more concerned about exploring the scents of a new place. We walk around the Lawe Top taking in the views and then proceed towards an area called Beacon and a roundabout. There is a pub called the Harbour Lights on the roundabout but for once the male Human does not suggest popping in for "a livener."

Instead, we turn right and into North Marine Park at a gate which says Beacon entrance.

I am allowed off my lead to explore the undergrowth but after a short while we turn left down a short flight of steps.

We then cross a road opposite a hotel called Little Haven. We

walk into a courtyard full of strange looking chubby figures, about 20 of them and on our visit, they were dressed in colourful scarves and hats. This is apparently an art installation, but I am afraid some of my male dog contemporaries use the figures as props to cock their legs. How ill mannered!

From the Little Haven courtyard, I am always eager to get onto the beach, which we do in due course, and I run along it with an occasional paddle. When the beach runs out, we have reached the pier, and we walk along it a short way before branching to our right.

We then cross another road back into North Marine Park and walk the low path back through it until we reach the Beacon entrance again. Although for us it is now the Beacon exit. We walk back along the Lawe Top to the car. The walk took about 90 minutes and was very enjoyable as a change of scenery.



# Better Health- want to feel fitter and healthier?

Then the NHS Better Health website is just for you. https://www.nhs.uk/better-health Making healthy lifestyle choices to improve well-being can sometimes seem overwhelming. Log into this free website to show you how small changes can make a big difference. Topics include:



**Lose weight –** 12 weeks of constant support to help you set goals, plan meals with healthier food choices, record your progress and receive advice about calorie counting, portion size and healthy meals.

**Get active –** Try Active 10, which tracks your steps and records every minute of your walking and/or Couch to 5K, a running programme for absolute beginners.

A general recommendation to stay fit and healthy is to partake in moderate intensive physical activities for 20 to 30 minutes every day or at least 150 minutes every week. Sounds daunting? Find an exercise you enjoy and give it a try.

**Quit smoking –** NHS Quit Smoking app gives lots of motivation, tracks your progress and provides daily support and even tells you how much money you're saving. To increase your chances of quitting completely, Better Health recommends getting free expert help and support from your local stop smoking service.

It is never too late to quit smoking, even if you've tried before, the health benefits are almost instant. In 48 hours, all the harmful carbon monoxide is flushed out of your system, after 28 days you're five times more likely to quit for good. **Drink less alcohol** – NHS Drink Free Days app puts you in control by tracking your intake, setting a weekly unit target, sending reminders and celebrating your achievements. Better Health has lots of tips to support you when cutting back including swapping to lower strength or non-alcoholic drinks, sticking to a budget and varying your activities, so you avoid drinking. UK guidelines recommend no more than 40 units of alcohol each week spread over three or more days. (40 units = 6 pints of 4% beer or 6 x 175 ml glasses of 13% wine).

If you drink more than these levels, cutting back can have a huge benefit for your health and your bank balance. There is no safe drinking level.

Whether you'd like to lose weight, be more active, quit smoking for good or reduce your alcohol intake, these websites offer support to improve health and well-being.

I am also introducing legislation that would give police greater powers over seizing off-road bikes that have been involved in Antisocial Behaviour.

# From our councillor -

Education is the future, and few issues raise more justifiable passion in Lanchester and across the country. It is something that national and local government follow closely, and there is correct concern following the disruption caused by school closures during the pandemic.

I think it was the biggest issue of concern for one of my previous bosses Richard Holden, former MP for North West Durham. He worked at the Department for Education before he was elected, and I was able to visit dozens of schools from Consett to Crook to Weardale when I worked for him.

In my time on the County Council, I have been able to visit each of the schools in Lanchester, as well as working with governors Mike McGaun and I have helped nominate governors to local schools, like Ossie Johnson at Lanchester EP, David Smith at All Saints Primary School, and Judith Robson at Castleside Primary. I have also been able to visit each of the local schools and established a good relationship with Mrs Hamill and her team at St Bede's. A particular highlight has been supporting Richard Holden's successful initiative to bring in Lanchester EP to the School Capital Fund, allocating extra money for its future reconstruction with a more modern design. Since then, I have been working with headteacher Mrs Davis where I try to ensure funds come forward and are used in line with what her team would want to work in, and what would have best access for pedestrians and for parking.

Since July 2023, I have served as a Governor at Burnhope Primary School and it has been great to see the way the headteacher Mrs Bryson's team instils their aims of ensuring the pupils "Be Kind, Have Courage, and Show Respect" and it was interesting to discuss the school's performance with Ofsted during the November inspection which it received continued praise, sustaining the positive outcome it gained in 2019 from its previous Good Ofsted report.

At a national-level Britain has made good progress in recent years, Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study and PISA rankings showing some good progress since the pandemic, ahead of most European peers, but behind leaders in East Asia. The National Tutoring Programme was a very useful initiative to provide extra tuition for pupils, especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds after the pandemic, worth £1billion over four years, but it's not been continued, and the impact of the pandemic surely lingers on.

Nothing can be taken for granted in education. I welcome local feedback from parents and those working in our schools because I am always keen to learn about learning.

# **Wildlife Notes**

As the first month of the year draws to a close, the annual RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch takes place. Since 1979, people have been counting the birds in their gardens, balconies or parks as part of the largest citizen wildlife survey in the UK, and its results have illustrated the decline of garden birds.

In the past 50 years, the UK has lost 72 million birds that have not been replaced by new generations, equivalent to losing 4,000 birds a day. This is reflected in the fortunes of our garden birds. The average count of Starlings has gone down by 82%, Song Thrushes by 80%, Chaffinches by 68% and House Sparrows by 57%, despite being the most counted bird for 20 years running.


The decline in birds has been caused by many factors, from habitat loss, pollution and climate change to the spread of intensive farming, disease and fewer cavities in houses, which limit nesting and feeding opportunities.

To take action, easy steps include cleaning garden bird feeders to reduce the spread of illness, letting some areas of grass in gardens or on roadsides grow longer, and avoiding cutting back plants for winter, to provide places to nest, feed and shelter from predators. Other helpful steps include avoiding the use of herbicides and pesticides in your garden, as well as growing fruit and berry bushes, and avoiding the use of artificial turf.

And, of course, you can participate in the Big Garden Birdwatch from the 26th to the 28th of January 2025. It only takes an hour of your weekend, during which you note which birds and how many of them land in your garden,

then submit your results via a short online form to the RSPB. Anyone can sign up for free on their website. The results will be published in spring, and every submission helps to monitor the health of our UK bird population and bring about initiatives to save our garden companions.
